

P. J. Pronger Completes Economic Development Training









The Breast Cancer Screening Project of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer. 

"Several factors made these savings for customers possible," Diller said. "For example, expenses related to the purchase of power from other electric companies were reduced. Also, we were able to negotiate for lower fuel contracts at our power plants. Additionally, this credit includes customers' share of the proceeds made from off-system sales to other electric utilities. The net result is lowered costs for our customers."

Of the \$20.7 million requested credit, about \$11.2 million accumulated since the beginning of the year. This primarily was due to the delay in getting approval from the Texas commission to implement a new lower "fuel-cost recovery factor." SPS's orginal request, filed in November 1989, was to implement the lower "fuel-cost recovery factor" by Jan. 1. The factor was ultimately implemented on April bills, Diller said, resulting in an overall 9.6 percent rate decrease.

Doyle Moore, SPS's Panhandle Division manager, said continued savings in fuel expenses will help the area economy.

"SPS expends significant effort to keep its fuel expenses down. And since the cost of fuel makes up about half of an electric bill, that's very important to the customer," he said. "By continuing to be a low-cost producer of power, SPS is sending the message that this part of the country is a great place for relocating and expanding businesses.

Moore noted that SPS's industrial rates already are among the lowest in the nation.

"We are active in economic-development activities in our region, and we are pleased to be able to pass this savings to our customers," he said.



PROPERTY TAX APPRAISAL PROTEST AND APPEAL PROCEDURES

A property owner may protest the appraised value of his property or any other action by the chief appraiser, the appraisal district, or the appraisal review board (ARB) that adversely affects the property owner. A property owner must file a written notice of protest with the ARB.

- 1) it identifies the protesting property owner (including a person claiming an
- 2) it identifies the property that is the subject of the protest; and
- 3) it indicates dissatisfaction with some determination of the appraisal office.

A Notice of Protest form is available from the ARB or the State Property Tax Board.

- The usual deadline is midnight (if mailed and postmarked) on May 31. If the appraisal notice was mailed to you on May 2 or later, or if your protest concerns change in use of land appraised as agricultural, open space, or timber land, the deadline is midnight of the
- If the protest concerns a change made by the ARB, the deadline is midnight of the 10th day after
- If you received no notice, the deadline is midnight of the day before taxes become delinquent for
- If you have good cause for missing a deadline, the deadline is midnight of the day before the ARB approves the appraisal records. The ARB decides if you had good cause. Good cause is something beyond a person's control, such as a medical emergency.
- If you are dissatisfied with the ARB's decision, you may file suit in district court. You must file your petition with the district court within 45 days after you receive the ARB's final order.
- If your property's appraised value is more than \$1 million, you must also file a written notice of appeal. File this with the chief appraiser within 15 days after you receive the ARB's final order.



Protecting **Employee Privacy**

Legislation to protect workers against discrimination by employers due to off-the-job activities is now pending in 12 states.

The legislative proposals, though not identical in any two states, would make it illegal for an employer to fire or refuse to hire a worker because of involvement in any legal activity outside of work. This would include certain sports, eating habits and the choice to smoke, as well as various other activities

In Colorado, one of the states presently contemplating such legislation, the House of Representatives passed a measure to prohibit employers from preventing workers from engaging in any legal activity after hours. According to The Rocky Mountain News, many legislators felt that if outside activities could be banned by employers today, anything someone else found offensive would be fair game tomorrow. New Field Tests--Latest Word On Russian Wheat Aphid Research

In a wheat field 25 miles west of Guymon, Okla., entomologist David K. Reed USDA's Agricultural of Research Service has made a release of two species of imported wasps--natural enemies of the Russian wheat aphid.

The aphids, pests of wheat, barley, rye and forage grasses, recently invaded the U.S. and are now in 16 western states.

What's unique about the test is that these tiny parasitic wasps have been "fingerprinted." The fingerprints are photographed patterns of the insects' proteins that have been pulled by electricity across a gel.

The test sets the stage for a research "whodunnit." It will allow Reed to tell, this summer, whether dead Russian wheat aphids were killed by the fingerprinted wasps or by some other parasite such as a strain of one of the same species released decades ago to kill another pest, the greenbug.

The results also could help scientists tell whether the test strains should be mass released against the aphids.

The wasps lay their eggs inside the pest. Eggs develop into larvae that feed inside the aphid, killing it. During warm weather a new generation of parasites develops in about 10 days.

