Open House For **Hospital Planned** For January 12





UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS -A record \$68,300,000 in unemployment compensation benefits was paid by the Texas Employment Commission during the year ending August 31, 1963. This was revealed in a TEC report to Gov. Connally, which failed to appear before a House said the record payment represented a 28 percent increase

During the report period, the number of persons paid state unemployment benefits rose 6 per cent to 271,800, while 79,000 Texas employers covered by the Act contributed two per cent more than during the preceed-

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

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


