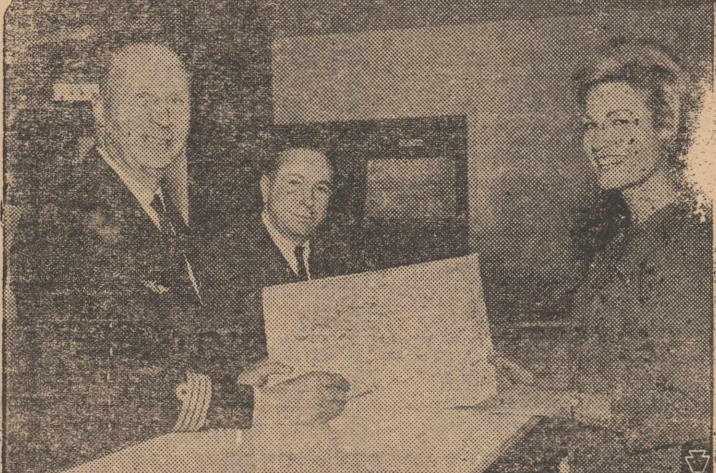


What's The Weather At 37,000 Feet?

She witnessed, and later reported on her daily show, how a transatlantic pilot maps out three alternate routes before take-off to decide on the one which insures the most advantageous weather conditions. She learned how temperatures, altitude, and jet streams are harnessed to insure speed and the ultimate in flight comfort; how a team of technicians in North America and in Europe follows the flight of Intercontinental jets second by second, from take-off to landing.

Mrs. Haley also inspected sensitive electronic weather instruments at Air France's meteorological center and studied how information is processed onto weather charts.

Not only does Rosemary mastermind her own show, Haley's Comment, but this mother of three small children also reports child features on the Flair show, ABC-TV network.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — A \$3 billion budget bill has been passed by the House of Representatives. Before it cleared the House

and went on to the Senate, the bill elicited several cries of anguish from some who protested agency bequests as too small

and some who claimed certain allotments were too big. Rep. Forrest Harding of San Angelo claimed appropriations for the State Army Board and the State Board of Control were too big, since they involved \$1,000 salary raises for executive directors of those agencies. Rep. Terry Townsend of Brady claimed deputy commissioners in the Texas Education Agency draw a total of \$14,800 more than the Legislature authorized. Townsend also tried to cut out a \$250,000 appropriation to improve the newly-donated Wheatly Ranch in Blanco County as a state park. He claimed the money was needed for establishing parks. But this move failed.

HIGH COST OF FLYING—Another attempt to cut specific recommendation out of the budget bill almost was successful.

Rep. James Cotten of Weatherford tried to get the House to "ground" the State Land Office airplane. He pointed out that \$100,000 is appropriated annually for operation and maintenance of a high-powered Land Office plane.

Cotten showed a photostatic copy of the plane's flight log for the year ended October 1962. He stated, "In a year's time, only 68 flights were recorded. Sixteen were test flights to familiarize the pilot with the plane before he broke the propeller when he collided with another plane in a hangar and then he had to take eight more test flights to familiarize himself with the new propeller!"

Rep. Joe Chapman of Sulphur Springs disagreed. He said that the plane is necessary for aerial surveys and photographs to conform the 1941 state land survey. Cotten insisted that the Land Office should hire commercial aerial photographers, as the Texas Water Commission does.

Cotten's amendment to strike out the plane appropriation failed by a narrow 72-68 vote.

LOW COST OF EDUCATION—Complaints about too-low appropriations came from members who said allotments for higher education in 1964-65 are too small.

The last legislature appropriated \$159,600,000 from the State General Revenue Fund for higher education in 1962-63.

State college administrators requested \$243,000,000 for the coming two years. Former Gov. Price Daniel and the legislative Budget Board recommended \$226,000,000. Gov. John B. Connally recommends \$225 billion. Paducah Rep. Bill Heatly's appropriations bill allows for \$187,600,000 to educate the bumper crop of war babies that is expected to begin to flow into state colleges next year.

COUNTY BUYING MAY BE EASIER—Rep. Vernon Beckham of Denison got a green light from the House Committee on Counties on his bill to raise the amount a county purchasing

agent may spend on emergency purchases without advertising for competitive bidding.

Since 1925, the amount may be spent without competitive bidding has been \$150. Beckham said this is unrealistic in the view of rising costs. He proposed it be raised to \$500. However, the subcommittee set it at \$300.

Reps. Henry Grover and J. C. Whitfield of Houston won approval from the House State Affairs Committee on their bill to require competitive bidding on public school purchases above \$1,000.

