## 1400 Cotton Samples Received Daily At Munday Office

Dry weather allowed harvesting and ginning of cotton to proceed so that daily receipts reached 1400 samples according to A. D. Peebles in charge of the U. S. D. A. Cotton Classing office in Munday.

Cold weather stopped harvest late in the week and will allow gins to clean the yards.

The office classed 6,455 samples for the week ending Jan. 11 and grades ran as follows: Low Middling, two per cent; Strict Low Middling Light Spot, 32 per cent; Low Middling Light Spot, 20 per cent; Strict Low Middling Spot 26 per cent; Low Middling Spot, 12 per cent; Strict Low Middling Tinged, 2 per cent and Low Middling Tinged, 2 percent.

Staples were 7-8 and shorter, 5 percent; 29-32, 22 percent; 15-16 63 percent; 31-32 and longer, 10 percent.

## Agricultural Banker Speaks At Farm-Ranch Day

Dooley Dawson, vice president and manager, Agricultural Department of the Bank of the Southwest in Houston was the guest speaker at the Farm and Ranch Day soil fertility meeting held at Munday January 23 at the school gym. The topic of his speeches was "Agriculture in the Future."

Mr. Dawson has been with the bank of the Southwest since Sept. 1, 1945. His primary duties are contacting and working with bankers in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas, Mississippi and Colorado. He works with civic clubs, business groups and assists with bankers' conferences. Mr. Dawson assisted with the organization of farm and ranch clubs in various sections of the state.

Mr. Dawson is well qualified to speak on agriculture. He was born and reared on a farm at Crockett. He graduated from Texas A&M with a degree in agriculture. Upon graduation, he taught vocational agriculture for three years and was with the Soil Conservation Service for ten years before joining the Bank of the Southwest.

He has seen the agriculture of the Southwest survive the drought and depression of the thirties, win the battle of food in two hot wars, and one cold war, and prepare for the soaring sixties.

Mr. Dawson is a member of many agricultural and banking organizations. He is an active member of the Agriculture Committee of the Houston Chamber of Commerce. In this capacity, he works with the Houston Stock Show and the Houston Farm and Ranch Club. He is a member of the American Cotton Congress and of the Advisory Committee for Texas Farm and Ranch Credit School for commercial bankers.

He is an active member of the Advisory Committee of the Southwest Farm Forum, which has membership in 13 southern states. In 1961 and 1962, he served on the faculty at the Southwestern Graduate School of Banking at SMU in Dallas. This year he was on the faculty of the School of Banking of the South at L. S. U. in Baton Rouge, La.

## M. O. D. CELEBRATES 25th ANNIVERSARY

This is the 25th anniversary of the March of Dimes sponsored by the National Foundation.

Last year a total of \$1564.94 was raised, with 25 per cent of this total amount going to medical research and the remainder divided with National and county funds.

## HIGHLIGHTS FROM AUSTIN

AUSTIN — Serving as Governor of Texas should be a snap for John Connally.

Any man who can wage a rigorous, 12 months campaign for Governor, such as he has done, reorganize the state government, plan and participate in all the ceremonies he has been through since his election and inauguration, and assume all the allied responsibilities related thereto . . . should find the task of being governor a cinch.

It seemed like half of Texas was in Austin to see the first mass turnover in state government since Jimmy Allred took over from "Ma" Ferguson in 1935.

Man of the hour was, of course, John Connally. Bus loads of people both from his old hometown of Floresville and his latest hometown of Fort Worth came to Austin for the festivities that surrounded his inauguration as governor.

Most of them were here by inauguration eve when nearly 5,000 people packed Austin's Municipal Auditorium for the Democrats' "Victory Dinner," rated as the biggest seated dinner in the state's history. It was sponsored by the State Democratic Executive Committee. At \$25 a plate, it netted the party \$100,000 and put it on its feet, wellheeled.

Inauguration day led off with an interdenominational prayer breakfast and the dignity of the day carried over to the high noon swearing-in ceremony in front of the State Capitol. Some 5,000 people clustered on the capitol lawn as Governor Connally and Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith solemnly took their oaths of office from Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert of the State Supreme Court.

Both Connally and Smith expressed a sincerity of purpose and a real desire to work with the 58th Legislature in pushing progress for the state . . . while holding down spending.

Throughout Inauguration Day, Texas' two top men kept popping up in unexpected places—arriving early for ceremonies and dropping in at events related to the inauguration. They shook every extended hand and signed as many autographs as time allowed.

EQUAL RIGHTS — The perennial battle for women's equal rights will hit the limelight in the Texas Senate early in the 58th Legislative session. Senate constitutional amendments committee set public hearing for 7 p.m. Jan. 30, on a proposal to give women equal legal rights. Proposed constitutional amendment was submitted by Sens. W. T. Moore of Bryan and Bill Patman of Ganado.

VOTE AGE TARGET—Rep. V. E. "Red" Berry of San Antonio wants the minimum voting age in Texas lowered to 18 years.

Berry has filed a bill which would propose a constitutional amendment allowing the Legislature to make the change. Present law requires voters to be 21 years of age.

IMPACT IN SUPREME COURT —Waggoner Carr made his first appearance before the State Supreme Court as attorney general when the high court heard the case of the state versus the city of Impact Impact is a satellite of "dry" Abilene which proposes to operate "wet."

Carr made a brief argument for the state, but turned the major presentation over to Tom Eplen of Abilene, and former State Senator Clint C. Small, who have worked on the case for about three years.

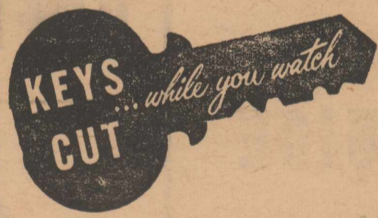
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### KC Study Club Has Meeting
