What does democracy mean to you? I think democracy means something different to everyone. Democracy as defined by the dictionary is a government of the people; a government in which the supreme power is retained by the people, and exercised directly or indirectly through a system of representation; a belief or practice of social equality.

Because of this word and another one that goes beside it, freedom, thousands of men have lost their lives in battles. Ever since the first shot was fired at Lexington on the morning of April 19, 1775, when the American Revolution began, and now in Viet Nam, American citizens are fighting and will continue to fight for democracy. This word democracy must be a mighty powerful word for so many to believe in it and give their lives that it might survive.

To me democracy and freedom run a close race. Without freedom you can not have a democracy and without a democracy you can not have freedom.

Freedom to learn, to think, and to publish—as well as religious freedom—are among the essentials of the democratic way of life. The people living in Colonial America had a few of these privileges, but they were very limited. On September 3, 1789, when the Treaty of Paris was signed, America was free to make her government any way she wanted to. Because these people had been under a monarch system and were now free to choose, they chose the democratic system of government. In their new government they made a "bill of rights."

The bill of rights was a guarantee of religious freedom, right of free speech and free press, right to assemble, right to a fair trial by jury, and equality of all citizens before the law. These freedoms are stated in our Constitution which was signed September 17, 1787.

Our Constitution states the power given to state and federal government, the power denied them, and the laws and rights of citizens, but most of all our Constitution is by us the people.

"We the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

American democracy is the most wonderful thing that ever happened to a government. Where else in the whole world can you have the freedom we have in America.

In America you can choose any job you like. You might be more qualified at another job, but if you like what you are doing you will be successful and most of all happy.

In America, you are as good as anyone else. In other countries, if you believe in a certain thing or come from a certain family, you can never grow up to be President.

In America, you can tell others whether-or-not you like the way the government is being run. In other countries, if you so much as whisper a word against that government, you can be put in jail or killed.

In America you can choose who you want to run your government. In other countries, a handful of men decide who they will tell how to run the government.

In America you have the rights of life, liberty, and pursuit of happiness or peace. You can live any way you see fit whether it is a life of crime or success, bad or good. You have the right of happiness in doing what you want, making a success, and having peace within yourself.

Right now men are fighting in Viet Nam. What are they fighting for? Men burn their draft card because they say they do not believe in war, but they believe in freedom

Crews Must Register With USDL

Farm crew leaders who plan to take crews of ten or more workers out of state in 1966 will be required to register with the U.S. Department of Labor, Mr. A.J. Kuehler, manager of the Texas Employment Commission, revealed this week.

"This includes crew leaders who registered during 1965, since all 1965 registrations expire on December 31, 1965," Kuehler explained.

Under the 1965 Farm Labor Contractor Registration Act which became effective on January 1, 1965, all crew leaders whose crews cross state lines must register if the crew has ten or more workers who are not members of the crew leader's immediate family.

In some instances, farm employers who recruit workers for other farmers are also required to obtain a certificate of registration, Kuehler pointed out. Details on the provisions of the act are available at the TEC office at the City Hall in Munday.

The act is designed to benefit interstate migrant agricultural workers through improved work agreements, better exchange of information between crew leaders and workers, and increased safety while traveling.

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Farm And Ranch Notes

The Knox County Junior Livestock Show planning Committees will meet Monday night, 6:30 p.m. in the VO-Ag Classroom at the Knox City High School. This is an earlier time than was announced at the last meeting. It is being moved up in order that members may attend the Beef Cattle Producers Short-course, which begins at 7:30 in the same building. Members of all Committees are urged to be present to make final plans for the junior show to be held Saturday, January 15 in Munday.

Beef Cattle Producers are urged to attend the Beef Cattle Short Course which will be held on three nights in January. The first meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. in the Knox City High School. Dr. Dixon Hubbard will discuss "Management of Cattle on Cultivated Pastures" and "Parasite Control on Beef Cattle". The second meeting will be Monday, January 10, 7:30 p.m. in the same building. Doug Robinson, Spur Experiment Station will talk on "Brush Control" and Jim Barrow, manager of Spur Headquarters Ranch, will talk on "Drylet Concentrate Feeding of Beef Cows".

The last meeting will be part of the Farm and Ranch Program at Munday on Tuesday night, January 18. Carlton Corbin, Fittstown, Oklahoma, Angus breeder will talk about "Performance Testing of Beef Cattle".

Everyone interested is cordially invited to attend. Knox County Vegetable Growers have some opportunities to learn the latest in Vegetable production at these meetings in January.

The first meeting will be held Monday afternoon, January 10 at 1:30 in the school lunchroom at Munday. Dr. John Larsen, Extension Horticulturist will talk on "Vegetable Fertilization" and "Pollination of Cucumbers, watermelons and Cantaloupes".

The Vegetable Growers Conference will hold their winter meeting in Plainview, Tuesday, January 11, from 8:30 to 4:30. Growers will be able to hear the latest on mechanization, fertilization, soil fumigation, weed control, disease control, insect control, marketing and the Perishable Commodity Act. This meeting will be held at the Hale County Exhibition Center in Plainview. It will be a very informative meeting and well worth the time of those attending.

Anyone interested in vegetable greenhouses will want to attend a meeting on January 12, that will be held in the Research and Extension Center, Lubbock. This is located 8 miles north of Lubbock on Highway 87. The morning program will be held in the conference room at the center and will cover topics of interest to green house growers. The afternoon program will be tour of two green houses in the Lubbock area.

