Ruby Brannon recently has accompanied her brother-in-law and sister, John and Donnie Bowman, to Branson, Missouri. They saw several shows while there.

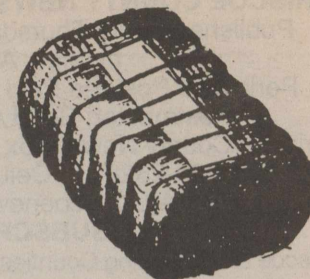

Council Considering Action on Junked Vehicles in Silverton

At the November 14 meeting of the Silverton City Council, the proposed ordinance prohibiting junked vehicles in the city was reviewed and public hearings were set for Thursday, December 1, and Thursday, December 8, at 7:00 p.m. in the Pioneer Room at City Bank. A notice of the public hearings is in the newspaper this week, encouraging citizens to attend and voice their opinions of the ordinance.

Present at the meeting were Mayor Lane Garvin, Council members Dwain Henderson, Kyle Fuston, Delane Smith, Wayne Reed, Dwain Tipton and City Secretary Jerry Patton.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved, and financial reports were presented and approved. Monthly vouchers

were approved for payment.

The Council considered and acted upon authorizing the purchase of a truck chassis for the fire department through the Houston-Galveston Council of Governments Cooperative Purchasing Program. Purchase of the truck chassis is pending a Texas Forestry Service Grant. Motion passed to purchase the truck chassis, pending receipt of the total grant funding of \$66,600.

It was reported that both propositions one and two had passed and that the votes would be canvassed and certified on November 17, at 7:00 p.m. at the City Hall.

Motion was made and passed to equip and implement a waste reduction enhancement project.

The Secretary reported on monthly water use, tax collections,

current TCDP Project, metal recycling project and repairs to fire station doors.

Quitaque Citizens Express Opinions On Peace Justice

At the meeting of the Briscoe County Commissioners Court on November 14, several Quitaque citizens voiced their opinion on the question of combining the two justice of the peace offices in the county. No action was taken by the court.

The Court adopted Order No. 07-05 extending the 900-hour rule for Texas County and District Retirement Systems. As authorized by Section 32(b) of House Bill 633 as passed in the regular session of the 79th Legislature and signed into law on June 17, 2005, the Commissioners Court of Briscoe County orders that until the first pay period beginning on or after January 1, 2007, Briscoe County exclude from membership to TCDRS as a class those persons who fill a non-temporary position or office in Briscoe County or in a Community Supervision and Corrections Department participating through

County Clerk Bena Hester visited with the Court about having a joint primary in March, and motion on this carried.

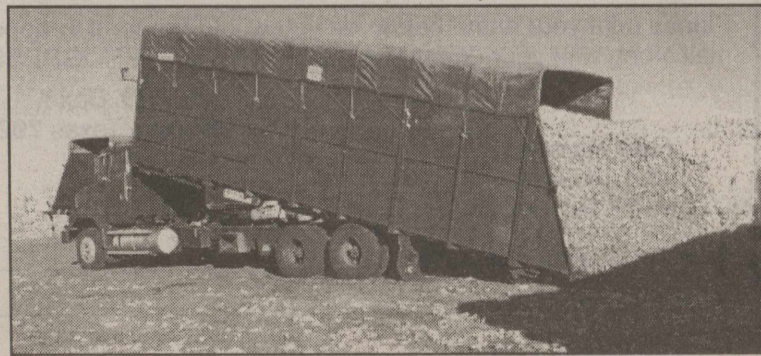

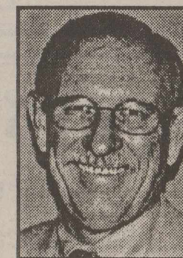

Sample Ordinance

An Ordinance To Protect The Public Health and Promote The Public Welfare Of The City of Silverton, Texas, By Prohibiting Junked Vehicles

WHEREAS, it is deemed by the City Council of the City of Silverton, Texas, that a junked vehicle that is located in a place where it is visible from a public place of public right-of-way is detrimental to the safety and welfare of the general public, tends to reduce the value of private property, and invites vandalism, creates fire hazards, constitutes an unattractive nuisance creating a hazard to the health and safety of minors, and is detrimental to the economic welfare of the state by producing urban blight adverse to maintenance and continuing development of the municipalities in the state, and is a public nuisance.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Silverton, Texas:

Section 1. That it is unlawful for any person to maintain a public nuisance as determined under this ordinance.

Section 2. "Junked vehicle" means a motor vehicle as defined in Section 621.001 of the Texas Transportation Code, as amended:

A. that is inoperative, and

B. that does not have lawfully affixed to it either an unexpired license plate or a valid Motor Vehicle Safety Inspection Certificate, that is wrecked, dismantled, par-

tially dismantled, or discarded, or that remains inoperable for a continuous period of more than 45 days.

