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

FARM and RANCH

JOE W. DOBY COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

Farmers have until Septem ber 30 to apply for Federal Gas Tax refund for gasoline used on a farm for farming purposes. This should also include gasoline used by a custom operator. You are entitled to include gasoline even though it was purchased by a custom operator, a neighbor or an employee who then used this gasoline on your farm for farming purposes. A statement from the custom oper ator as to the amount of gasoline used on the farm should be included by the farm operator with his 2240 Federal Gas Tax Refund Claim.

Do not include gasoline used (1) on the highway, (2) in processing, packaging freezing or canning operations; (3) for personal or other nonfarming purposes or (4) on the farm of another person even though used for farming purposes.

The Federal tax does not apply to diesel, butane, propane or special motor fuels if the fuels are used on a farm for farming purposes.

To obtain a refund on Federal ta xpaid on diesel fuel purchases and used by a custom operator on the farm file a claim on Form 843 with your District Director of Internal Revenue. Include in the claim the following: (1) Name and address of the custom operator, (2) a description of the custom work on the farm including the date, place of performance and the kind of work done, (3) number of gallons of taxpaid diesel fuel used in a highway vehicle, or motor vehicle by the custom operator while performing the work on your farm.

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

Greer seemingly is a mildmannered, soft-spoken person. But his administrative subordinates will tell you that he's a man who knows what needs to be done .how to go about it-and that he expects results.

Although Greer didn't evolve the Department's system of decentraliaztion — virtual complete autonomy of the 25 highway districts each under a District Engineer — he is credited wtih making it work successfully in periods of unprecedented growing pains. Many of the District Engineers supervise operations greater than some entire highway departments of other

Greer himself pays tribute to the early administrators and foresight of the initial Commissioners who laid down a policy of "Total road service to all the Department activities since its organiaztion in 1971.

Initiation, of the farm and 40's, and fantastic urban growth since World War II ,has necessitated a modification of the basic Departmental policy but it hasn't changed the ulti-

Principal guidelines for the Commission and the Department now are laid down under what is described as a "Balanced Program." Part of Greer's reputation has the initial farm to market program the Department was ready to begin construction. Much of the credit for success of the Texas Highway Department should be attributed to the people of Texas, Greer believes. Revenues of the Department are fixed by Constitutional provision, and as highway use increases and highway needs spiral the available funds go up. There have been times when the needs outpaced the available funds, but a sharp pencil in Departmental operations kept the two very nearly abreast in Texas.

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