A guar demonstration plot was harvested last week on the farm of J. C. McGee, Knox City. The seed was furnished by H. H. Partridge, Agronomist for General Mills. Each variety was planted in a row one-half mile long and harvested separately and weighed. The plot was located in a non-irrigated field of Texcel guar which averaged 1000 pounds per acre.

The varieties and their yield in pounds per acre are as follows: Hall, 1252 pounds; Brooks, 1,044; Groehler, 1,005 and Mills, 1,052. Hall is a new variety with large stalks, spreading growth habit with the beans growing on the entire plant.

Hall is a late maturing variety, while Mills is an early maturing variety with a smaller growth habit than Hall.

Seed of both Hall and Mills will be released to growers in 1966. They are both resistant to the most serious guar diseases, Alternaria Leaf Spot

and bacterial blight. Along with Brooks, these present the grower with early, medium and late-maturing varieties from which to choose. These varieties have produced 36 to 45 percent more beans than Texcel and Groehler in Texas and Oklahoma tests! Hall and Mills trace to selections made by Murray Kinman, USDA plant breeder at College Station.

Mr. McGee has used guar in rotation with cotton on this field for 15 years. He states, "When I first began farming this land, it was so sandy that I did not dare drive a car in the field. Now a car can be driven all over it. My cotton yield has steadily increased over the years. I am a firm believer in the use of guar as a soil-building crop."

A Beef Cattle Producers Short Course is planned for January 3 and January 10 in Knox City. Dr. Dixon Hubbard, Area Extension Livestock Specialist from Lubbock will be on the program, January 3. He will cover management of cattle on cultivated pastures and parasite control on livestock.

Monday night, January 10, we will have Doug Robinson, Spur Experiment Station to discuss brush control. Also on the same night, we will have Mr. Jim Barron, Spur Headquarters Ranch Manager, to discuss drylot concentrate feeding of beef cows. Mr. Barron has cooperated with the Spur Experiment Station in a test of this nature last year and will have some worthwhile facts on this subject.

The workshop will be completed Tuesday night, January 18, at the Farm and Ranch meeting in Munday. Mr. Carlton Corbin, Fittstown, Oklahoma will discuss his program of performance testing of beef cattle.

Good hog prices continue—supply and demand still works in the market place. John G. McHaney, Extension economist at Texas A&M University, says the present situation with hogs is a good example. He expects prices during the first half of 1966 to average above those for the same period of 1965. For the last half, prices will be influenced by how fast the apparent expansion in hog numbers builds up. But, he adds, based on past production cycles, there is real danger of over-expansion and low prices in 1967.

Knox County stockmen today are advised to be on the lookout for the annual invasion of lice on their livestock. These pests can take a real bite out of profits unless they are controlled.

We suggest that livestock producers get a copy of Extension publication MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry". The publication is "chuck-full" of information on insecticide formulations and how to use them in controlling flies, lice, mites, ticks, fleas and cattle grubs. It contains a dilution chart for mixing sprays and dips and outlines control programs for beef animals and nonlactating dairy cattle, dairy animals, sheep and goats, swine, horses and poultry. The bulletin also offers suggestions for controlling house and stable flies.

This bulletin is available from my office or from either of the bulletin racks in the banks at Knox City and Munday.

What is the best time of the year to prune trees? This depends on the reason for pruning. Deadwood can be removed from trees at any time without injuring them. Spring pruning, however, is recommended when doing correctional pruning, since the wounds heal faster than at other times of the year.

If your objective is to increase fruit and bloom set, prune before the blossoms form in midsummer. If, on the other hand, you want to decrease the number of blossoms, prune before they bloom after the blossoms have set.

I would like to point out that pruning trees during early fall tends to reduce plant hardiness and, in general, is not a good practice.

Evergreens should not be sheared in late summer or fall as the cut ends will not heal over until spring.

We have available Bulletin B-977, "Modern Pruning Methods", that gives plenty of detail about when, where and how to prune. It is yours for the asking.

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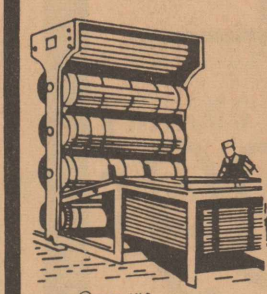

I believe that any person who would burn their draft card as a protest against war, does not believe in democracy and freedom or is just too scared and too big a coward to go and fight for their country against the enemy.

I believe in our government. I believe it is a good one. No Government is perfect, not all the people are happy. I am sure that each one of us could change our government some way. I think it is a little too free. We are free to choose the church we wish to attend, but because this is as far as it goes many do not attend church, and therefore have never heard about Jesus. Because we have freedom of press, many bad things are printed about people that might cause them to lose face in the community. Because we have freedom of assembly, men can get a group of people together, and if he is a good talker, he can change their views of certain things to his views on the matter. Because we have the right to keep arms, a man might kill his neighbor with a gun he bought down the street.

In spite of these flaws in our Constitution I would not live in any other country, and I would be ready to give my life for our American democracy, and freedom might live. Gentlemen may cry, peace, peace! But there is no peace. The war has actually begun. The next gale that sweeps from the north will bring to our ears the sound of resounding arms!

Our brethren are already in the field! Why stand we here idle? What is it that gentlemen wish? What would they have? Is life so dear, or peace so sweet, as to be purchased at the price of chains or slavery? Forbid it, Almighty God! I know not what course others may take; but as for me, give me liberty or give me death!" *Patrick Henry's speech before the Virginia Convention (1775)
