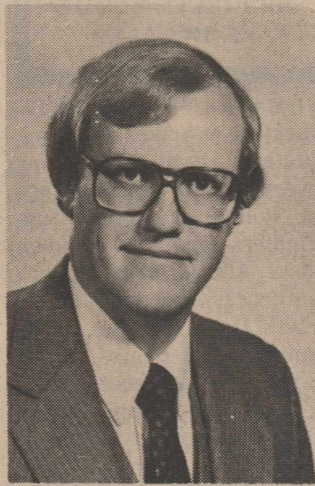
Schrandt Appointed New District Judge

Seeking a smaller community in which to settle and raise a family in the future, Schrandt set up practice in Seymour and has served as Baylor County Attorney and acting Knox County Attorney up to the present time.

Schrandt took the oath of office on Wednesday, June 15, at 3:00 p.m. in the District Courtroom of the Baylor County Courthouse. Baylor County Judge Joe Dickson will administer the oath.

Corps Lakes Attract Visitors

Tulsa, Oklahoma Memorial Day weekend visitors at Lakes operated by the Tulsa District of the Corps of Engineers totaled 2,151,670 as compared to 1.8 million last year, Lt. Col. Richard S. Waldrop, acting District Engineer, has announced.

Lake Texoma on the Red River drew the biggest crowd with 565,536 visitors. Others with more than 100,000 were Canton, 179,511; Tenkiller, 174,330; Eufaula, 152,007; Keystone, 122,798; and Fort Gibson, 111,958.

Reduce Soil Loss From Wind, Water

To reduce soil loss from wind and water, improve water infiltration, and improve physical condition of soil, stubble mulching is a good practice to consider.

Stubble mulching can be used successfully to control erosion on fallow ground. Also stubble with adequate residues from prior crops are effective for erosion control while establishing grass. Leaving crop residues in the field helps maintain soil fertility, tilth, and water intake. Stubble mulching is managing plant residues on a year round basis. To accomplish this, harvesting, tilling, planting, and cultivation operations are performed so that protective amounts of vegetation remain on the soil surface. When adjusted properly sweep-type tillers, rowweeder, and shisels all leave residue on the soil surface.

West Texas Utilities Files For Increase

West Texas Utilities Company has filed for a general increase in its electric rates for retail customers.

Local manager Dick Evatt said the application, filed Friday, is a systemwide request for higher rates. Simultaneous filings were made in all incorporated towns and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas at Austin for an increase in rural areas, unincorporated towns and in incorporated towns which have ceded jurisdiction over electric rates.

So far, a total of 19 municipalities served by WTU have opted to let the PUC analyze rate requests and to make decisions for them. These are Albany, Chillicothe, Dickens, Eldorado, Goree, Hedley, Lakeview, Matador, McCamey, Mertzon, Moran, Paint Rock, Roaring Springs, Robert Lee, Roby, Rotan, Rule, Trent and Weinert. At the last meeting, the firemen went through the pump operations on two trucks. We all get a little rusty from time to time and have to "bone up" because they all have different procedures to go through.

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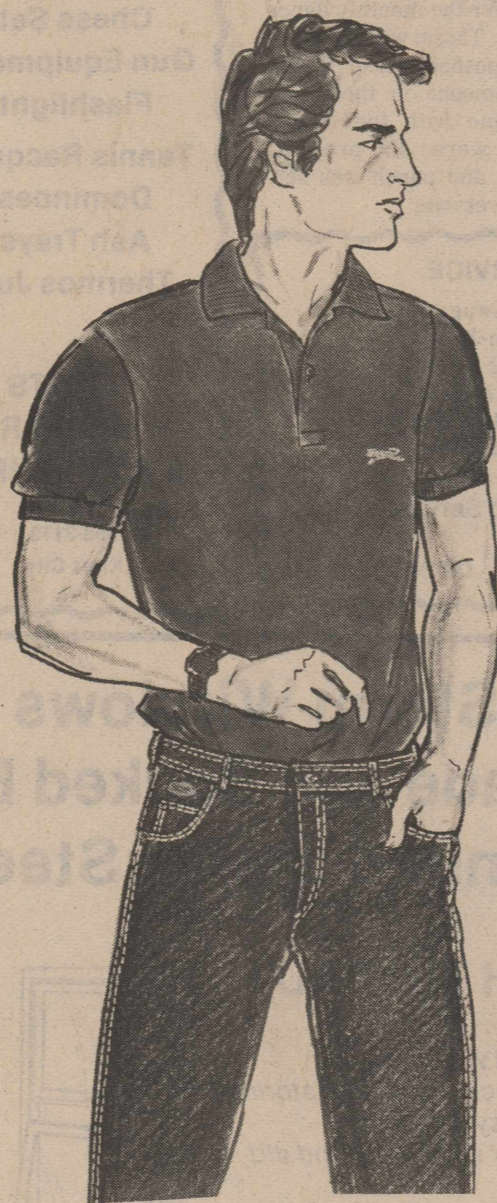
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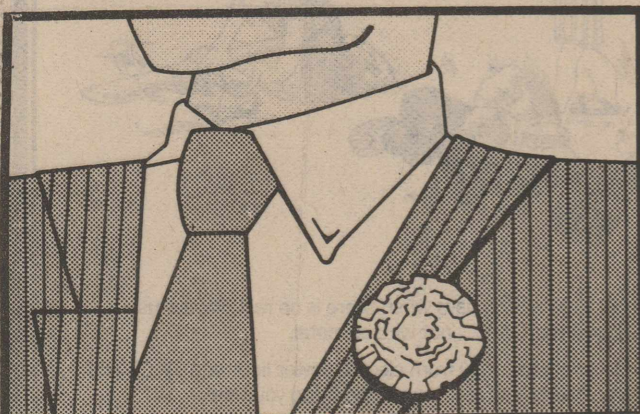
