printing and other professions. One of the early-day publishers was Earl Hammock who called the paper the Knox City Journal and who came here first in 1911 and alter in the 30's.

Earl is believed to be the first photographer in Knox City, and later he married a Knox City girl, Miss Ethel Barrington, and they moved to Colorado. He is presently living in Phoenix, 'Arizona and two years ago was featured in Arizona Highways with some of his most outstanding paintings of Indians and beautiful scenics in Arizona.

Mr. Ed Bateman and C. H. Moss joined forces in the mid-1940's to establish the Quarterhorse Journal. The Herald was the birthplace of this nationally circulated magazine. Mr. Moss left Knox City around 1945 and Jimmie and Irene Branch edited the paper until March of '59.

We found one year's supply of papers dated 1922, and believe this is the earliest issue we can find . . . Would take a lot of digging to come up with past publishers and editors of the Herald, or The Sun, or The Knox City Journal.

This is the only box that
will be worked during the above stated days. City mail however, must be deposited in the city drop box inside the post office.

Mail from the outside letter box will be picked up by the star route carrier and worked in Abilene. The carrier will pick up all mail from Benjamin to Abilene and no clerks will be on duty at this time.

This is an economy measure by the Postal Department and applies to all post

In order that mail will be dispatched with a minimum of lost time, it is imperative that patrons follow the outlined procedure.





COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

Small grains have been making excellent growth this fall in Knox County. However, some fields have been making such rapid growth and with the warm dry winds the moisture is being depleted rapidly. As a result, some of the wheat is turning brown. Many fields will be ready for grazing with one good rain to settle the ground.

Several farmers planting wheat on land just out of the soil bank have lost their stand due to white grubs in the soil. These grubs are the larvae of the familiar "June bug." There are many species of these and they stay in the grub stage for 1-3 years. They are difficult, to control as the insecticied must be worked into the top 4-6 inches of soil. Aldrin, Heptachlor, or dieldrin at the rate of 2-3 pounds technical material per acre or 6-8 pounds of technical chlordane will do a good

Cotton harvest is proceeding at a moderate rate. The irrigated fields around Munday are being harvested mostly with mechanical cotton pickers. The longer frosts holds off the more mature the alte bolls will be. Damp mornings and wet ground have hampered harvest in these





COURTS SPEAK - National chain loan companies got the word they wanted from the Texas Supreme Court.

It upheld lower court decisions that an effort by the Leg islature to restrict non-Texas companies from opening new loan offices in Texas clearly was unconstitutional.

Small Texas firms had convinced the Legislature that loan licenses should be issued only to companies owned at least 51 per cent by Texans. But the court said that is not valid, under both state and federeal

On request of Upshur Rural Electric Cooperative and Southwestern Electric Power Company of Shreveport, Supreme Court dismissed appeals in a dispute involving construction of a \$9,000,000 rural power generating plant near Ore City in East Texas. Southwestern claimed the Upshur Coop, serving 10 North East Texas counties, had no authority to discontinue buying power and to start generating its own. All matters in dis

pute reportedly were settled. An Austin district court refused the Houston House of Tobacco's request for a temporary restraining order to retain its distributor's permit. But it set a November 12 hearing on an injunction to keep the State Comptroller from revoking the permit. 

Q - My \$5,000 U. S. Govern ment Life Insurance is now paid up. However, my wife has just died. I have over a thousand dolars in bills, and twice as much insurance as I need. Can I change my insurance to meet

A - Yes. You may borrow against your insurance, or you may cash in part of it, retaining the amount of protection you consider necessary. Your beneficiary designation probably should be revised, too.

Q — What assistance can the VA give me in locating my husband who is receiving compensation?

A-The VA may forward mail to veterans. However, the VA is obligated to keep information Mr. and Mrs. W. 