Sales Tax Freeze Fails—An attempt by Rep. John Allen of Longview to pass a constitutional amendment to freeze the state sales tax at two per cent and keep food and drugs exempt failed by a 72-64 vote.

However, food may remain safe from the sales tax if a measure by Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas and Rep. Charles Wilson of Trinity passes. They have proposed legislation to simplify sales tax bookkeeping for grocers.

Since grocers have been the ones fighting for a blanket tax, this bill may satisfy them.

There are times when a spirit of depression overcomes us.

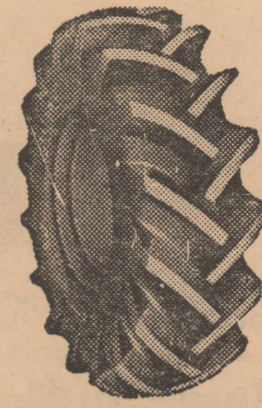

IT'S THE LAW

IN TEXAS

Our courts work with two sets of principles in meting out justice—those of "law" and those of "equity."

Under "law" a court declares the parties' rights and duties and sets money damages for harm already done—as when someone goes back on his contract with you, or injures you in an automobile crash.

But under principles of "honesty, equity, and conscience," for example, a court seeing harm on the way, may forestall it and enforce its orders by fines or jail terms.

England used to have two kinds of courts to hear cases under law and equity. But today both England and America use the same judge to hear both kinds of cases.

How did these two systems arise?

Long ago the English king called upon the "chancery"—then largely made up of churchmen, (the keepers "of the King's conscience"), to give "relief" where the older Common law courts, grown rigid, might fail.

Unable to use Common Law, the chancellors applied certain rules and maxims, sometimes borrowed from ancient Greece and Rome—"He who comes into equity must come with clean hands." Sometimes this is stated: "No one can take advantage in a court of equity of his own wrongdoing."

This maxim denied a suitor "relief" if he himself has done wrong in the transaction at issue.

A scale maker had advertised that his scales would count fractions of a cent against the customer and in favor of the storekeeper.

He had asked a court in equity to stop a competitor from revealing that his scale was cheating customers. But the court threw the case out: Not having "clean hands," the scale maker had no standing in equity. He could not seek fair treatment when he himself was dishonest in the particular situation at issue.

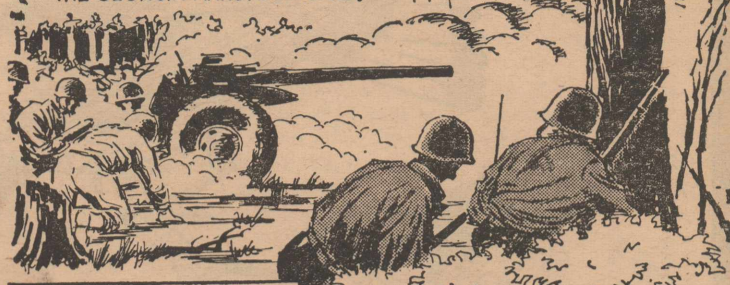

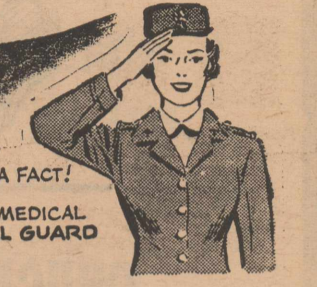

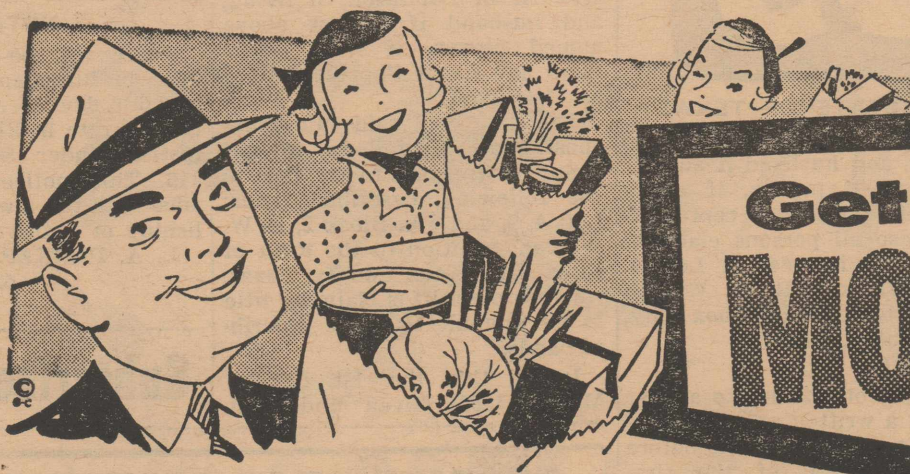
