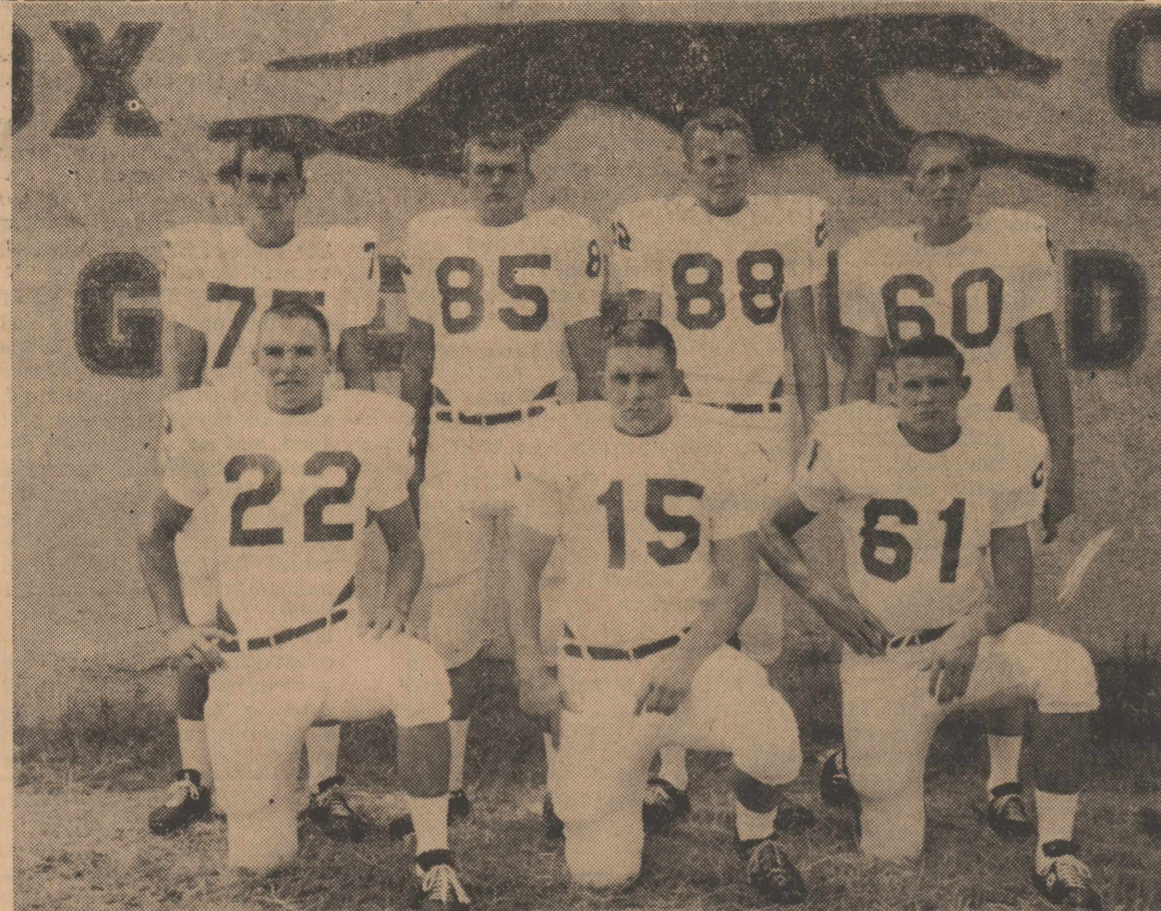

Lions Paul Clayton and Otis Cash were program chairmen this week and Clayton introduced Darland to the group.

Darland introduced Jim Bateman and Oneal Weaver, his assistants.

Bateman has assisted the past two years, having practiced teaching the first year and last year taught in the high school and was junior high football coach, and will remain in that capacity this year.

Darland introduced Weaver as "a classmate in Midwestern and one of the greatest basketball players ever to attend."

Weaver came here recently from Wichita Falls and prior to his move there was a semi-pro with the Louisiana AAU team.

Mrs. Weaver will teach, also, and, Coach Darland quipped, "I don't know what happened to him but he has THREE girls."

