## Lions Dist. Gov. Speaks To Club

James P. McCracken, 2E-1 District Governor of Lions Innternational was guest and featured speaker of the local Lions Club Wednesday noon.

McCracken, president of the bank in his home town of Cisco, was introduced to the club by Lion President Jim Ross.

Mr. McCracken began his talk by telling the club of the recent in ernational convention in Toronto, Canada, and expressed a desire that a Texan would be elected president of Lions International in 1968 when the next convention is held at the Lions Club birthplace, Dallas, Texas. This year will also mark Lions 50th anniversary.

McCracken said a delegate voiced the opinion that he had rather be president of Lions International than President of the United States.

He said this was "kinda hard for me to understand," but he said he felt that if the club continued to make the same progress in the next 47 years it has in the past 47, it is entirely posible this expression could be

Highlight of the convention he said was when the 94 countries representing Lions International, assembled in the auditorium and displayed their respective flags.

McCracken said it was common practice for all delegates to rise and pay honor to a flag as it is presented from bordering countries - like the U. S. delegates arose and saluted the flags of Canada and Mexico.

When the US Flag was shown though, every delegate arose to pay tribute . . . "Like a lot of you here, I have paid tribute to our flag from a foxhole in or allegiance each week here at home, and I have never been as proud and the flag has never meant so much to me as it did on this occasion," he said.

After the war he said the Philipinos contacted Lions International to try and start a club in Japan. Since the US and Japan were on unsteady footing it was postponed. In time they were recognized and today there are more clubs in Japan than in Texas, the Lions of the One Act Play "Anastasia." birthplace, and more and more are being founded each year.

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


