

STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of

the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:


"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the fund to any other purpose for the length of time as rewhatever; nor shall the same, quired by the Constitution and or any part thereof ever be laws of this State.



JURY DUTY

Jury duty is an experience everybody ought to have.

In a criminal case twelve jurperament, character, education, available for trees. and their experience in the world and in the question at stake.

It does not make the law—the legislature does; and the judge "charges" or instructs the jury concerning the law applicable to the particular case it is considering.

The judge will tell you not to find the accused guilty until he is proved so under strict rules of evidence. If you have any "reasonable doubt" — not imaginary or far-fetched - ac quit the accused.

Civil cases do not demand a moral certainty, merely the "preponderance" of what you regard as reliable and believable evidence.

Blisters Merits Closer Attention Dr. J. E. Peavy, Says

A blister could well be called the modern version of the mythical Achilles heel.

Much as Achilles—the Greek ideal of youth, strength, beauty, and valor, was fatally wounded by an arrow piercing his vulnerable heel, a tiny blister can spoil a game of golf or tennis or even a whole vacation.

The blister merits closer attention than we usually grant it. And the admonitions which apply to our athletes also are sound tips for the millions of week end and vacation athletes.

A blister is caused by pressure and friction on a localized ing your fun or vacation. area of the skin. Fluid collects between the inner and outer layers of skin. If pressure is continued, it hurts. Even if no infection follows, the pain can cause a limp that isn't much fun for the golfer or hiker, and it can upset the customary grip on Band practice for the High a tennis racket, golf club, oar or canoe paddle.

> Wearing two pairs of socks, a lightweight pair under sweat socks, is recommended for athletics. Hands can be protected by taping or by special sports

A decision on whether or not to puncture a bilster is based on location, size, and inflammation. If there are signs of inflammation or irritation, medical attention is indicated. Sometimes it is advisable to puncture a blister before it breaks from friction. Wash the area with soap and water and sterilize with alcohol. The puncture is made with a sharp needle held in a forceps (small pliers) and steriliged in a flame. The puncture is made at the side of the blister and the outer skin layer is left in place as a protective

Attention to cleanliness in dealing with blisters cannot be over stressed. Infected blisters require prompt medical attention, as do the occasional blisters from severe sunburn or other burn causes.


