





COURTESY PERMITS—

Two-day courtesy permits will be issued free of charge entitling a hunter and three guests to hunt game on the League Ranch. All hunters must agree to obey the regulations printed on the courtesy permit. Hunting without a courtesy permit is forbidden and violators will be prosecuted.

Special Regulations — 1965 Season—

PERMIT ISSUING HOURS

No permits will be issued the same day as the day to be hunted. Permits will be issued at the office of the League ranch Monday through Friday only, and between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. only. Permits will not be issued more than 10 days in advance of opening day.

DOVE HUNTING—

Only three hunting parties will be issued permits for any one day.

QUAIL HUNTING—

Permits will be restricted to one permit per hunter during the season. Only two parties will be issued permits for any one day. The ranch will issue permits after December 1, to hunt for the periods December 11 to January 6, and January 10, through January 31.

GOOSE AND DUCK HUNTING-

Only three hunting parties will be issued permits to hunt on any one day.

DEER—

No deer hunting permits will be issued.

RIFLES AND PISTOLS—

Possession of a rifle or pistol while on ranch property is strictly forbidden. Carrying such a weapon in a vehicle while on ranch property is also fordidden.



Men have the right to a public trial and the right to know what happens in courtrooms. These are rights written into the Constitution and affirmed by the Supreme Court in 1829 when Mr. Justice Bagley wrote: "It is one of the essential qualities of a court of justice that its proceedings should be public."