Section 3. The following procedures are hereby adopted for the abatement and removal of a junked vehicle or a part of a junked vehicle as a public nuisance from private property, that it must be removed and abated within 10 days and that a request for a hearing must be made before expiration of the 10-day period. The notice must be mailed, by certified mail with a 5 day return requested, to the last known owner of the junked motor vehicle, and lien holder of record, and the owner or occupant of the private premises upon which the public nuisance exists. If any notice is returned undelivered by the United States Post Office, official action to abate the nuisance shall be continued to a date not less than 10 days after the date of the return.

Section 4. For a nuisance on public property, the procedures consist of not less than 10 days notice, stating the nature of the public nuisance on public property or on a public right-of-way, that the nuisance must be removed and abated within 10 days, and that a request for a hearing must be made before expiration of the 10-day period. The notice must be mailed, by certified mail with a 5 day return requested, to the last known registered owner of this junked motor vehicle, any lien holder of record, and the owner or occupant of the public right-of-way on

which the public nuisance exists. If the notice is returned undelivered by the United States Post Office, official action to abate the nuisance shall be continued to a date not less than 10 days after the date of the return.

Section 5. After the expiration of the 10-day period described above, if there has been no request for hearing, the City may remove and abate the nuisance. The costs and expenses incurred by the City may be charged to the person, firm or entity responsible for causing the nuisance.

Section 6. A vehicle may not be reconstructed or made operative after it has been removed in accordance with the foregoing procedures.

Section 7. If requested, a public hearing must be held before the removal of the vehicle or vehicle part as a public nuisance. The hearing shall be held before the governing body of the City, if the owner or occupant of the public or private premises requests a hearing by the owner or occupant of the premises adjacent to the public right-of-way on which the vehicle is located, within 10 days after service of the notice to abate the nuisance. A resolution or order requiring the removal of a vehicle or vehicle part must include a description of the vehicle and the correct identification number and license number of the vehicle if the information is available at the site.

Section 8. Notice must also be given to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation not later than the 5th day after the date of the removal. The notice must identify the vehicle or vehicle part.

Section 9. A person authorized by the City to administer the procedures authorized by this ordinance may enter private property for the purposes specified in the procedures to examine a vehicle or vehicle part, obtain information as to the identity of the vehicle, and remove or cause the removal of a vehicle part that constitutes a nuisance.

Section 10. Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary contained herein, the procedures for removal and abatement of a public nuisance must comply with Chapter 391 of the Texas Transportation Code, as amended.

Section 11. Any person, firm or entity who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in a sum not exceeding \$200.00, and each and every days violations shall constitute a separate and distinct offense. On conviction, the Court shall order removal and abatement of the nuisance.

TxDOT To Hold Workshop Dec. 6

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) officials are seeking candidate projects for the State-wide Transportation Enhancement Program, which provides funding to cities and counties for projects with a relationship to the surface transportation system. A workshop for interested community leaders will be held at the TxDOT District Office in Childress, 7599 U.S. 287 on December 6, starting at 1:30 p.m. At this workshop, TxDOT officials will be able to answer questions concerning specific projects, provide assistance on what type of language is best suited for this project and assist in filling out the application. Previous program calls have funded the restoration of the railroad depot in Quanah; construction of the Childress Walking Trail and the restoration of the 501 Engine in Childress; restoration of the U-Drop Inn in Shamrock; restoration of the railroad depot at the Saints Roost Museum in Clarendon; improvements at the railroad depot in Paducah as a museum; restoration of the railroad depot in Roaring Springs; a walking trail in Knox City and the Rails to Trails from Estelline to the South Plains, an equestrian, hiking and biking trail.

The new federal highway legislation, entitled Safe, Accountable, Flexible and Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) has funding for non-traditional, transportation-related activities that have a relationship to the surface transportation system.

TxDOT's goal for the program is to encourage different kinds of transportation investment, strengthen partnerships between state and local governments, and promote citizen involvement in transportation decisions.

Approved projects will receive funding on a cost reimbursement

Section 12. The invalidity of any section or provision of this ordinance shall not invalidate other sections or provisions hereof.

Section 13. This ordinance is made accumulative to all other ordinances and shall not be construed as repealing any ordinance.

Section 14. This ordinance shall be in full force and effective from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

Day when they play the Olton eleven. The team lost to Lockney 6-13 and tied Tulia 6-6, and beat Matador 3-0,

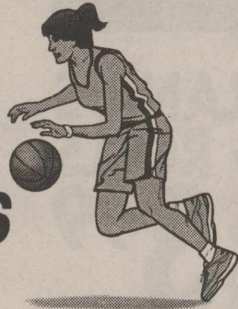

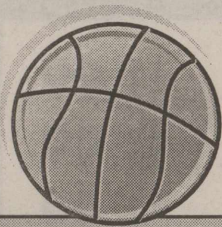

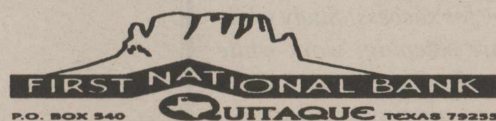