Coach Weaver will teach both boys and girls basketball.

After a brief report on coaching school Darland said the KC team had had two full days of practice workouts and that he had heard Henrietta had 59 boys working out this week, "and we had 23," the coach said.

Darland said Henrietta and Archer City were the "big guns" and Crowell the "dark horse."

## City Council Meets In Special Session -- Chief Of Police Hester Resigns

Knox City's City Council had a called meeting Tuesday night with all members present. Mayor Buddy Angle opened the called session with Aldermen Paul Clayton, Jesse James, Kenneth Lawson, Mrs. O. L. Jamison and Otis Cash. Meeting with the council was Chief of Police J. J. (Pug) Hester.

"The meeting has been called at the request of Mr. Hester," Mayor Angle told the group.

The chief of police said he had a letter of resignation he wanted to submit to the council . . . "if we can't come to some terms I will hand in my resignation." City Secretary John Robinson read the following letter to the council, a copy of which was submitted the Herald for publication:

"Dear Gentlemen and Mrs. Jamison:

"I have had the pleasure and honor to have served the citizens of Knox City for over four years. However, at present there appears the possibility that I am not doing what it is expected of me.

"When I began as Chief of Police I thought I should enforce the law to preserve the peace and dignity of the community. By this I mean to enforce the law to protect the citizens. I have not, nor would I enforce the law to its absolute 'letter.' I think the law is for the protection of the public. How foolish would I appear if I issued a ticket to every person who jaywalked the street?"

"As your Chief of Police I have tried to learn the 'thugs' of the communities around Knox City, and a very few here. (sic) I have done my best to keep these people from hanging around Knox City and being a menace to our children. With God as my witness I wanted to make this entire town safe for your daughters and children to go anywhere in this community and know that they would not in any manner be molested by the dangerous element. I think I have done this.

"As your Chief of Police I have never been a user of intoxicants, and the only lady in my life has been my own patient wife. I think this is what you wanted and it is my way of life.

"As your Chief of Police I have made every effort to protect your property from thieves. My record will show less theft than ever before. Breakins in Knox City are nil.

"In total I have tried to do as stated above. If my presence has prevented one automobile wreck where your child or mine might have died . . . if my presence here has stopped one insulting remark toward your daughter from some drunk or out of town thug . . . if my presence here has stopped one child from being run over by a speeding automobile, then I can feel that the years and continuous hours, have been spent well.

"I am not so ignorant but to realize that I have made some mistakes. For the mistakes that I have made, I now offer my apology. I am sorry too, that I cannot quickly adjust to the ever changing ideas of the elected and changing council of our fine community, but the law does not rapidly change, and each peace officer has his own way of achieving the end that I hope to have been successful in.

"This letter has been prompted by outright comments that the council intended to fire me, and this I could not tolerate. It would be greatly appreciated if you would call a meeting to either accept or deny this, my resignation, effective . . . 1964, and I would happily invite the public to hear whether or not you as a council will give me a recommendation as an officer for future reference.

Respectfully submitted, "J. J. Hester."

Hester asked for additional time to speak before the council voted and permission was granted.

Hester said there were two or three members of the council who were out to "get" him and that he wasn't going to put up with it.

"If I have done anything wrong I want to know about it," he said.

Mayor Angle said the old board had asked him to get him (Pug) to trade at various business establishments. "That was the first thing we asked you to do when I first started on the board," Angle said, "and you wouldn't do that."

The chief said that wasn't so that he traded all over town.

"That was after we had to pass an ordinance or refuse to pay your bills," Angle said.

Hester again said two or three were out to get rid of him. When asked to name them he pointed to Angle, Kenneth Lawson and Paul Clayton.

He accused the board of "hiding on corners and alleys" talking behind his back.

One member of the board spoke up to say this was not true and that their only concern was for the betterment of and wishes of the people of the city.

The board mentioned that a petition had been circulated to get rid of him last year.

Over a hundred names was signed by citizens of this town, he was told.

"I saw that list and there was not anyone on it that amounted to much . . . why don't you go to some really good citizens here and ask about me," Hester replied.

