

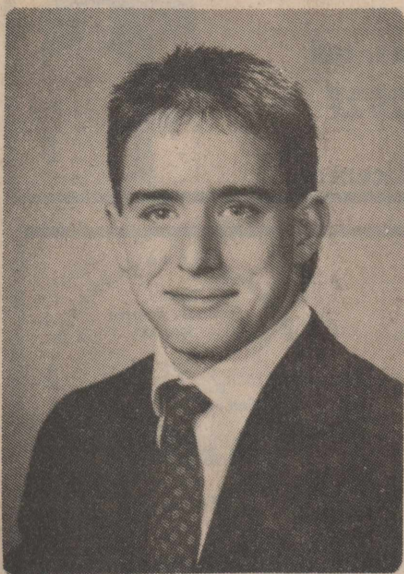

New Mexico Accident Claims Life

Thomas Parker Johnson, 19 of Stratford, died Wednesday January 3, 1990 of injuries sustained in a highway accident in New Mexico. The accident occurred about 8:00 a.m. A Texas Tech University sophomore, Parker, was driving between Eagle Nest and Angle Fire, New Mexico when his vehicle was in collision with a school bus. He was taken to Albuquerque, New Mexico for treatment, where he died about 6:30 p.m. None of the 55-60 children on the bus suffered injuries.

Born in Dumas, Parker had spent all his life in Stratford. He graduated from Stratford High School in 1988 and was in his sophomore year at Texas Tech. He was a member of Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity and First Baptist Church of Stratford.

Survivors are his parents, Jerry and Pat Johnson of Stratford; a sister, Lane Johnson of Amarillo, Grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Taylor of Stratford and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Johnson of Plainview. He was preceded in death by an older brother, Taylor.

Services were held Saturday January 6, 1990 at 2 p.m. at the First Baptist Church with the Rev. Derrel Lewis and the Rev. David Harker, Pastor of the First Christian Church officiating. Burial was in Stratford Cemetery under the direction of Morrison Funeral Directors.

Also traveling with Johnson were Eddie Williams of Stratford and Conrad Kuykendall of Italy, Texas. They were also seriously injured. Williams has been transferred to St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo, Room #560. He is the son of Eddie and Sandy Williams of Stratford.

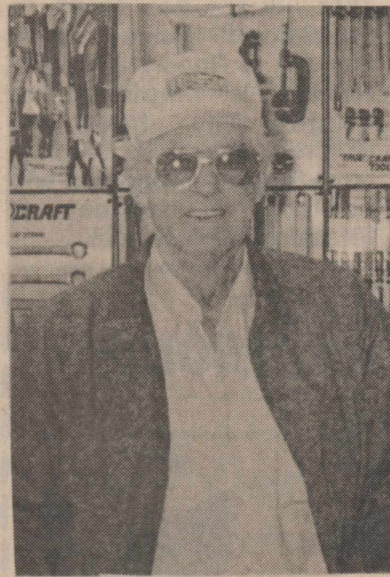
Mr. Sam Brite has been associated with the Stratford Independent School System for twenty years. He was hired in 1969 as Assistant

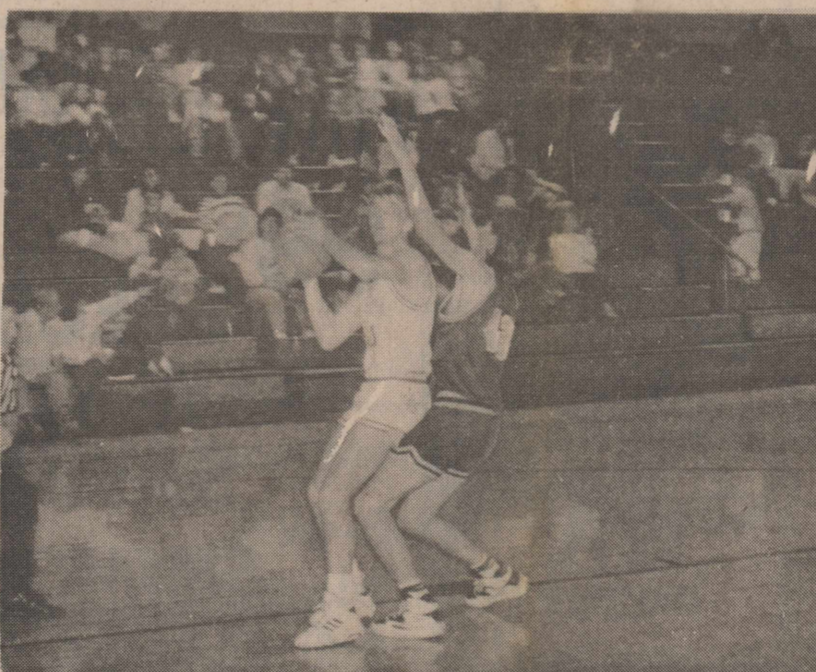

Panhandle Community Services has placed a new Ford Aerostar van in Dalhart to serve the residents of Sherman, Dalham and Hartley Counties. Now, any area residents who are in need of transportation for any reason - medical, social, personal, shopping - may arrange to ride the Panhandle Transit van by calling 396-2021 or 249-5240. Twenty-four hours advance notice is required so that maximum use can be made of the van. The cost for local trips will be 50 cents for a one-way trip with a \$1.00 minimum charge. The van will also make a medical trip once a week to Amarillo. Charges for long-distance trips will be free to the client if he or she is a Medicaid patient and seven cents per mile if the client is not on Medicaid but meets certain income guidelines. If a client does not meet the income guidelines, the cost for the trip will be 25 cents per mile.

