Two To Go!

The Knox City Greyhounds took another step toward the State Championship by defeating the Valley Patriots last Friday night in Childress, 13-0. The win puts Knox City against Wink, Friday night at 7:30 in Big Spring.

The weatherman looked down favorably on Bobcat Stadium in Childress Friday night and held back the rain until after the game was over. A large Knox City crowd enjoyed watching the Hounds continue their winning ways. The Knox City defense did a superb job holding Valley to only 50 yards rushing and 60 yards passing for the night. Meanwhile Steve Oudems sparked the Hound offense with a 51 yard touchdown and a total of 95 yards rushing for the night. Kevin Eaton had a great defensive performance with two fumble recoveries and a pass interception along with several tackles. Chad Whitley, James Evatt, and Joe Paul Flores kept the pressure on the Patriots' offensive unit holding them to a minus eight yards rushing the last six times the Patriots had the ball.

Knox City won the toss and chose to exercise their option at the half; therefore Valley wanted the football and Knox City kicked off to start the game. Chris Whitaker made the stop on the first play from scrimmage for a one yard gain. Whitaker and Whitley stopped the Valley runner for a one yard loss on second down. Whitley stopped the third down play for no gain and Valley was forced to punt. Knox City could not move the ball and punted back to Valley. The Greyhounds got a break when Eaton recovered a Valley fumble. The Valley defense held the Hounds and took over the ball at their own 24

yard line. Flores stopped the first down play for no gain. Valley made 26 yards on a pass play and a first down. Then Whitaker, Gutierrez, Flores and Eaton allowed only three yards in three downs and Valley punted. Gutierrez returned the punt 39 yards and the Hounds had the ball at the Valley 49 yard line, however the Hounds were unable to move the ball and punted to Valley. Hutchinson punted the ball down to the one yard line where Valley took over. Valley was

STOPPING POACHERS
In a front page feature story last week, information was passed on the News readers about the senseless slaughter of deer and other wild animals within our local area. The article seems to have caused quite a reaction from readers, and every comment seems to point in the same direction: people are very upset that this sort of crime is occurring and want to do whatever it takes to help stop those who participate in such low life activities.

After talking with many people and hearing their expressed shock and concern over the article, I spoke with Game Warden Vic Lowry and he informed me that concerned citizens had also talked with him and had expressed the same type of feelings. Many offered whatever type of help they could, some even offered financial amounts to be used as local rewards for information leading to those who are committing the crimes.

One phone call that was made to both Warden Lowry and me brought up an interesting question for persons in this local area: Could a telephone hotline for reporting game violations be established right here in Knox City or Knox County to serve our immediate area? The caller was making reference to the statewide telephone hotline that was featured in last week's article. Callers utilize the toll free number to call Austin, the messages and information are then forwarded to game wardens in the respective areas where the reported violation occurred. The caller's identity is protected from common knowledge by the use of a numbering coding system. The caller is given a number when he or she makes the call and that number stays with them all the way through the process, including the possibility of issuing reward money to the person if the tip results in a conviction of an offender. The key to the program is good information, that's why the rewards are only paid for actual information that leads to the arrest and conviction of offenders. Semi-Final Game To Be Broadcast

Knox City residents and Greyhound fans are urged to attend the game in Big Spring and show city-wide support of the Greyhound football team as they continue towards their quest of the state class A championship title. For those who are unable to attend the game, the live broadcast will provide total coverage.

First Program To Be Saturday At 3



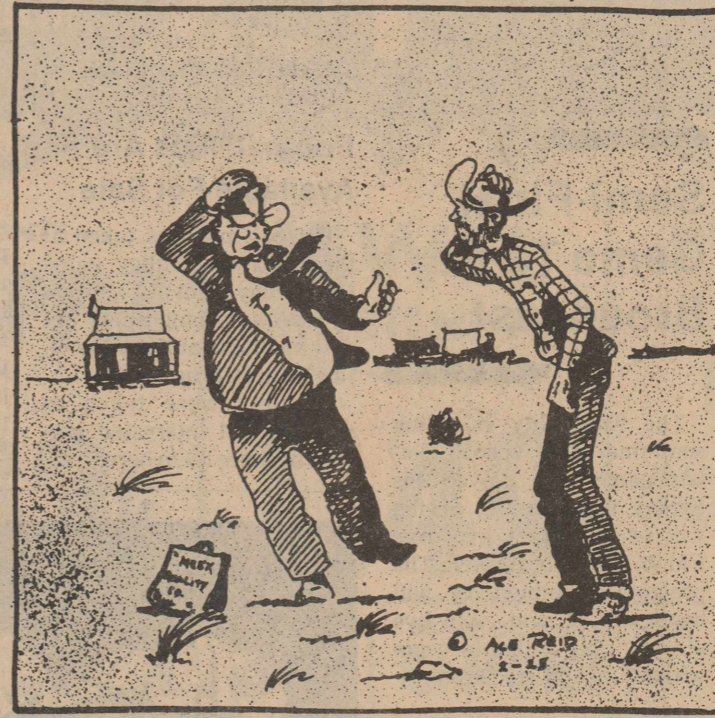

just to receive the cash; that's why the restriction was made to limit the rewards to good tips that pay off with convictions.

