
The Amarillo College 75th Commencement ceremonies were held at the Amarillo Civic Center Cal Farley Coliseum.





USDA Secretary Mike Johanns reminded producers that June 1, 2005 is the last date to sign up for the 2005-crop Direct and Countercyclical Payment Program (DCP) without paying an administrative

USDA will accept late-filed DCP applications through Sept. 30, 2005, if accompanied by a \$100 late fee. Sign-up for the 2005 DCP began on Oct. 1, 2004. The 2002 Farm Bill requires producers to sign annual contracts in order to participate in DCP.

I've been going for check-ups every year to Dr. Long since the operation and have received a good check-up every year!



Texas Cooperative EXTENSION David Hawkins, CEA-Ag Briscoe County, Texas

Almost half of the U.S. honey bee population has been affected by a tiny parasite known as the varroa mite. The pest attacks adult and brood bees, then sucks their blood, weakening them and shortening their life spans. Extension experts recommend bee keepers check their hives frequently and act quickly with proper chemicals if the mite is found. Bees pollinate 130 crops in the U.S., and contribute \$14-billion annually in improved crop yields and quality.

Wheat producers face new disease and pest challenges every year. An A&M researcher is trying to help fight these battles by crossing synthetic wheat varieties and wild grasses from Turkey. He is trying to create a variety with rapid stand establishment and early fall growth. Current local strains of wheat have limited genetic variability. He hopes to double genetic gain by doubling genetic variabil-

The month of May is National Electric Safety Month. More than 500 people die from electrocution every year. Among major industries, agriculture ranks second in the number of electrocution deaths. It takes less than 15 millamperes to produce a painful shock, and 20 millamperes can be fatal. That is only a fraction of the electrical current needed to power a 60-watt light bulb, which draws about 500 millamperes. Discuss electrical hazards with yor family and farm workers. Throw away any damaged extension cords. Clearly mark overhead power lines. For more information about electrical safety the farm, agsafety.tamu.edu.
