Your Fair Share

Most Texans, we believe, are fair-minded folks.

They believe in fair play, square dealing, and mutual respect for personal and property rights. Those who want to take advantage of their neighbors are the exception. Sometimes it may be hard to define "a fair share." This

can occur in dividing oil or gas production, when two or more landowners are involved. As we all know, oil and gas don't pay any attention to

Here in Texas many wells have been allowed to produce more oil or gas than they should have because they were drilled on very small tracts. That extra oil or gas came from under the neighbors' land.

Some oilmen made a regular practice of this type of operation. Obviously, one owner got more than his fair share—others, less.

People in 26 out of 29 oil producing states have found a way to divide their oil and gas so that each owner gets what is rightfully his. They simply put their small acreage together and share the costs and income. This system is known as POOLING.

bill now before the Legislature, HOUSE BILL 510. When the neighbors cannot agree, the Railroad Commission would set up a drilling block and see to it that the rights of all owners are protected . . . all costs and proceeds equitably divided. Oilmen who have made fortunes at the expense of

others could not be expected to support House Bill 510. They are bitterly opposing it. But the responsible oilmen of Texas are overwhelmingly for it. So are the informed cithizens who want to see justice done.





National program totals thru March 7 show 642,835 signed up to divert 13,126,000 acres, from base acreages of 34,796,400 acres. Estimated total payments for diverting acreage on farms signed up amount to \$253,813,300 not including price support payment to be made to cooperators.

In general, provisions for the 1963 program follow those for 1961 and 1962 crops by giving feed grain producers an opportunity to participate in the program by reducing acreages and devoting the land to conserving uses. By participating, they will receive payments and price support payments (new to the 1963 program), and be eligible to take part in the price-support loan program. Price support for 1963 to farms participating in the program will be made available on corn, grain, sorghum, and barley partly through loans and purchase agreements and partly through an in-kind payment based on the normal production of the acreage planted this year to one or more of the three feed grains.

The 1961 and 1962 feed grain programs have brought a reversal of a 10-year buildup in feed grain surpluses. By Oct. 1, of this year, estimated total feed grain stocks of 61 million tons will be down about 28 per cent from the record 84.7 million; tons on Oct. 1, 1961. Continued participation around levels of the past two years should bring feed grain stocks near desidable reserve levels by Oct. 1, 1964.




