Gets Appointment

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith announced the appointment of Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon to the interim Election Law Study Committee Wednesday.

The 27-member group, creation of which was authorized by resolution during the recent legislative session, will make a complete study of the Texas Election Code with a view to recommending changes which may be necessary or desirable. It will report to the Legisla. ture in 1967. Sen. Hightower is serving

his first term in the State Senate. He was a member of the House of Representatives during the 53rd Legislature in 1953. David Slaughter, athletic director and head football coach at Sul Ross State College, has been named "coach of the year" in the Lone Star Conference for 1964-1965. Slaughter was named follow-

ing a poll of sports publicity directors of the eight member schools.

Slaughter was cited for the Lobos' 1964 football season, which included a 7-3-1 record, a runner-up position in the Lone Star Conference, and an All-Sports Bowl win in Oklahoma City. Their finish was a far cry from the coaches pre-season poll which put the Lobos next to the cellar position.

What were the big wins in

"They're all big, of course, Slaughter said, but the ones that stand out most in my mind were the wins over Southwest Texas (16-14, in Alpine), Sam Houston 14-7 in Huntsville and the bowl win over East Central Oklahoma 21-13 in Oklahoma

Slaughter at 36, has spent half of his life in coaching. A Duncanville high school graduate in 1945 at age 15, he began his college training at Eas! Texas State College and in '48, received the bachelor's degree at the age of 18.

He immediately began a sixyear stint of coaching all sports at Knox City high school. His work there produced 11 district championships. His football team won district, bi-district and regional honors three years, and the Knox City cagers won four district titles. His baseball and track teams recorded two district championships. He was basketball coach and

assistant football coach mentor from 1954 through 1957 at Carrollton high school, and his 1954 cagers won first basketball championship in the history of the school. He spent 1958 as head coach

at Ranger Junior College, a school which had not won a football game in the three previous years, and his outfit posted a 6-3-1 record for secondplace inthe conference. His 1960 Sul Ross team close-

ly contested the 1964 aggregation —That team showed a 7-3 season won-lost record. The 1960 team did not show, however, the first bowl win in the history of the school, as did the 1964 outfit. Slaughter, who holds the mas-

ter's degree from North Texas State University, is married to the former Zana Hamm of Knox City. They have two children-Elise, 7 and John David, 3. Taking part in the poll which

elected Slaughter as "coach of the year" were Dr. W. J. Bell East Texas State University; Lee White, McMurry College; Kenneth Casstevens, Southwest Tex as State College; George Hine, Howard Payne; Ben Hobbs, Texas A&I College; Dr. Ferol Robinson, Sam Houston State College, Allan Ramsey, Stephen F. Burkham explained that the program was a 12 months program beginning July 1st and ends June 30 of each year.

To conclude his speech he gave a resume of what the students do for each year until graduation and completion of the course.

He said he was especially proud of these young men and concluded: "we have some of the finest young men that can be found right here in Knox City. We can't do one thing without the cooperation of Mom. and Pop and everyone has to cooperate. Thanks for all of your considerations."

Ray Penman was asked to address the group and he made a short speech on his three years work in FFA.

Bill Cornett was last to speak and he said the FFA covers a lot more ground than the name implies and mentioned that citizenship, leadership, public speaking, judging meat, and soil as well as managing money, were high on the list.
