Plant Trees Now

Someone once said, "The best time to plant a tree was 20 years ago. The next best time is now!" Well, that may not always be true because 1970 was one of the driest years ever in the Texas Panhandle. Stratford recorded 13 inches of rainfall that year. Amarillo had only 9.56 inches that year which is the lowest on record.

Anyway, the point is the sooner you get started planting trees the sooner you can benefit from them. 1970 doesn't seem that long ago and if you had planted some trees for a windbreak or for some other purpose back then it would really be nice

It doesn't take 20 years to establish a windbreak. You can do several things to grow trees healthier and faster. The Sherman County SWCD is selling seedlings which are of very high quality. The evergreens are potted and average about 12 inches tall. Deciduous trees and shrubs come bare rooted and are about 12 to 36 inches depending on species. All bare rooted trees are dug and packaged for shipping just before delivery. This is better than getting large trees grown in pots for a year or two before planting Survival rates are a lot better with these 1 year old seedlings because root systems are in proportion to tree size.

Providing water and eliminating weed and grass

competition is the key to growing trees. All trees must be watered at least the first year or two after planting for survival. Having some type of system to water trees throughout the life of the windbreak is the best situaiton. Weed control is very important on young trees. Seveal chemicals can be used around trees to control weeds. Pre-emergent herbicides are recommended. Plowing or keeping a clean tilled windbreak will cause trees to grow faster than anything. The elimination of weeds and grasses plus the loosening of the soil allows the root systems to spread faster and take in more water. Another method gaining popularity for weed control is the use of a. material called "Magic Mat" which is rolled out along the trees to block weeds from growing. This is a black porous material which allows water and air to penetrate and this keeps the

ground wet longer. These are a few ways to speed up tree growth. Other things to consider are: rabbit and wind protection the first two years, fertilize only after establishment, and watching for disease and insects. Most trees used in this area are very hardy and disease resistant. With good care a windbreak planting of seedlings can start working for you in 3 to 5 years. First **Meeting Held**

New Rates Offered For Purchase Of Rural Real Estate

Long-term loans for the purchase of rural real estate are available from Dalhart Federal Land Bank Association (FLBA) at a fixed interest rate of 9 7/8 percent for 15 years.

The program was announced today by local FLBA President Randy C. Breit-

The loans have a fixed interest rate for 15 years and generally may be amortized for longer terms, with no prepayment penalty. At the end of the 15 year fixed rate

period, the interest rate will convert to the Farm Credit

Bank of Texas variable rate. Loans are available to qualified buyers for new purchases only, and are assumable. A one percent fee will be charged on all loans closed.

The Association also makes rural home loans at 10 1/8 percent fixed for the first 15 years with an automatic conversion after 15 years to • the Bank's variable rural home rate. Loans may be amortized for up to 25 years on qualifying properties.



About 24,500 4-H members live in Texas Districts 1 and 2, which roughly encompass the Panhandle and South Plains. About 383,000 members are in Texas.


VanZandt plans to build a network of 4-H supporters, many former members, throughout the area. Van Zandt sees many as potential volunteers.







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Tips & Topics

People who want to maintain their normal weight or lose extra pounds often end up choosing a weight loss plan that may not be effective, said Dr. Mary Kinney Sweeten, nutritionist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

With all the television, magazine and newspaper advertisements of diet plans and commercial weight loss programs, choosing the right diet can be difficult, she said. Some people may not need a "special diet" at all.

"People with an extra 2 to 5 pounds from overeating can probably drop the weight just by cutting back on extra calories and getting on an execise program, such as walking a mile or two each day," she said.

Some people may benefit from low-fat recipes from a magazine diet plan, but if a person's already 20 to 30 pounds overweight, a significant diet is needed, she

"Although a fad diet may help in the short run, research indicates that 95 percent of the people who go on them regain the weight within a year," Sweeten said.

Before choosing a diet book, class or plan in hopes that it will help you with

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significant and permanent weight loss, Sweeten suggests asking the following questions:

*What's the source of the diet? Is it a reliable health organization?

*How is the effectiveness of the diet documented? Be wary of testimonials by "successful" clients. Ask for figures on long-term maintenance as well. *Are sensational claims

made for the diet? Does it make sense that you can "lose 10 pounds overnight" or "eat all you want" and still lose weight?

*Is the program supervised by qualified personnel, such as a physician or a registered dietitian?

*Along with calorie reduction, does the diet include instruction in behavior and lifestyle modification to help maintain the weight loss? *Is this a one-food diet or liquid diet? In addition to being boring, these diets omit necessary nutrients and can be a danger to your health.

*Is the diet nutritionally balanced? It should include foods from the major food groups of meat, poultry and fish; fruits and vegetables; dairy products; and grains and cereals.

*What is the cost of the diet? If you have to buy special foods, devices, supplements or books, will it be worth it?

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

Farmers, starting on Jan. 1 of this year, were required to start withholding federal income tax from wage of employees.

Employers must keep on file a completed W-4 form for each employee. This W-4 form determines the correct amount to withhold from each paycheck, based on how many exemptions an employee may claim, including dependents and disabili-

Farmers also will have to provide W-2 forms to workers each January, starting this year. These forms will provide details on how much the worker earned and the amount that was paid to Social Security and federal income tax accounts.

Regarding seasonal migrant workers who don't live in the area where the farmer resides, the employers will have to be able to show they made a good faith effort to locate the workers so the W-2 forms could be sent to

This means that the employers should obtain and put the permanent addresses of their workers on file for

Workers who do not earn the minimum taxable wage base of \$4,400 will be eligible to recover all federal taxes that have been deducted. Farmers may want to offer assistance to their workers in obtaining such refunds when warrent-

Farmers should use the IRS Circular E to determine correct withholding rates. They can call IRS too-free-at 800-424-FORM to obtain this circular and other forms.

In addition ,farmers are reminded that the Social Security tax rate for 1990 also increased from 7.51 to 7.65 percent for employers and employees and to 15.3 percent for those who are self-employed.

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


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
