**FARM and RANCH Notes**

Farmers are continuing to make good returns on their investments in fertilizer here in Knox County. The results of demonstration plots using fertilizer on grain and forage sorghums clearly show each dollar invested returned from \$1.60 to \$8. This is a pretty good return on an investment of only six months.

Stanton Brown, on the League Ranch, conducted fertility demonstrations on both forage sorghum and grain sorghums. Stanton used the best land for cotton so his yields were not too high but note the increase.

The check plot made 1220 lbs. per acre. The part he fertilized with 150 pounds preplant and 50 pounds side dress of ammonium nitrate made 1980 lbs. per acre. Figuring the nitrogen at a cost of .12 per pound of actual nitrogen applied, this gives him a return of \$1.60 for each dollar invested in fertilizer.

In the forage sorghum demonstration Stanton used the Tracey variety. He fertilized with 150 lbs. ammonium nitrate preplant and then added 40 lbs. anhydrous ammonio in the irrigation water. The check plot made 18 tons to the acre and the fertilizer plot made 25 tons. If it were possible to feed these two plots separately, the cattle would also tell them about the difference in feeding value also.

John Earl Nelson of Munday had a more striking example of what fertilizer can do. He had one field in which he applied 125 pounds of ammonium sulfate per acre on half the field. That half made 5200 pounds of grain while the other half without the fertilizer made 3600 pounds. This was a return of \$8.00 for every \$1.00 invested.

Another thing farmers should keep in mind is that the expense of growing the crop comes off the bottom end. So all that can be added to the top is mostly profit.

Rainfall to date this year in Benjamin as recorded in an official rain gauge is 13.25 inches. The average is about 25 inches, so we are somewhat below average for the first eight months.

I have an excellent publication for those who are wondering what variety of wheat, oats, or barley to plant this fall. Bulletin L-578, Recommended Practices for Producing Small Grains in Texas lists the recommended varieties, the acceptable varieties and the disease and plant characteristics of each. No one variety has all the desirable things we would like to see, but a person can weigh one thing against another and decide for instance, whether he wants straw strength or test weight.

Last week was the second straight week in which only 13 cases of screwworms were confirmed over the entire state of Texas. At the same time, the native fly population is declining, the production at the mission "fly factory" is reaching new heights. More than 132 million flies were reared, sexually sterilized and distributed by airplane last week.

The most important thing is to take samples so that officials will know where the outbreaks are and can take steps to halt them before the flies can build up to large numbers.

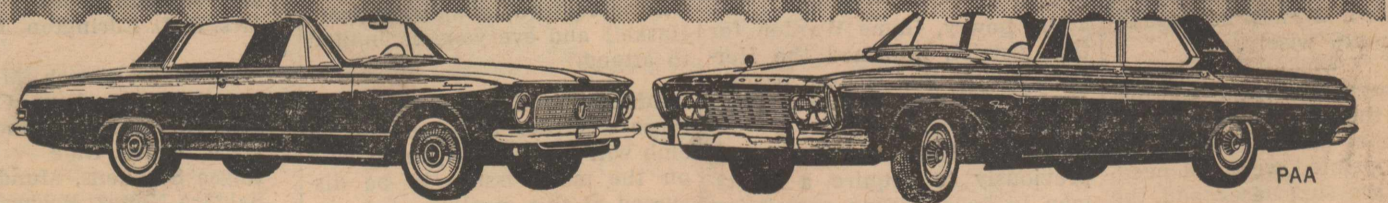

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## IT'S THE LAW in Texas

### COURTROOM DRAMA

We've all seen a great many courtroom dramas in the movies, on the stage or on television. Too many, some may say, but there's no denying the drama to be found in the courtroom.

A theater seat or a comfortable chair in front of the TV screen is the closest many of ever get to a courtroom. It's from such a vantage point that most of our ideas come today about court procedures and how a trial is carried on.

Stage and screen trials normally present only the highlights and take many shortcuts in the interest of brevity and audience appeal. Often an attorney is pictured making objections to the questions and answers as witnesses testify. He makes these objections vehemently, pomposely, or sarcastically—and often in a voice louder than necessary—according to the demands of his role, and depending upon whether he's on the side of the villain or the hero.

