Cotton Classing Offices To 'Mike' **All Samples**

With micronaire readings now required on each bale of cotton that enters the government's loan program, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Abilene Cotton Classing Office is prepared to run "Mike" readings on all samples of classes, reports B. B. Manley, Jr., chairman of the office.

The Mike fee will be 6 cents per sample during the 1964-65 season, if application for the service is made by the ginner prior to submitting samples, Manly says; otherwise, it will cost 25 cents per sample. Last year the fee was 8 cents. All ginners have received ap-

olication forms for the service. Samples will be miked at the same time they are classed for grade and staple under the Smith-Doxey Act, administered by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service. Micronaire or "Mike" read-

ings determine and describe the fineness and maturity of cotton fibers. In making the test, an air-flow instrument measures the amount of compressed air that passes through a 50-grain sample. Coarse fibers permit more air to pass through, so the finer the fiber, the lower the Mike reading.

Mike readings will be report ed, in a scale that ranges from 2.4 to 8.0, on the green Classification Card, right along with grade and staple.

Ginners who do not apply for the Mike service will continue to get their cotton classed free for grade and staple, as before.

Mike describes fineness and maturity of cotton fibers. It's measured on a scale from 2.4 to works like this: When compressment registers the Mike reading of that particular sample. Fine fibmers permit less air to the fibers, the lower the reading. Fineness and maturity affect the spinnability and value of the cotton.

About six weeks ago, USDA announced that Mike readings will be required for all upland cotton that goes under pricesupport loan.

Included in the announcement was scheduled of premiums and discounts, based on Mike readings. If the reading is between 3.7 and 4.8, a premium of 13 points per pound will be allowed when the cotton is placed under loan. No premium or discount will be allowed if the Mike reading is 4.9 through 5.1, or between 3.3 through 3.6. Discounts from 10 to 300 points will apply if readings are outside these measurements.

Sports enthusiast in the fam-Sports enthusiast in the family? A good sport keeps his gear in topflight shape. From back yard to boat, pine oil cleaners and disinfectants go to work at cleanup jobs for the sportsman, dissolving grease and banishing dirt with a whisk of the sponge.

Here's how:

Here's how:
BOATING — The best boatkeepers hold cleaning tools to a minimum: scrub brush, wet mop, plastic bucket, sponges, an all-purpose pine oil cleaner, paper towels, an all-purpose wax and polish. Areas where pine oil keeps a boat shipshape are decks, galley, head, plastic up-holstery — and bottom and topside scrubbing to keep boat free

of grime and marine growth. FISHING — Bait boxes, pots, and pans — everything fishy should get a pine cleaner bath. If you're cooking the catch, your kitchen will be a lot more fragrant if you dump the pans from fish cookery into the sink immediately after cooking. Then mediately after cooking. Then, while you're eating the prize catch of the season, soak the pans in warm water with a little pine oil cleaner in it. Rinse

TENNIS - Increase tennis ball life and refurbish the nap by tossing tennis balls into the washing machine with the regwashing machine with the reg-ular wash. Visored caps can be cleaned best with an old tooth-brush and a pine oil cleaner solution. After brushing, go over the cap with a clean damp sponge and dry it in the sun. To prevent warping, keep your racket in the press when not in use.
