## 1964 Feed Grain Benefits Detailed

Growers who participate in the 1964 feed grain program will have definite advantages over growers who elect not to participate, according to O. E. Moore, Chairman Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee.

First, he explained, the participating grower earns a diversion payment for reducing his 1964 acreage of corn, barley, or grain sorghum, thereby assuring himself of a substantial income from the diverted acres regardless of drought, flood, insects, hail, or crop disease.

This is also true of the price support payment which is made on the acreage planted in 1964 to one of more of the three feed grains—no matter what disposition is made of the crop, the price support payment is assured.

Third, price support loans and purchase agreements will be available on a participating farmer's entire 1964 production of the three feed grains.

If the participating farmer requests it, an advance payment of part of the diversion payment will be made at the time of signing up or as soon as possible after that time.

Growers take part in the feed grain program by diverting at least 20 per cent of the farm's feed grain base acreage into an approved conserving use and carrying out other provisions of the program. If more than the minimum acreage is diverted, a higher rate of payment will apply.

The minimum rate of payment is based on one-fifth of the county's total price support rate; the maximum or higher rate is based on one-half of the support rate. Farm operators may file applications to take part in the 1964 feed grain program at the ASCS County Office.

The signup period extends from Feb. 10 through March 27.

AUSTIN—Congressional redistricting is the prime topic of conversation at the state capitol. U. S. Supreme Court shook up officials with a landmark ruling in Georgia's apportionment case. Court proclaimed that congressional districts must be as nearly equal in population as is feasible. On October 19 a federal court in Houston held essentially the same thing in a Texas case. It declared that unless the state Legislature straightens out present unequal districts immediately, all Texas congressmen must run at large (state-wide).

Texas congressmen, state legislators and top state officials are keeping their fingers crossed, as they await the Supreme Court's final decision in the Texas appeal. Main hope is that the court will delay the requirement of at-large elections this year and leave present districts intact since the election process already is under way. This would give the Legislature a chance to draft a redistricting bill in regular session next year.

The principal developments

followed the Georgia case decision:

1. Attorney General Waggoner Carr filed a new brief asking a full hearing of the Texas appeal. He argued that "indescribable chaos and confusion" would result from statewide election of congressmen this year.
2. Gov. John Connally requested a study of redistricting by Texas Legislative Council. Such a study would necessarily include drafting of model bills. (Equal population for Texas' 23 districts would call for 416,000 in each.)
3. Texas congressmen themselves launched plans for special federal legislation to preserve present districts until the regular legislative session in 1965.

Governor Connally has made clear that if the Supreme Court affirms the Houston court ruling, he will call a special session immediately to try and bring some order out of the "indescribable chaos" referred to in Carr's brief.

Whether the Legislature would pass a suitable redistricting bill in a special session is a serious question.

Redistricting issue definitely is going to figure in the governor's race. Connally already has been criticized for not calling the legislators in to work on the problem months ago. Issue also will be raised in some district contests as challengers charge incumbent legislators with failure to handle the matter in the regular session last year.

**NEW HIGHWAY MAPS OUT**—Brand new colorful 1964 official Texas highway maps now are available on request.

Texas Highway Department has made every effort to produce a more readable and convenient map. Type faces are

bolded, and the national standard system of highway symbols has been followed in nearly all instances. Almost 7,000 miles of farm-to-market roads were deleted because of increasing complexity of the Texas highway system. Communities of less than 250 are not shown.

New map includes Ranch Road No. 1. It's the four-mile loop in Gillespie County leading from U. S. 290 to the ranch home of President Lyndon Johnson.

Free maps may be obtained from the Travel and Information Division of the Highway Department in Austin.

**OIL ALLOWABLE**—Railroad Commission ordered prorated oil wells to continue on a 25 per cent of capacity allowable in March. But even though February production at 29 per cent averaged an estimated 2,557,662 daily production, and although March will contain two more days than the 29-day February, production will be less.

