Research has shown that the weevil must attain diapause in order to survive the winter. Diapause is a physialogical condition in which reproduction ceases, fat reserves increase, and the respiratory rates are lower when compared with non-diapaused, reproducing weevils.

How much time is required for a boll weevil to attain diapause is not known exactly. It is generaly believed that after a weevil emerges a certain period of feeding (two to three weeks) is required before firm diapause is attained. How long a diapause weevil will stay in the cotton field before seeking a hibernation site is another question not fully answered.

The diapaused or overwintered weevils emerge from hibernation in the spring, infest the young cotton and produce the first generation of weevils.

Diapause boll weevil is a program designed to reduce the overwintering weevil population by attacking the diapause population in the fall before weevils leave the field for hibernation. It is logical that if the number of weevils attaining diapause could be significantly reduced fewer weevils would survive the lowing year.


