



Last week was the second straight week in which only 13 cases of screwworms were confirmed over the entire state of Texas. At the same time, the native fly population is declinig, the production at the mission "fly factory" is reaching new heights. More than 132 million flies were reared, sexually sterilized and distributed by airplane last week.

The most important thing is to take samples so that officials will know where the outbreaks are and can take steps to halt them before the flies can build up to large numbers.