The judge then raps for order, and booms out, "sustained," or "overruled," and those of us in the audience usually are at a loss over why he made his decision.

In a real courtroom it's true that attorneys protest against what's being done or said, as a means of assuring a fair trial, and the judge must allow or disallow each objection.

The principals in the real courtroom are just practicing common sense when they follow the "rules of evidence" in placing facts before the judge and jury. If there's to be a fair trial and a just verdict, there must be true facts.

Evidence in the courtroom may take several forms, but two are most common. Answers to questions from a witness under oath are the best-known type of evidence. Exhibits—written rec-

ords, letters, "the murder weapon," and other physical objects having to do with the case—are the next most common. "Depositions," or written statements, from a witness who for some reason is unable to appear personally in court, are sometimes admitted as evidence in certain cases.

Perhaps you've heard: "A trial is not a contest of learning, skill, or tact between lawyers, but a proceeding to find out the truth according to the evidence received and the law as explained by the judge."

That's about the size of it, and that's the way each of us wants it to be if ever we are placed on trial or taken to court for even so much as a speeding ticket.

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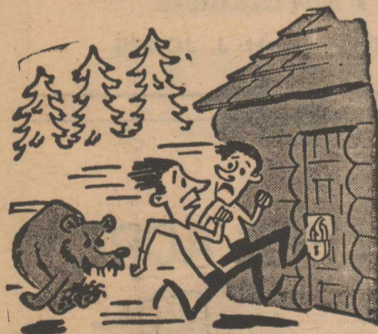

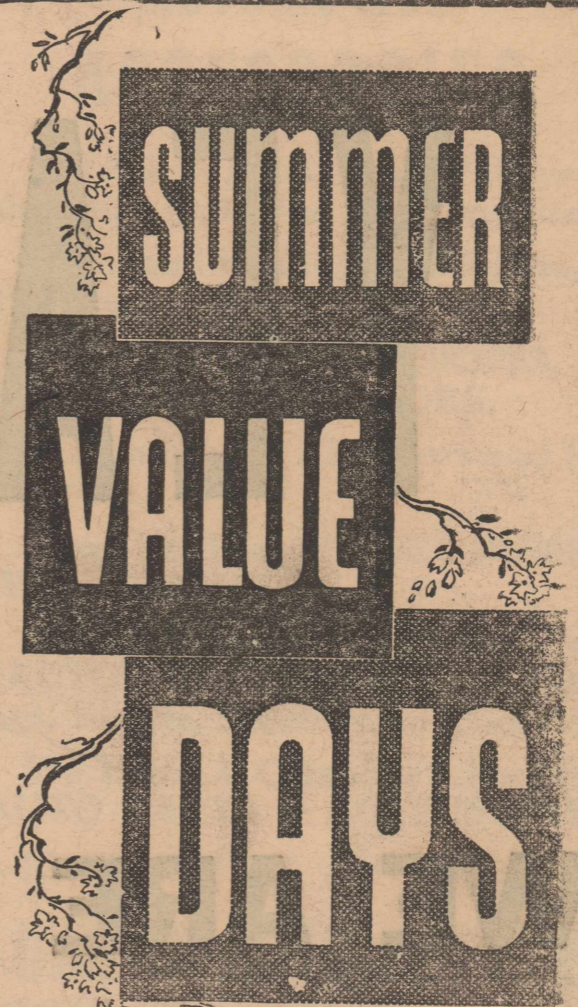

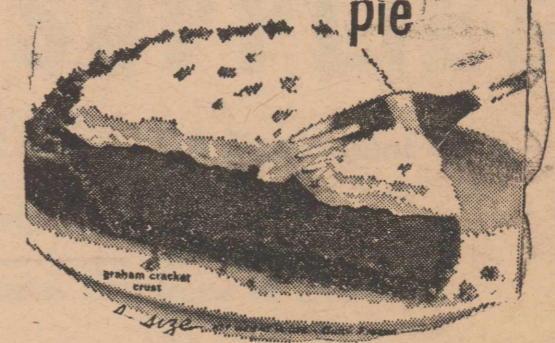
