Dear Editor:

In reading Sunday's Amarillo paper two weeks ago, we noticed an article stating that the State Legislative body is trying to diminish the power of the State School Board. This is a power play in politics.

Two years ago the State Board of Education was an appointed School Board. In the general election that year, the people voiced their decision; they wanted an elected Board instead of an appointed Board. This was accomplished, and we now have an elected State School Board. Montie Hassie of Lubbock was elected from our area and the Governor appointed him Chairman of this Board.

Last summer the State School Board decided to fund Vocational Education in the Junior Highs of our state. This funding had been eliminated by the Legislature in lieu of more technical vocational education. This upset the leaders of the Senate, Speaker of the House, and the Governor to a great degree.

To retaliate refunding of an area of education that helps keep students "at risk" in school, the leaders of our Legislative bodies are proposing weaken the authority of the elected State School Board. To us this is a political maneuver to put all of the authority in the hands of the Legislature instead of the hands of the elected State School Board. We urge each of you to support our elected State School Board. It seems that they are more in line with our thinking than the

leaders of our State Legislature.

must be 18 years of age or older, a U.S. Citizen, have a valid drivers license, a social security card and take a written test.

The work consists of driving or walking in designated areas of the county to follow up on addresses that do not respond to the census questionnaire.

The census benefits all Americans. Reapportionment of the U.S. House of Representatives and redrawing of Legislative District boundries are based on census figures, while census numbers are used to distribute Federal, State and Local Government funds to provide assistance to communities for housing, health and human service programs.

Every citizen should be aware that the answers that provide on your questionnaire are confidential. No one except census workers may see your completed form and they can be fined and or imprisioned or any disclosure of your answers. Only after 72 years can your individual census form become available to other government agencies (whether federal, state, county, or local). Until then, no other person or business can see your individual report.

The same law that protects the confidentiality of your answers requires that you provide the information asked in this census to the best of your knowledge.

"Week Of The Young Child"

The Week of the Young Child is an annual celebration to focus public attention on the needs of young children and their families, according to Sherman County Extension Agent, Susie Spurlock. Sponsored by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC), the goal of the week is to build public understanding of the importance of early childhood programs in our society and to foster needed public support for such programs. The theme of this year's celebration is "Quality Child Beginnings Care: Good Never End."

Today more than half of all mothers of preschool children and more than two-thirds of all mothers of school-age children are in the labor force. These numbers are expected to continue to grow throughout the next decade. The number of children living in households headed by a single female has also risen, further expanding the number of families relying on alternative child care arrangements. Call Trace - enables the customer to initiate a trace of the last incoming call received. The number, date and time will be recorded by Southwestern Bell Telephone so that the call's origin can be identified.

Selective Call Forwarding - enables the customer to forward incoming calls from specified telephone numbers (maximum of three) to another telephone number.







If you do not receive your 1989 Forms W-2, "Wage and Tax Statement," by January 31, you should contact your employer(s) to request it and to be sure they have your correct

If you still have not received your W-2(s) by February 15, you should call IRS. The IRS will ask for your employer's name, address, and social security number or employer identification number.

You should also notify your employer if you find an error on your W-2 statement so the correct information will be shown.

If you are not able to obtain a W-2 statement, contact IRS about how to reconstruct your wage information so you can file your tax return. The IRS toll-free number is 1-800-424-1040.

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

He or she can prescribe the diet, exercise and medication if any is needed, that can keep it under control. Most diabetics don't need insulin. However, a million do. For them, a new kind of human insulin has been developed using recombinant DNA. It's less likely than pork or beef insulin to cause an immune reaction.

Caution: Tranquilizers and Such May Be Hazardous To Health

Urging the public to be wary of tranquilizers, mood elevating drugs and other psychiatric drugs, experts cite these documented cases of trouble:

*In 1988, an Arizona man shot and

killed his daughter and her best friend and then killed himself. He had been undergoing treatment for mental illness with several psychiatric drugs prior to the murder/suicide. *That same year, a woman in California allegedly stabbed her mother to death with a butcher knife. She had no record of

had recently been released from a psychiatric institution. There she had been treated with two psychiatric tranquilizers. *In 1982, a man stabbed his girlfriend to death. He had been treated in psychiatric institutions for many years with numerous mind-altering drugs and major

violence prior to killing her mother, but

psychiatric tranquilizers. *In 1988, a woman walked into an Illinois classroom and shot six children, killing one. She then killed herself. Subsequent blood tests revealed that she had a psychiatric drug in her veins at the time

of her murderous rampage. Use of psychiatric drugs can sometimes do much more harm than good, say experts at the Citizens Commission for Human Rights, established by the Church of Scientology, as psychiatric drugs cause violence in our society and can sometimes, says the church group, "be a

Withholding that Fits

Employees should check their federal tax withholding early in the year to see if their withholding level is cor-

The IRS says that employees can tailor their taxes to wind up with little tax owed or to be refunded.

Generally, tax law requires employees to have enough tax withheld from their wages or make quarterly estimated tax payments sufficient to equal 90 percent of their total 1990 tax bill.

Employees who find they are having too little or too much tax withheld should file another W-4 withholding form with their employer.



Some exceptions to this advice from the IRS are that this does not apply to trees that do not bear fruits, nuts or other crops, or ornamental trees (ornamental trees do not include evergreens that are more than six years old at the time of cutting). Also, growers of pistachio trees may elect not to capitalize preproductive costs.
