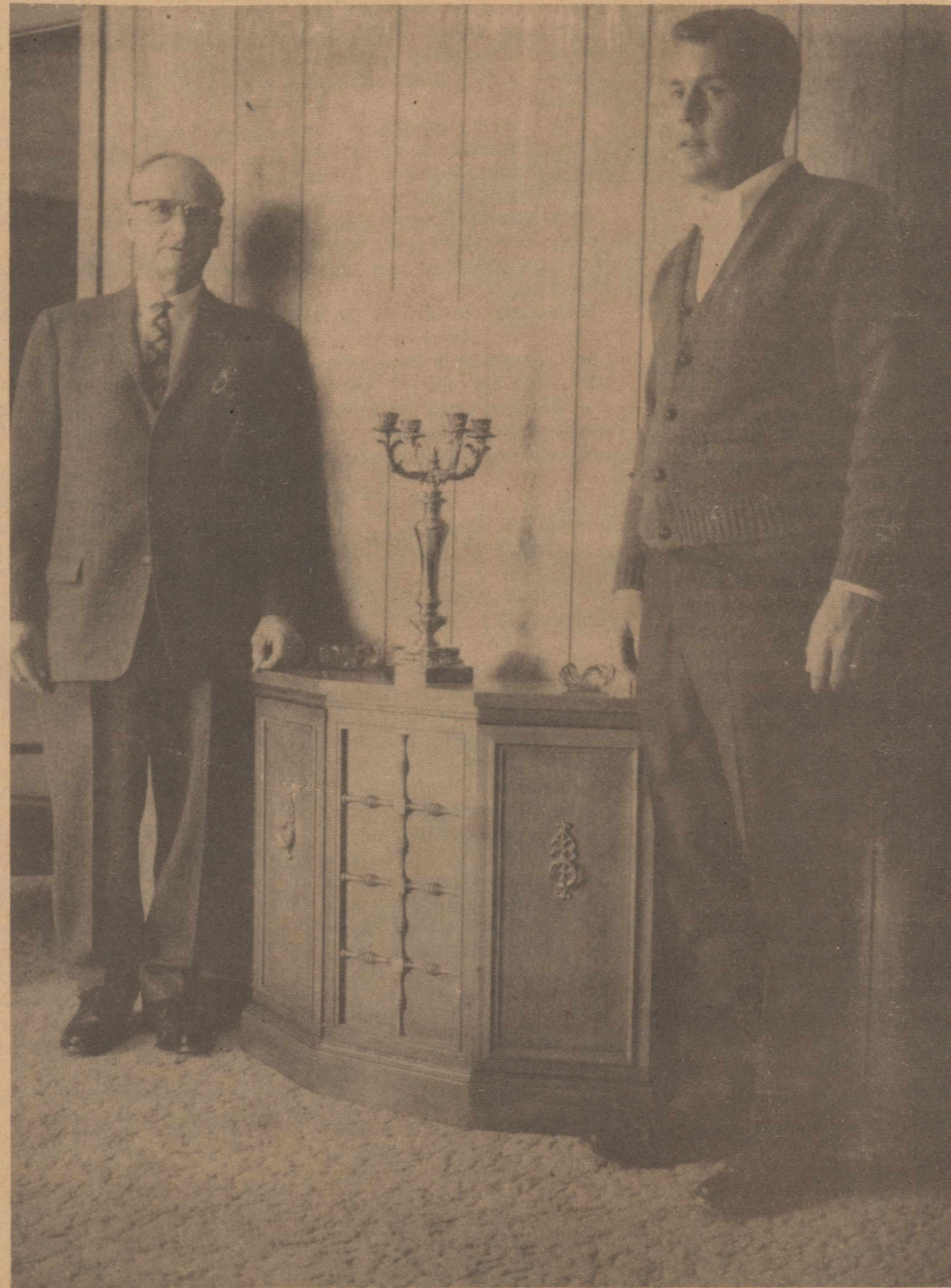
## Mrs. King Rites Held

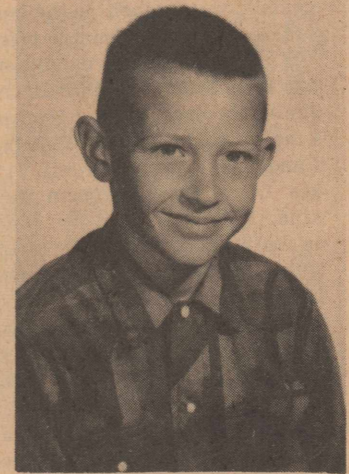
## 'Merry Christmas' Will Be Selected
