



I would like to offer these suggestions for the safe handling of such containers. Keep all pressurized containers away other areas of high heat. Any heat above 100 degrees will create a definite hazard.

If no other safe method of disposal of such cans is available, they may be buried.

If you're thinking about initiating a creep feeding program for your beef cattle operation, carefully consider the advantages as well as limitations and fit them to your indivuual oper-

Calves which are to be creep fed should receive enough feed to fatten them by weaning time. Fat calves are being pur chased today for direct slaughter. Feeder buyers do not prefer to purchase fat calves for feed lots; thus this limitation should be considered prior to creep feeding. Approximately 900 pounds of feed are required to produce a 100 pound increase in calf weight.

Creep feeding adds some weight and finish and allows calves to grow more uniformly in size and condition. At weaning time less shrinkage results due to the improved over-all condition of the calves.

Furthermore, a creep feeding program does not exclusively benefit calves. Mother cows will ose less weight during nursing periods and thus stay in better condition. Creep feeding may have a place in emergency conlitions or in periods of stress, such as the drought experiencd in most areas of the state

Top quality calves with possibilities for future breeding purposes will receive an added boost if creep fed. However, producers should consider a ration wth and develo stead of fattening since this will have adverse effects on the future breeding ability of these HERE FROM COLLEGE

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

KNOW WHAT IT COSTS TO BORROW

There are many factors that a company should understand.

ing whether the loan is on reasonable terms and worthwhile. First, what will the loan cost? Cost includes not only the interest but any "extras" such as closing costs and credit investigation or service charges. Is credit life insurance required? or paid in advance? Is the interest and/or such charges deducted from the amount borrowed and only the net amount paid

Does the lender require collateral or co-signers? If so, what can the borrower do to meet the requirements? Collateral or cosigners may enable one to borrow on more favorable terms. his money? Must he apply and then wait?

What about repayment? Is it about renewals or extensions of organizations. the loan? What penalties if the borrower is late in making payment?

Few borrowers stop to realize that when loans are repaid in installments the quoted interest of 6 per cent, for example, may be misleading. The true interest could be aproximately 12 per cent, which might make the borrower reconsider.

The reason for this is simple: If you borrow \$100 to be repaid in 12 monthly installations, on the average you have the use of only \$50 for the year. Interest of 6 per cent computed on the entire \$100, as is customary in some lending agencies, is actually 12 per cent on the \$50 you had use of.

Likewise, a one and one-half percent a month carrying charge on a store account doesn't seem high but that is 18 per cent interest.







