Physician Clarifies Blood Donations

In order to answer many questions the general public might have in regard to the Blood Bank program, a local physician was interviewed this week.

He said that since Knox County is a member of the American Red Cross Blood Bank program, we can obtain needed blood from the Blood Bank in Wichita Falls at any time.

Where large quantities of blood are needed for a specific patient, the patients family is asked to see that donors replace the blood to the bank within a reasonable time.

Since the Blood Bank has the finest equipment to process the blood, which makes it safer for the patient, it is best for donors to go to Wichita Falls and have the blood drawn. Or wait until the next visit of the Blood-

A group left Tuesday and Wednesday for Wichita to donate blood for Mr. Roy Smith who requires two pints of blood each day.

As explained above it is not possible to give blood here for there are no provisions available to accept it, or to safeguard the patient's well-being.