Angle said the board hadn't asked anyone for their opinion that the board had been presented a petition and hadn't acted on it.

Other complaints against the chief had been for using the city car for personal reasons and for out of county use.

The board said that after he had been asked to leave the car in the city limits, he had driven it to Paducah to attend the rodeo.

Hester said riding in the city seven days a week was too tiring and that he had to get out of town occasionally.

The board said they had no objections to his leaving the city limits or county if in the line of duty but objected to him leaving it otherwise.

Hester said there was fewer speeders and law violators now than ever before. He said he had "broke the kids from speeding" and that the town was safe due to his efforts.

Mrs. Jamison said she had studied the situation over and had only recently made up her mind . . . "I do not believe you have to break the children from anything," she said, "I have always associated 'breaking' to mean to break a mule or horse."

She continued that it was her belief that the young folks, if they were violating the law, could be talked to in a courteous manner.

Mrs. Jamison said there had not been any "back alley" meetings to get rid of the chief of police and that as for herself her only interest was for the betterment of the city.

Paul Clayton made a motion, seconded by Kenneth Lawson to accept J. J. Hester's resignation as chief of police.

A secret ballot was called and the vote was four for accepting his resignation and one was against the action.

The council made the resignation effective immediately, and granted Hester a two weeks paid vacation.

Otis Cash made a motion, seconded by Jesse James that the meeting be adjourned.

All voted in favor of the motion.

Five men were mentioned as having applied for Hester's job, but no action was taken and discussion was kept to a minimum.

Applicants will be interviewed at a later date the council informed the Herald.

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

All available money and manpower of the Texas Water Commission is being dedicated to a long-range state water master plan.

Gov. John Connally authorized the agency to transfer money already appropriated by the Legislature for other purposes. Existing state plans, in Connally's opinion, "fall short of satisfying the water needs for all of Texas."

In 1961, the Commission produced a plan for meeting Texas water needs to the year 1980. Both the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation and the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, are coming up with their own long-range plans covering parts of Texas. They propose conversion of water from surplus areas like the Sabine to water-shy areas like the Nueces.

Connally said the federal government is considering a water pollution control bill which would supplant state authority in the field.

He urged the commission to explore "all reasonable alternatives," including those contained in preliminary reports of U.

S. Agencies.

The Governor indicated he will authorize other state agencies to cooperate in the crash program. He also pledged his help in any way possible and to recommend to the Legislature "necessary funds to fulfill this important responsibility."

**STIFF GUN LAW URGED**—Pressure from prosecuting attorneys is beginning to sift through to legislative candidates who are being urged to pass a gun registration law during the 1965 session in an attempt to reduce the crime rate and help police solve crimes.

Latest of the recommendations along this line comes from Dallas' District Attorney Henry Wade. Gun registration is on the list of the most-controversial issues a legislature can tackle and proposals on the subject frequently are skirted.

**TEXTBOOK PROTESTS PILE UP**—About 500 individual letters and 39 petitions bearing some 3,398 signatures concerning three high school biology books have been received by Gov. Connally, Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar, and the State Board of Education.

And more are arriving every day.

Most protestors claim three of the eight biology books being considered for public school adoption by the State Textbooks Committee to review, since Connally, Edgar and the state board have no say on textbooks selection.

The 15-member committee has the task of picking five books each in 18 subjects from the 226 books under consideration. Public will then have an opportunity to make formal complaints about the biology texts, as well as any others which are considered "objectionable," before the committee's selection list is submitted to individual school districts.

**DROUTH AID**—Sen. Ralph Yarborough announced here that 23 countries will qualify for drouth aid under two federal programs.

Eligible for emergency loans through the Farmers Home Administration are Brazoria, Dallas, Dawson, Falls, Gonzales, Hardin, Hartley, Jefferson, Lavaca, Navarro, Wharton and Wilson counties.

Eligible for haying and grazing privileges until October 31, under a U. S. Agriculture Department program are Collin, Dallas, Donley, Eastland, Freestone, Jones, Rockwall, Rush, San Augustine, Scurry, and Taylor counties.

