Losses caused by this year's drought could reach \$1 billion by next spring, according to a release provided by Briscoe County CEA-Ag David Hawkins, Texas Cooperative Extension.

Only half of the hay crop was harvestable, and livestock will have to be fed supplements for an extra three to five months. Stocker calves are fewer and being shipped at lighter weights, and fall market calf prices are low; however, Far West Texas is benefitting from record early spring rains and good summer and fall rains. The extra moisture supported a record cotton crop. Yields are estimated at 7.8 million bales, while average yields are about five million bales.

Sample Ordinance

An Ordinance To Protect The Public Health and **Promote The Public Welfare** Of The City of Silverton, Texas, By Prohibiting **Junked Vehicles**

WHEREAS, it is deemed by the City Council of the City of Silverton, Texas, that a junked vehicle that is located in a place where it is visible from a public place of public right-of-way is detrimental to the safety and welfare of the general public, tends to reduce the value of private property, and invites vandalism, creates fire hazards, constitutes an unattractive nuisance creating a hazard to the health and safety of minors, and is detrimental to the economic welfare of the state by producing urban blight adverse to maintenance and continuing development of the municipalities in the state, and is a public nuisance.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Silverton, Texas:

Section 1. That it is unlawful for any person to maintain a public nuisance as determined under this ordinance.

> Section 7. If requested, a public hearing must be held before the removal of the vehicle or vehicle part as a public nuisance. The hearing shall be held before the governing body of the City, if the owner or occupant of the public or private premises requests a hearing by the owner or occupant of the premises adjacent to the public right-of-way on which the vehicle is located, within 10 days after service of the notice to abate the nuisance. A resolution or order requiring the removal of a vehicle or vehicle part must include a description of the vehicle and the correct identification number and license number of the vehicle if the information is available at the site.

Section 8. Notice must also be given to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation not later than the 5th day after the date of the removal. The notice must identify the vehicle or vehicle part.

Section 9. A person authorized by the City to administer the procedures authorized by this ordinance may enter private property for the purposes specified in the procedures to examine a vehicle or vehicle part, obtain information as to the identity of the vehicle, and remove or cause the removal of a vehicle part that constitutes a nui-

Section 10. Not withstanding any provision to the contrary contained herein, the procedures for removal and abatement of a public nuisance must comply with Chapter 391 of the Texas Transportation Code, as amended.

Section 11. Any person, firm or entity who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in a sum not exceeding \$200.00, and each and every days violations shall constitute a separate and distinct offense. On conviction, the Court shall order removal and abatement of the nuisance.

TxDOT To Hold Workshop Dec. 6

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) officials are seeking candidate projects for the Statewide Transportation Enhancement Program, which provides funding to cities and counties for projects with a relationship to the surface transportation system. A workshop for interested community leaders will be held at the TxDOT District Office in Childress, 7599 U.S. 287 on December 6, starting at 1:30 p.m. At this workshop, TxDOT officials will be able to answer questions concerning specific projects, provide assistance on what type of language is best suited for this project and assist in filling out the application. Previous program calls have funded the restoration of the railroad depot in Quanah; construction of the Childress Walking Trail and the restoration of the 501 Engine in Childress; restoration of the U-Drop Inn in Shamrock; restoration of the railroad depot at the Saints Roost Museum in Clarendon; improvements at the railroad depot in Paducah as a museum; restoration of the railroad depot in Roaring Springs; a walking trail in Knox City and the Rails to Trails from Estelline to the South Plains, an equestrian, hiking and biking trail.

The new federal highway legislation, entitled Safe, Accountable, Flexible and Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) has funding for non-traditional, transportation-related activities that have a relationship to the surface transportation system.

TxDOT's goal for the program is to encourage different kinds of transportation investment. strengthen partnerships between state and local governments, and promote citizen involvement in transportation decisions

Approved projects will receive funding on a cost reimbursement

Section 12. The invalidity of any section or provision of this ordinance shall not invalidate other sections or provisions hereof.

Section 13. This ordinance is made accumulative to all other ordinances and shall not be construed as repealing any ordinance.

Texas Cooperative EXTENSION David Hawkins, CEA-Ag Briscoe County, Texas

Experiment Station scientists are testing subsurface drip irrigation systems. They are comparing systems to see how lower-cost designs affect water distribution, crop performance, and total yields.

Earlier tests have shown that subsurface systems maximize water use efficiency, boost crop yields, and require less labor. But, these systems cost more to install. Since 2001, scientists have been testing to see if lower design standards can also provide high yields, but minimize the cost of installation. Preliminary results show that while water distribution is less even, standards can be lowered without affecting overall yield.

A recent Extension study can assist wildlife managers in selecting supplemental feed. Dr. Susan Cooper found a way to effectively monitor deer consumption in the wild. Using retail security technology, she linked a motion-activated video to a waterproof scale with a bowl of supplemental feed. The video recorded every animal that ate from the bowl, how much time it spent, and its rate of consumption. Research provided information about deer consumption, what supplement feeds they prefer, and how much food was eaten by other animals. 
