City Secretary Duck Robinson, who has been calling us the past three months when the council meets, was unable to reach us Monday night. This month we will be forced to run "court records" just as they are included in the minutes.

Since Mayor Angle took office in May, he specifically asked the Herald to report on "everything the city has to say and do."


In contrast to past experiences he has told us he can be quoted on "anything!"

To begin with he informed the people of the financial condition of Knox City-something no one -including the city could know anything about. He also recommended some action in which the council backed him up 100 per cent in saving the taxpayers a bushel of money.

This week the audit of the city will be included and it can be seen that we are in bad financial shape. It is too late to cut too many corners now, for the time to cut was before the money was spent. We can't spend any more money legally at this time, so something will have to be done.

We failed to note any place in our copy of the audit where we owe anything on the city hall. However, a payment of \$1,874.28 was listed and according to our latest information, we still owe between eight and \$10,000 more ords of the City of Knox City on it.