Commission's staff predicted production will be down about 6,000 barrels a day. Reason, according to some members of the oil industry, is that increased production from new wells is more than offset by under production from old wells.

**GARNER PARK SAFE**—Executive Director J. Weldon Watson of the State Parks and Wildlife Department dispelled the rumors that Garner State Park at Uvalde will be closed. He said Garner is the most-used in the state parks system, and there is no thought of closing it.

Parks and Wildlife Commission announced that plans and specifications are being developed for extensive improvements at Davis Mountains State Park.

**HIGHER EDUCATION**—Governor Connally's Committee on Education Beyond the High School held the first of a series of closed-door sessions in which it hopes to produce a policy recommendation on higher education by August 31.

Chairman H. B. Zachry of San Antonio said the most debated issue at this meeting was the need for a single strong coordinating authority for all public higher education in Texas.

**WATER PROJECTS SPURRED**—State Water Development Board approved an \$8,200,000 loan and a \$2,100,000 purchase agreement for Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, which covers Childress, Quanah, Clarendon, Crowell and Hedley.

Green Belt authorities hope to gain a peaceful settlement of notices of appeal filed by Collingsworth Water Conservation District No. 1 and the W. J. Lewis estate, which owns most of the land which would be covered by the proposed Green Belt reservoir.

Water Development Board also approved a master agreement with the Sabine River Authority for purchase of an undivided interest in storage of the Toledo Bend Reservoir for \$15,000,000.

On the same day, W. E. "Buck" Tinsley of Austin was appointed chairman of the board by Governor Connally. Tinsley has been acting chairman for several months since the resignation of Marvin Nichols of Ft. Worth.

**DISTRIBUTIVE EDUCATION**—Texas Education Agency said it expects more than 800 high school students from around the state to gather in San Antonio on February 28-29 for the 18th Annual Youth Leadership Conference of Distributive Education Clubs.

"Distributive Education" is a plan wherein high school students attend class in the mornings, and put their knowledge to practice in afternoon jobs.

**TOURIST SPENDING IN TEXAS TOPS RECORD**—Tourist spending in Texas climbed to \$532,000,000 last year, breaking all previous records.

To help keep the tourist dollars rolling in, Texas Tourist Development announced invitations to 36 leading travel writers to take a 1600-mile tour of points of interest in the state. Tour will take them to Six Flags Over Texas, the LBJ Ranch, San Marcos' Aquarena, San Antonio, Hill Country guest ranches, Corpus Christi, Padre Island, McAllen, Reynosa, East Texas parks and forests, Lufkin, Nacogdoches, Houston, and NASA's Manned Spacecraft Center.

Attorney general has ruled that the Agency may use its funds to advertise by radio, television, billboards and other media, as well as newspapers and magazines. While it can use newspapers and magazines of national circulation only, no such limitation applies to selection of radio, television or billboards.

## VETERANS

### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

**Q**—If a veteran has named his mother as beneficiary of his insurance and then marries and has children, will his new family or his mother receive the insurance money in case he dies?

**A**—The VA is required by law to pay the insurance proceeds to the designated beneficiary. In this case, the insurance money would go to his mother.

**Q**—How much time remains for Korean War veterans to get educational benefits from the Veterans Administration?

**A**—The educational provisions of the so-called Korean GI Bill expire for all on January 31, 1965. Thus about one year remains to take advantage of that provision.

**Q**—I read that a person worked for the VA for more than 40 years. Yet the VA wasn't formed until 1930. Explain this.

**A**—Originally, there were several organizations that served veterans in various ways. One of the earliest of these was the Bureau of Pensions. Another was the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers. The Bureau of War Risk Insurance originally insured wartime shipping but later took over service to veterans. Several of these groups were combined into the Veterans Bureau in 1921, and this new organization was combined with the other groups to form the Veterans Administration in 1930.