**SALES TAX RAISE SUGGESTED**—A Texas State Teachers Association spokesman last week suggested the Legislature raise additional funds for education through increasing the sales tax rate or removing present exemptions.

L. P. Sturgeon, TSTA public relations director, said a half cent increase would raise \$50,000,000 a year and an across-the-board amendment another \$61,000,000. TSTA is driving for a \$45 a month increase in teachers' pay.

If Texans paid the same amount of taxes as citizens of neighboring states, argued Sturgeon, Texas would have enough money for public school and higher education improvements.

**NEW RANGER NAMED**—Toliver H. Dawson of Del Rio was named a Texas Ranger by Department of Public Safety Director Homer Garrison Jr.

Dawson, who first served as a highway patrolman at Alpine, will be stationed in the Carizozo Springs area. He succeeds the late Wiley Williamson of Gozales on the 62-man force.

**SHRIMPERS REMINDED OF DEADLINES**—Texas shrimpers were reminded by the State Parks and Wildlife Agency of the August 15 opening of the shrimp season in coastal bays. Also called to their attention was the August 31, deadline for renewing commercial licenses.

September 1 to August 15 has been designated as the Fall shrimping season in Sabine Lake.

A new regulation to prevent bait shrimp from being sold on the commercial food market also was announced for Gulf Waters of Jefferson and Orange counties.

**HUNTING 'ON THE CUFF'**—Almost one out of every three Texans hunt "on the cuff," or without having to buy a license, according to J. Weldon Watson, executive director for the Parks and Wildlife Dept.

**AIRPORT FUNDS**—Atty. General Waggoner Carr advised the Texas Aeronautics Commission's director, Frank W. Raymond Jr., that the Legislature could amend the State law to authorize the State to appropriate funds to incorpo-

rated cities for construction of airports and navigated facilities without violating the construction.

Commission is expected to seek a legislative sponsor for this type of bill.

**SHORT SNORTS**—Gov. Connally reports that 531 Historical Markers will be erected along State highways during the next 30 months.

Attorney General Carr says his office won 320 cases, lost three, and disposed of 58 in some other manner during the month of July.

State General Revenue fund was \$22,500,000 on the black side of the ledger at the end of July, reports State Treasurer Jesse James.

Governor Connally proclaimed Sept. 13-19 as "Women Voters Week."

H. D. Stewart Jr., of Big Spring and Ed Tobla of Houston were appointed to the State Board of Barber examiners by Governor Connally.

An application for a charter to Connroe Bank and Trust Co., has been filed with the State Banking Board.

Governor Connally is visiting the Mexican border states of Tamaulipas, Nuevo Leon, Chihuahua, and Coahuila this week.

Texas Highway Dept. reports that 9,161 persons visited the new Capitol Tourist Information Center in the Capitol during its first month of operation.

## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6** proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

