fever? Chances are you have, if you have ever hunted — or listened to hunting tales, as most Tex-

ans have. Few hunters — or deer, for of being calm.

But over a hundred died last year and will this year from a symptom of this disease — lightheadedness — although it is labeled "hunting accidents" in the books.

For example, who would ever climb up an unfamiliar tree in the dark, carrying a loaded gun -except on the first morning of deer season?

Who would ever put a loaded gun in the hands of an untrained teenager and turn him loose in the woods - except during deer season?

Or who would ever snake his way through a barbed wire fence wagging a loaded rifle behind him — except during deer season?

And when would you ever choose a loaded rifle for a companion around the campfire or over a hot cup of coffee - except during a hunting excursion?

Planning, preparedness and thoughtfulness would eliminate many unnecessary hunting fatalities. Unloading your rifle before you climb a tree or go through a fence takes a few seconds — maybe even a minute

—but why gamble a minute against your life?

Law Limits Boat

Usage For Ducks

Some "small print" instructions governing the harvesting of migratory game were pointed out by J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator for the Parks and Wildlife Department, since the duck season opens in Texas November 25.

The rules, which also apply to goose hunting which began in Texas Oct. 31, stipulate that: "Waterfowl may be taken from outboard motor boat if boat is beached, resting at anchor, or is placed inside of or secured to any shooting blind. Motor boat, sailboat, or other craft may be used solely as a means of picking up dead or injured birds.

"The use of aircraft, power boats, sailboats, or other floating craft or device of any kind for purpose of concentrating, driving, rallying or stirring up waterfowl and coots is strictly prohibited. The use of recorded or electrically amplified bird calls or sound is prohibited."



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
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
