**Feed Grain Program Benefits Livestock** Men, Says Department Of Agriculture

Committee, said today. "The simplest way to put it," the chairman stated, "is to say that production on acreage diverted under the 1961, 1962, and 1963 feed grain programs would have been large enough - if half were fed to hogs and half to beef cattle-to increase the average annual production of hogs by one-fourth and the weight of beef cattle slaughtered by about the same amount.

This could have resulted only in reduced prices for livestock products and lower incomes for livestock producers.

"Or, if the programs had not been in effect, stocks would have increased about 40 million tons instead of dropping about 20 million tons from the 85-million total on hand when the diversion programs went into effect.

Government storage costs probably would have increased sharply. In making this estimate, full consideration has been given to increased utilization which yields, these acres would have would have been encouraged by the low feed prices associated in the county by about 641.495 with pre-1961 programs."

Explaining his statement, Mr. Moore said that acreage diverted under the 1961, 1962, and 1963 programs totaled about 78 million acres—an acreage which almost surely would have been planted if there had been no feed grain diversion program.

This would have been enough to feed out more than 165 million hogs to a top market weight of 210 pounds, or to add between 43 and 44 billion pounds of liveweight to beef cattle.

> An increase in hog numbers would have come quickly with larger supplies and accompanying low corn prices, the chairman pointed out. And if only one-half the possible production from the diverted acres had been fed to hogs, even if spread over several years, the market -as any hog man knows-would have been severely depressed.

It takes longer for cattle numbers to increase, but after a few years-as the case in the late 1950's-larger feed supplies and low feed prices would have been followed by sharply reduced beef prices.

In Knox County, approximately 25,520 acres were diverted from the production of feed grains under the programs of the past three years. At average increased feed grain production bushels.

For the 1963-64 marketing year -it is estimated that use will be approximately equal to production. In view of the excellent growing weather and record yields in 1963, the chairman explained, the very fact that there will be no big increase in carryover stocks this year proves the effectiveness of the feed grain orogram

Reminding farmers that the signup in the 1964 feed grain program is now under way in the ASCS County office, the chairman said that a good signup this year, with normal weath er conditions, will hold production to a level that will permit a further reduction in stocks next year. The signup extends thru March 27.



> Farmers still have until approximately March 15, to topdress their small grain with nitrogen. The greatest need of the small grain plant for nitrogen begins with the jointing stage and ends with the soft dough ties in 50 counties extending stage.