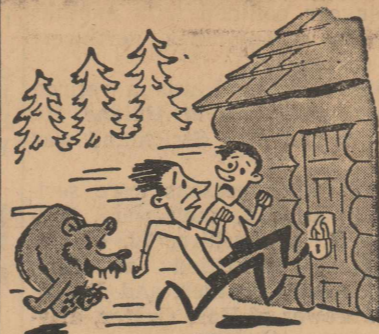

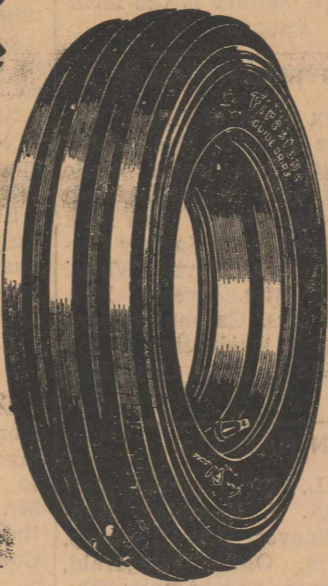

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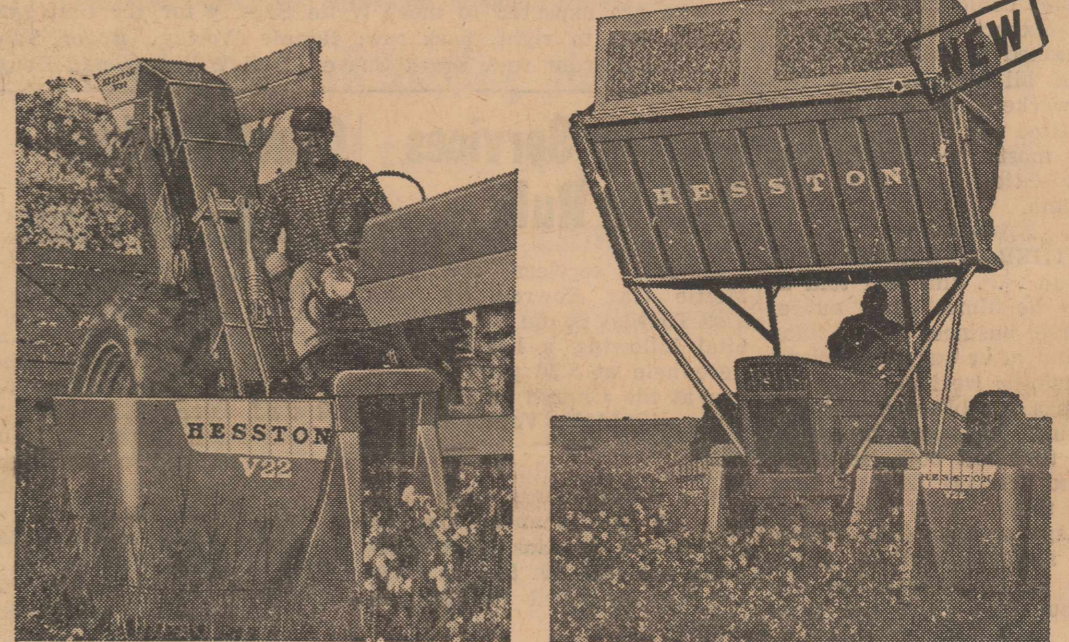

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**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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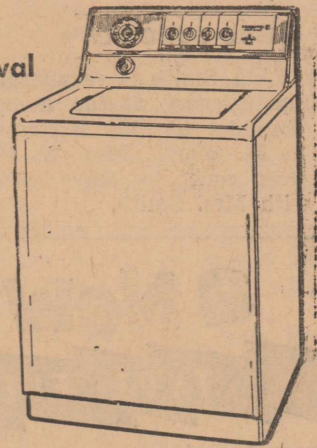
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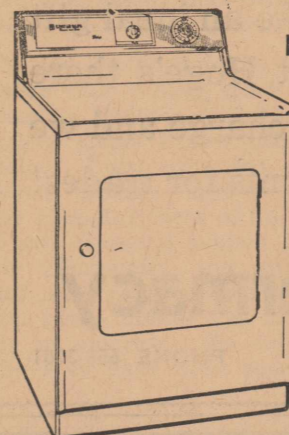

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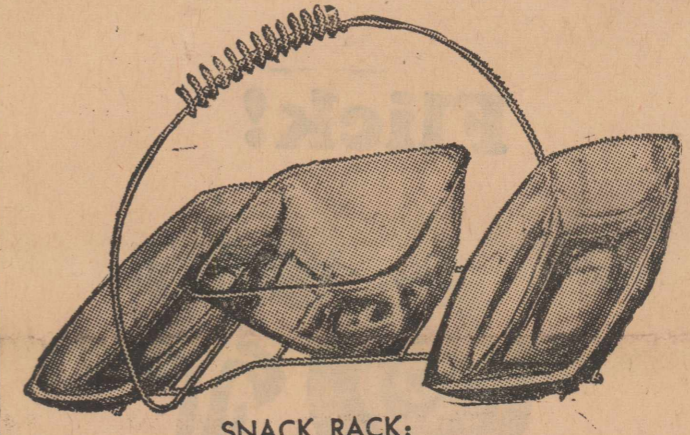

## VFD Proposes Rate Hike On Meters

The bi-monthly of the Volunteer Fire Department was held at the Fire Hall last Thursday night. Twenty-five members were present to hear the report from Johnny Vinita and Jack Land on their respective schools they attended in Austin the week of August 3-7.