Staffing the Dalhart office for Panhandle Transit will be

Darlette Haaland, the driver of the van; Nancy White, scheduler and dispatcher; and Billie Heishell, housing coordinator. In Stratford contact Donita Robertson at the County Judge's Office.

"This is not a welfare program," Bill Whorton, director of the transportation department for PCS said. "I'm afraid some are reluctant to use our service because they think it's 'welfare', but this is a public transportation program funded through the U.S. Department of Transportation and the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation from their Section 18 program."

Everyone could have an occasional need for the service as there is no taxi service in Stratford. It is easy to see how even a person who is temporarily without transportation could make use of this service to do shopping or take care of personal business.

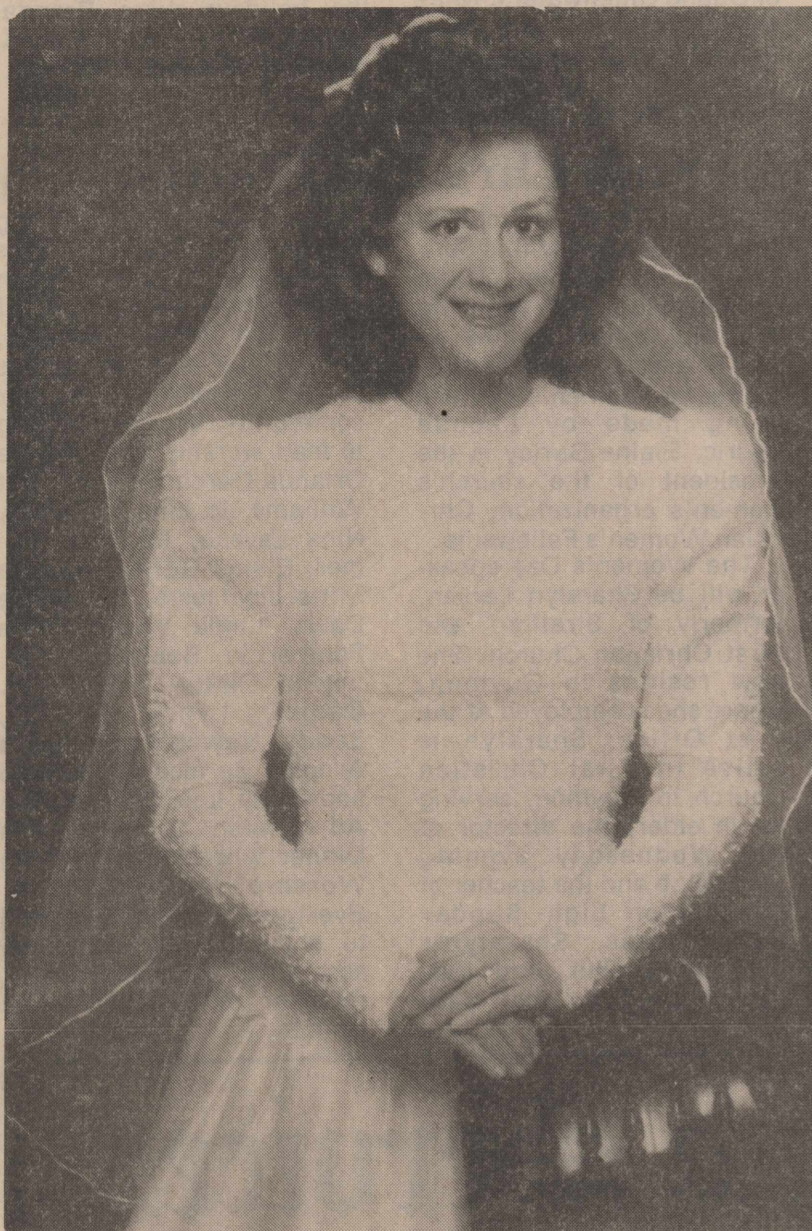

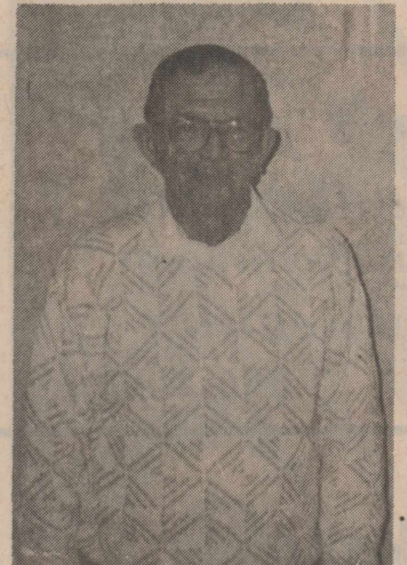