**SUGHT**—A San Antonio lawmaker, Rep. Jake Johnson, has called on executive committees of both Democratic and Republican parties to submit to a May 2 vote whether sale of mixed drinks should be legalized.

Come what may with the referendum (which would have no binding effect), Johnson plans to try again in the Legislature next year—if he is re-elected—to pass a local option bill permitting open sale of liquor over the bar.

Party spokesmen had little comment to make on the referendum proposal beyond noting that both executive committees are due to meet here on March 9. A horse race betting vote was taken on petition in 1962—and the issue defeated.

Plans are now complete for the Medical Self-Help Short-course which will begin Monday night, March 2. The course will be taught at Munday, Knox City and alternately between Benjamin, Vera, Gilliland and Truscott.

The meetings will run simultaneously at each location on March 2, 3, 9, 10, and 16. The lessons will be staggered to enable the instructors to teach at all three places. All meetings will begin at 7:30 p.m.

There are eleven lessons in the course but they will be taught in five lessons.

This course was developed by the Department of Public Health Department of Civil Defense and the American Medical Association. Dr. C. G. Markward, County Health Doctor, has given permission for the course to be given here, as well as the County Civil Defense Director, Judge L. A. Parker.

This course was developed because authorities realize that in a national disaster, doctors will be unavailable for the majority of people.

This course does not attempt to make doctors out of anyone, but gives instructions on what not to do until medical attention is possible. This information could be useful to anyone at anytime in case of tornadoes or accidents.

The lessons and the instructors are as follows:

Lesson No. 1 — Radioactive Fallout and Shelter—Joe Doby, County Agent; No. 2—Healthful Living in Emergencies — Ulric Lea, Knox City, Soil Conservation Service; 3—Artificial Respiration — Leon Bivins, Benjamin, Texas Highway Department first aid instructor; No. 4—Bleeding and Bandaging—Mrs. Jesse George Smith, Munday, Registered Nurse; No. 5 — Fractures and Splinting — Charles McCauley, Munday, Ambulance Service; 6 —Transportation of the Injured —Paul Clayton, Knox City, Ambulance Service; 7 — Burns and Lesson 8 on Shock — Dr. Tommy Gage, Dentist, Munday; No. 9 — Nursing Care of the Sick and Injured — Mrs. Alton Fitzgerald, Knox City, County Health Nurse; 10 — Infant and Child Care, Mrs. Rae Carter, Vera, Registered Nurse; 11 — Emergency Childbirth — Mrs. Jesse George Smith, Munday, Registered Nurse.

### IT'S THE LAW in Texas

#### THE NINE

The Chief Justice of the United States heads the Supreme Court, but except for presiding and a few ceremonial duties, his work is much like that of the other justices. In fact his vote on a decision counts only as one.

In ceremonies, he leads when the justices walk in a procession. As a rule, he gives the oath to the President at his inauguration. Should a President be impeached, he presides at the Senate hearings.

Of the associate justices, only one, Samuel Chase (1796 to 1811) has been impeached, that is, accused of a wrong for which the Senate could remove him. Chase did lack "judicial temperament," he made political speeches and denounced the President from the bench. But such things are not crimes. His impeachment failed. The Senate would not remove him from office.

man will become a just, honest, and able justice of the Supreme Court? What are his legal qualifications?

None: The Constitution sets no formal requirements. He does not have to be a lawyer, though all of them have been. The President may name any one he chooses; and, with U. S. Senate approval, he goes on the bench.

But the informal qualifications of a justice of the Supreme Court are great. For a seat in the U. S. Supreme Court is a lawyer's highest honor.

Before a person goes on that high bench, should anyone doubt of his character or learning, the Senate holds hearings and can refuse to confirm this appointment. And this has happened.

And then it is up to the President to name another and another, until the Senate confirms his nominee. The Senate cannot nominate its own candidate; it can only approve or disapprove the President's.