Firemen Vinita presented the following from notes taken at the Fire Department Officers Training Course. Total enrollment in his class was sixty-three. In Jack Land's Fire Marshall Course, 250. Total enrollment in the entire school was 1,823 from 465 towns in Texas. Other states in the Southwest were represented.

Basically the courses of study pursued were designed to give these men more of an insight on ways and means to function more efficiently. More basic courses were offered to men who had little or no prior experience in the Fire Department.

Our fire trucks are subject to the same Safety Inspections as any other vehicle of its type. The driver of the truck must have at least a Commercial Drivers License.

Johnny brings to the City and its Citizens a proposal that merits thought. This proposal is presently employed in Cities and towns throughout the state with a populace of less than 6,000. In order to make the Fire Department self-sustaining, these cities have levied a 50 cent additional rate on all water meters. This in Knox City would mean an income of about \$300.00 per month, thereby, allowing the Fire Department to make necessary payments on the new fire truck and have additional money to maintain their equipment in the needed manner. The payments on the truck alone run about \$200.00 a month. While the amount required of each individual would seem small, it would allow the City of Knox City to utilize three-hundred dollars a month in maintaining City obligations.

At the present time the City is taking from their tax money the expenses of the Fire Department. In other words the Fire Department could pay for their new truck and when the time comes to retire the old truck, the FD will be able to trade for their own truck.

This would be a "perpetual" arrangement and a needed boost to the City of Knox City and all it encompasses.

The VFD heartily recommends to the Citizens of Knox City that they adopt this proposal. They ask that you contact your City Councilman and voice your opinion on this matter.

## IT'S THE LAW in Texas

### KNIGHTHOOD STILL IN FLOWER

David heard a woman scream as he was walking home. Upon investigation he found Pete Pucher beating a woman. The woman, who was Pete's wife, was bleeding badly.

David immediately separated the parties, wrestled Pete to the ground, and held him there while a friend called the police. In the struggle David's clothes were badly torn.

Later David sued Pete for the damage to his clothes which were torn in the struggle.

"Who does he think he is?" asked Pete. "This guy comes in and starts fighting me while I'm having a discussion with my wife, and now he has the gall to sue me for his clothes that got torn. He had no business butting into our family discussion."

"It looks to me as if he was

going to kill that woman," said David. "All I did was try to stop a fight. Besides, I didn't hurt him. I just held him until the police got there."

Does David have the right to make Pete pay for his clothing in this case?

Yes, said a New York court in a recent decision. The court, quoting Justice Cardozo, stated that danger invites rescue. The cry of distress is the summons to relief. The law does not ignore these reactions of the mind in tracing conduct to its consequences. It recognizes them as normal. The wrong that imperils life is not only a wrong to the imperiled victim, it is also a wrong to his rescuer. The risk of rescue, if only it be not wanton, is born of the occasion.

In this case David committed no crime. His actions were nothing more than could be expected from a reasonable person under the circumstances. No public interest can be served by a rule which would deter one person from coming to the aid of a fellow citizen who is in imminent danger of personal injury at the hands of assailants.

David won the case. (Based upon a recent New York court decision.)