The money received for the program is received from many sources, donations from concerned citizens, donations from legal hunters who don't like to see others take advantage of the law and kill off game illegally, donations from organizations and other concerned individuals.

The article last week has stirred up the temper of enough people locally to speculate that it might be possible for such a telephone hotline to actually be feasible for local use. In my conversation with Warden Lowry, he indicated that he would welcome such a program but would not actually be able to administer it because of his employment with the state. What would a program like that require? Most important of all, it would require a substantial amount of donations for use in setting up the system and supplying the rewards to be issued. A special bank account for the money would be set up and several key citizens of the community could be appointed to a committee to oversee the funds and rewards. Beyond the actual cash, the system would require the installation of a telephone and an answering machine to insure a way of leaving a message on a twenty four hour a day basis. Advertising would be required to spread the message throughout the county, but most of the press media would probably donate what they could as a public service feature.

How about it? Do we have enough interest in stopping this senseless killing of wild animals to actually donate money to get this program started? That is the key to the project, the availability of funds. With Warden Vic Lowry's approval, this week's SHOOTIN STRAIGHT is being published in an effort to actually see how much interest there is locally in a project such as this.

If you can, or want to help get a local telephone hotline established for the reporting of game violators, take the time necessary to let Warden Lowry or us here at the News office know. You can let us know in person, by phone, or by just dropping us a note in the mail with an idea of the amount you would be able to donate. If you would like an opportunity to speak out on the issue, just write down your thought and address the letter to Letter To The Editor, The Knox County News, P.O. Box 7, Knox City, Texas 79529. As is the policy of our paper, signed letters will be published while unsigned letters will not.

If there is not enough local interest to actually start such a program here, those still wishing to give money for the same cause could always donate to the state fund set up for the same reason.

Here's a chance to accomplish something very worthwhile for our local area. The idea was formulated by a reader of last week's feature story and the information has been presented here for you. THE REST IS NOW UP TO YOU, let us hear your ideas and interest.

