

BEER - LIQUOR INTERESTS CLASH — One of the hottest floor fights of the session was waged over a bill which found beer and liquor interests on opposite sides and "wets" and "dries" somewhat confused.

Liquor store operators bitterly opposed a measure by Rep. Gus Mutscher of Brenham which they contended permitted wholesale beer distributors to sell ale and malt liquor directly to consumers.

Mutscher said the two beverages should be treated as beer under state statutes, since they are made by breweries, not dis-