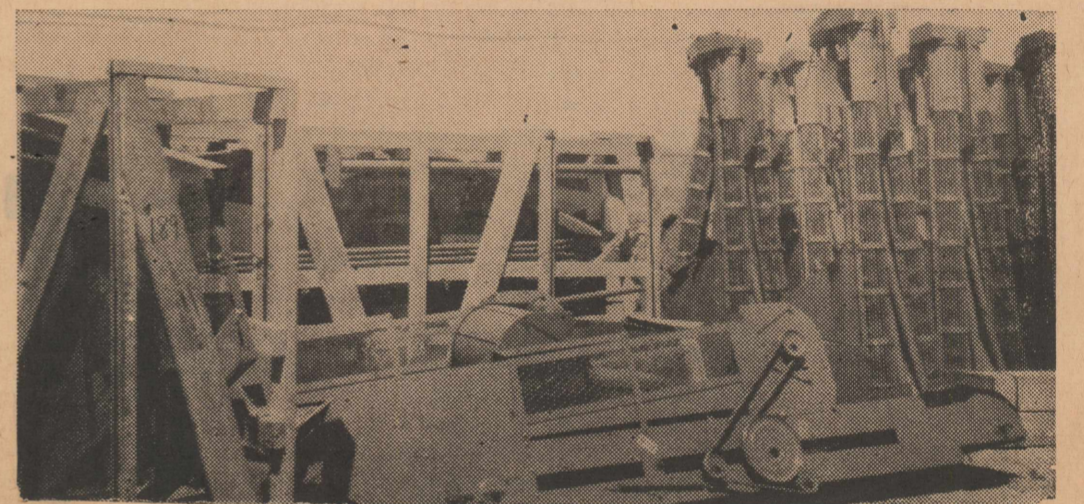

Arsenic Acid has received tentative approval for use as a cotton desiccant again this year. The Food and Drug Administration gave the approval on July 21, subject to a 30 day protest period. So the final approval should be made on Friday, Aug. 21.

Excessive applications to speed up defoliation is not recommended. Neither should the desiccant be applied before at least 75 per cent of the cotton is open. This will eliminate any possibility of excessive residues in the cotton seed and cotton seed

products. Do not exceed one and one-half quarts per acre. Defoliants: There will be no change in the chemicals used as true defoliants to prepare cotton for machine picking in 1964 from those used last year. Therefore, the same information given in the 1963 leaflet L-145 "Cotton Defoliation Guide for Texas," will apply for 1964 with regard to true defoliants for spindle picking.

"Penta" has not received approval for use as a desiccant at this date.

The following are excerpts from the Western Livestock Roundup prepared and sent each month by the Extension Livestock Marketing Specialist, Ed Uvacek, Jr.

Beef prices increased sharply in June, in the face of high slaughter. July prices held most or all of those gains even though cattle slaughter in the first three weeks of July continued to run far above year earlier levels. Much of this slaughter may have been non-fed steers, heifers and cows. Weights generally continue below a year ago.

Decreased fed cattle marketings from second to third quarter, lighter average slaughter weights than a year ago, lower beef imports, government purchases of beef, lower pork production, and the increase in population and consumer demand should hold fed cattle prices close to present levels into the fall.

Many wholesale markets exceed year earlier prices for a brief time in June. Beef prices slid off a little in July at most Western markets. Omaha, Chicago, and New York prices showed some further increase in July. San Francisco and Los Angeles were closer to 1963 prices in March-July than other markets.

As the end of July approached all markets had moved back down from the late June level,

but were still considerably above May and early June lows. Wholesale prices of choice beef in late July were still \$2-\$4 below 1963 levels.

Price rises for fed cattle have developed in each of the last four summers. The rise in 1961 began in early August, and hit a peak about the middle of the month. In 1962, the rise started in July. It continued up until September from Denver east, but west coast prices showed less of a rise. In 1963, a sharp rise took place in July, but did not last long. This year the price rise came in June. Much of the gain has been held and many markets were \$2-\$3 above the low point in May. Portland and California markets have been closer to year ago levels than other markets.

The price of lower grades of cattle did not increase as much in June as Prime and Choice grade cattle. Cow prices actually declined from May through June and July. Cow slaughter is up from a year ago. Grass fed steer and heifer slaughter probably is up more than any other category.

Slaughter of steers and heifers during the first half of this year has been high—and live imports have been 200,000 head less than in January-June of '63. Even so, numbers were up enough last January so there are more steers and heifers on hand than a year ago that are not yet on feed. Feeder cattle marketings this fall are expected to be larger than a year ago. This year's calf crop is also up over 1963, but only by about 800,000 head.

Beef cow numbers have continued to increase. This probably will continue in the Western and Plains states until a change is forced by weather and feed supplies.

Strengthening factors: Excess capacity in feedlots Slightly higher fed cattle prices

Lower imports of live cattle Weakening Factors: Large supply of feeder animals

Poor prospects for summer and fall grass in some areas of the West

Higher prices for feed grains and roughage

Pessimistic attitude of cattle feeders and bankers.