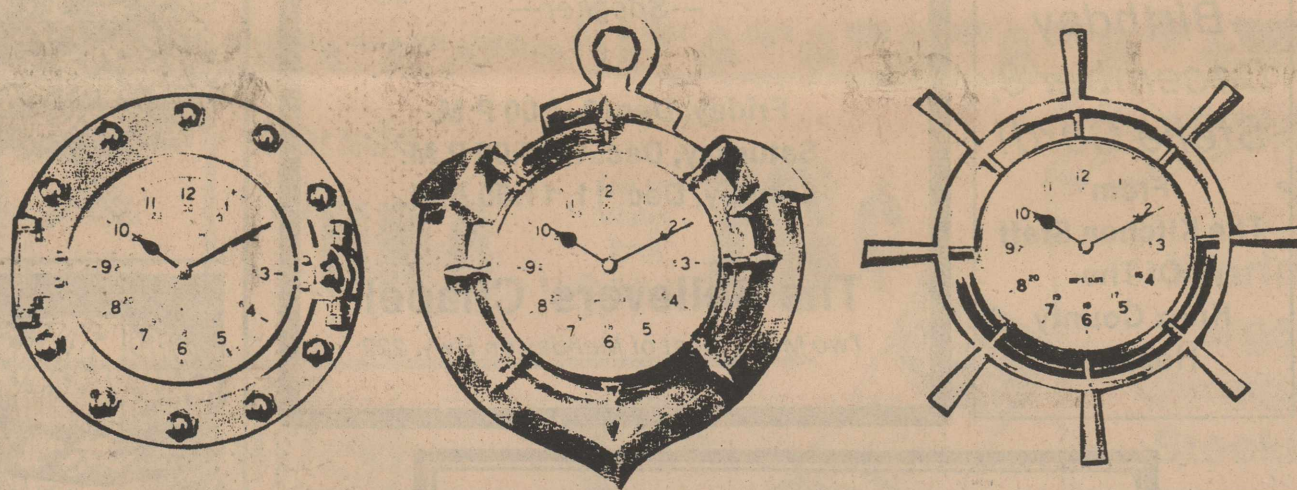

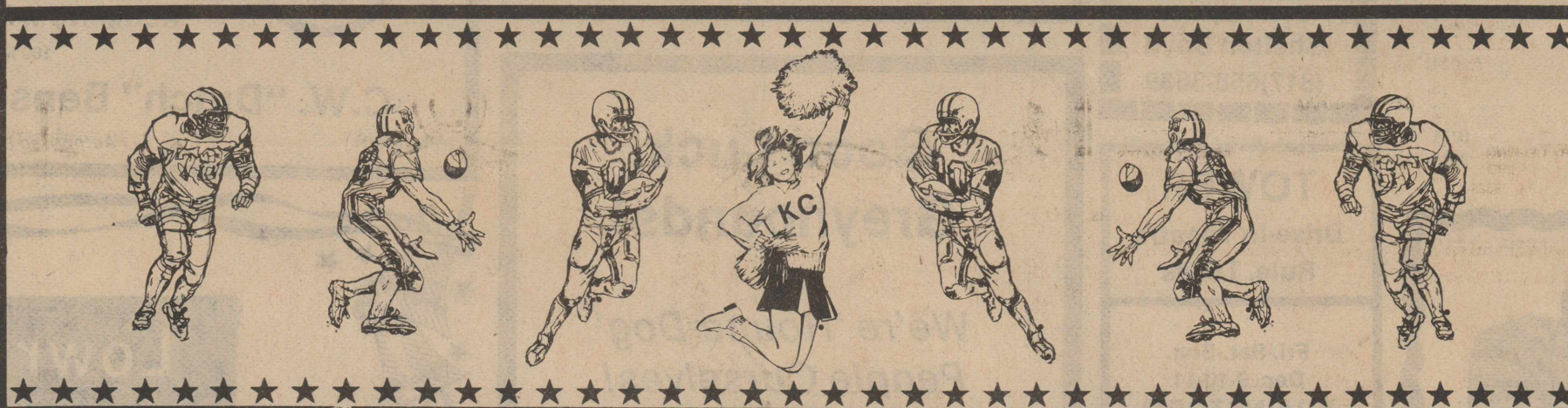

able to make only four yards and a short punt gave the Hounds the ball on the Valley 27 yard line. 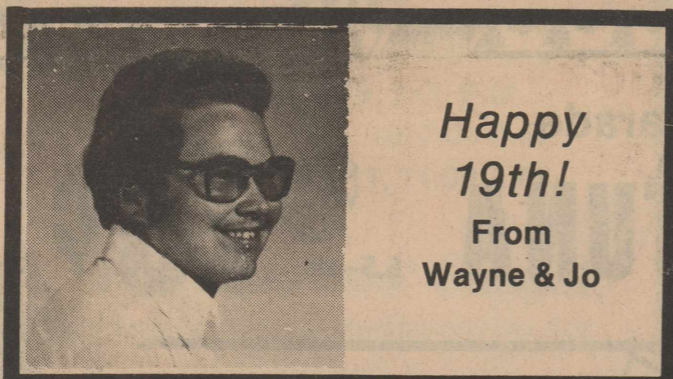

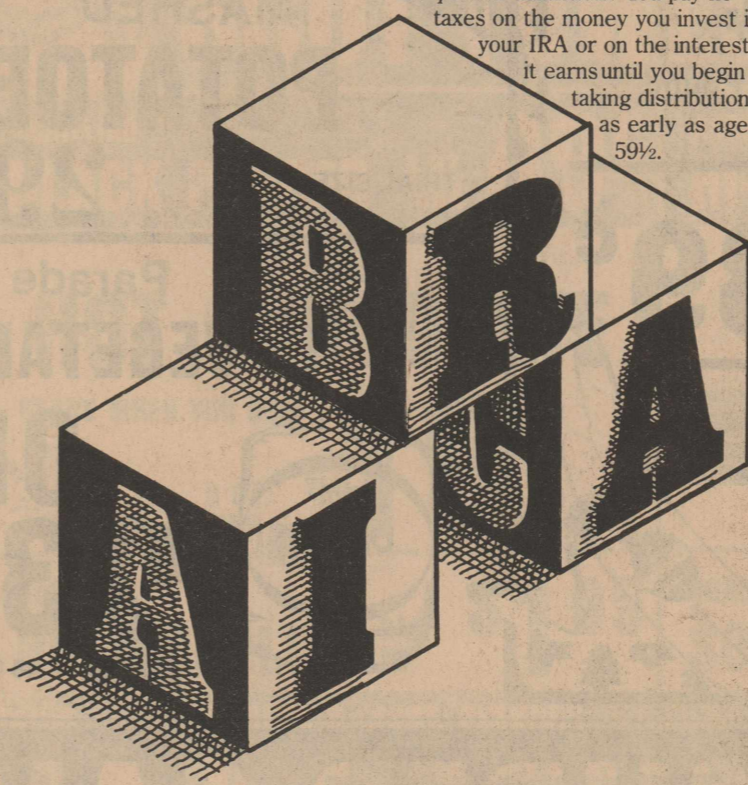

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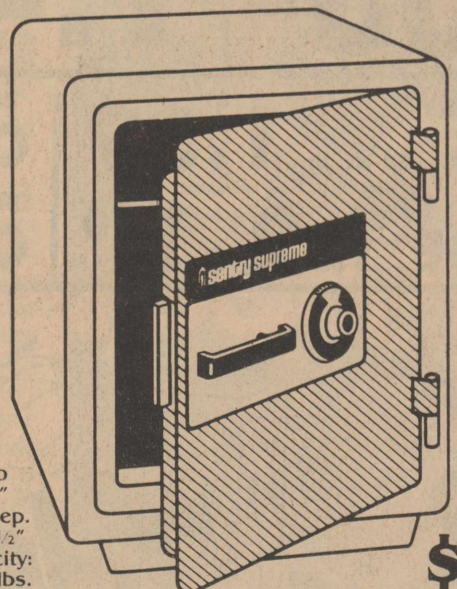
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
