2. A junior college must resist pressure to expand into a four-year institution, concentrat ing instead on achieving excellence in its two-year program. 3. The distinctive function of

the school must be recognized leges are neither mere extensions of the high school nor decapitated versions of the fouryear college. In another section of the re-

port, the commission warns that "to achieve excellence, the institutions of higher learning and their supporters practice self-restraint and perform existing functions before assuming new ones. The Commission said

"chambers of commerce must put educational wisdom ahead of civic pride, perhaps striving for the best, two-year college in the state instead of a mediocre four-year college.' A report closer to home -

this one from the staff of the Commission on Higher Education — says that the two year colleges were established in Texas to meet the needs of the community.

"The junior colleges have made and should continue to make a unique and important contribution to the state and to the nation," the report stated. However, the report adds,

'careful consideration should be given to the effect of converting additional two-year colleges to four-year colleges.' Many members of the Legis-

lature have benn outspoken in their criticisms of the recent trend in Texas to elevate the junior colleges to four-year

During the recent session, the elevation of two such schools was approved over protests that such action was bringing about a deterioration of higher educaion in Texas. So far Texas has no effective
