

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Scattered Showers Return to the Area

Just as dryland growers are starting to look to the sky for help and irrigated producers getting ready to pick up where Mother Nature left off a couple of weeks ago, a few growers in the central High Plains heard a welcome sound June 30 when a series of showers moved across the area.

High Plains cotton producers are feeling considerably better about the 2005 crop after seeing it make tremendous progress over the past few weeks to overcome various weather, disease and insect related setbacks.

While the moisture received this week was just what the doctor ordered for some, the entire High Plains region will shortly reach the point where a timely rainfall is nechas been made, especially on nonirrigated cotton acres.

Knowing that the crop is in pretty good shape and looking better every day means crop observers want to know just how much cotton is being grown on the High Plains in 2005.

The first piece of information needed to answer that question was provided by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service on June 30 with the release of the June Crop Acreage Report. The second part, tallying how many acres in the High Plains region were estimated at

3.65 million, essentially the same amount planted during the 2004growing season.

Statewide, 2005 Texas cotton plantings are projected at 5.8 million acres. This amounts to a modest one percent, or 50,000 acre, decrease from 2004 levels. Nationwide, however, the story is slightly different as cotton acreage is estimated to have increased by approximately three percent, to 13.8 million acres.

Assessment Collections Exceed 96%

At a meeting of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation (TBWEF) board of directors held in Abilene, Chief Financial Officer Tina Ballard reported that assessment collections for 2004 exceed 96% statewide and that collection of assessments for 2005 has started following receipt of certified acreage from USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA).

Anyone planting cotton in the state of Texas is required by law to notify TBWEF of the location of that cotton. For the vast majority of growers, that notification is achieved through certification of acres with FSA.

After the final certification date, FSA transmits files to TBWEF detailing acreage, ownership and location for all cotton.

First Program Changes To Meet Obligations

Early this week reports from Washington said USDA officials were getting ready to present a legislative package to Congress that would begin the process of complying with the recent World Trade Organization ruling that portions of the U.S. cotton program were in fact prohibited subsidies.



tistics Service (NASS) reported U. S. producers planted 14.02 million acres to cotton in 2005-06, includ-Pima. The total acreage is 211,000 acres greater than growers reported in the March planting inmore than was planted in 2004.

The largest increase from the March survey was in the Southwest where plantings were pegged at 6.1 million acres, a 90,000 acre increase from the previous report. The area planted to cotton in Texas was raised by 100,000 acres to a total of 5.8 million, still 50,000 acres less than the total planted in

Meanwhile, USDA's export sales report for the week ended June 23 showed net sales of 305,700 bales. China was the largest buyer at 248,200 bales followed by Turkey and Mexico at 34,100 and 21,400 bales were reported for 2005-06 delivery.

Export shipments of 301,900 bales were 12 percent more than the previous week and 10 percent higher than the four-week average. Primary destinations were China, Turkey and Mexico.

"A healthy export shipment number proved that shippers are going to do everything in their power to get every bale offshore before July 31 to take advantage of higher Step 2 payments," one analyst said. "The higher payments will only be applied to cotton shipped in the 2004-05 crop year, which ends July 31," he explained.

In the spot cotton market, online trading by producers in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas in the week ended June 30 totaled 20,990 bales compared to the previous week when 19,272 bales were traded. Average prices received by producers in the most recent week ranged from 40.34 to 44.56 cents per pound compared to 40.18 to 41.32 cents per pound the previous week.