On April 26, Reed released about 2,000 "mummies''--dead aphids containing wasp larvae--and a few adult wasps. Between May 23 and June 6 he expects to know whether the wasps--

Aphidius matricariae from Turkey and Diaeretiella rapae from the Soviet Union are reproducing in their new environment.

Finding good places for the wasps was no problem. About 80 percent of the wheat plants in part of an unsprayed field near Guymon were infested. "We found large numbers of lady beetles feeding on the aphids at 'hot spots' but no parasites such as wasps," Reed said. At hot spots he made the releases.

While visiting the County Extension Service office in Guymon, Reed was told about the site by the son in law of the landowner, Lee Johnson, who offered to let the scientists use the field. On May 14, while Reed and fellow researchers are enroute to Colorado to observe the aphid problem. he will pick up mummies near the release site. On returning to Stillwater about May 21, he and ARS entomologist Gary J. Pukerka will analyze the wasp proteins or develop colonies to be analyzed within the following two weeks using a fingerprinting technique.

Last fall Reed began rearing the D.rapae strain, shipped from the ARS European Parasite Laboratory, Behoust, France, via quarantine at the agency's Beneficial Insects Research Laboratory, Newark, Del. He started rearing colonies of A. matricariae in 1988.

In April, the USDA issued a two-page summary of research progress against the aphid at seven ARS laboratories.

You love antiques, but when you bring them into your home they sometimes bring a musty smell. You may be able to enjoy your antiques without the smell. Here's how: * To remove musty odors in enclosed parts of the furniture -inside drawers or cabinet doors, for example, first open drawers and doors to air. Next, wash and scrub the insides throughly with a mild soap and hot water. Be careful not to soak the wood. Quickly dry damp surface with a towel and leave doors and drawers open for a day or two. When throughly dried and aired, spray with a cedar deodorizer or place your favorite sachet of potpourri inside to keep it smelling fresh. To rid old wicker of mildew, rub the mildewed spots with a cloth dipped in a mixture of ammonia and water. The cleaning cloth should be squeezed well to avoid saturating the wood, which could discolor it. Give

cleaned areas a mild salt-water bath and dry in the sun.





To clean a mildewed rug or piece of tapestry, take it outside and brush away any loose mold. If you do this indoors, you could inadvertenly spread mold spores throughout the house. Vacuum away loosened mold and dispose of vacuum bags immediately in an outdoor trash can. Use a fan to dry damp spots. Remove mildew stains with a rug shampoo. Pass a clean, damp sponge over soaped areas until soap is gone, then dry. Buff with a shoe cream in a matching color to restore the leather's suppleness.

Knowing the preferred meal of the Russian wheat aphid has set a new course for controlling the costly insect on U.S. grain.

When the Russian Wheat aphid dines, scientists have found that it goes for a sickly, stressed plant--not a healthy stalk. Diagnosing the crop's condition, therefore, will help determine when a farmer should spray insecticide to control the bug.

A joint effort of scientists in five states is adding the new dimension to the computerized economic threshold models that calculate control needs.

'By the summer, we will have a modified threshold," said Dr. Tom, Archer, a Texas Agricultural Experiment Station entomologist in Lubbock who is on the national team.

aphid invaded the U.S. in 1986 near Lubbock, the state's farmers have spent almost \$11 million battling the yield-reducing bug, according to Rodney Mosier of Amarillo, Texas Wheat Growers Association executive assistant.

In 1989, farmers spent \$1.7 million to control the aphid and still lost more than 4.6 million bushels to insect damage, he said.

Within two years of the Russia wheat aphid'a arrival U.S. entomologists had devised a formula to determine control based on the percentage of aphid-infested tillers. Prior to that, the only control recommendations were from South Africa, where control was based on the amount of damage that could have bee seen in a field.

"If someone is growing a high-value crop, and they have put a lot of money into "their it," Archer said, threshold is different than for one who is just growing wheat for whatever it will bring.

Wheat production differs from most other crops. Texas wheat is planted in the fall and harvested early the following summer. Some producers allow cattle to graze the fields until the spring, then harvest what grows after the animals are removed. Others do not allow grazing, aiming instead for higher grain yields. A portion is irrigated, the rest is dryland farmed.

The myriad of those treatments results in wheat fields in varied conditions. That led scientists to explore the relationship of production methods to Russian wheat aphid control.

"With the new model, we will be able to tell the farmer, based on the irrigation and rain level, when to control," Archer said. "If a dryland field has had a lot of rain, it may have drought."

Wheat production varies even more throughout other growing states, Archer pointed out, so the network of scientists is vital to

developing the new economic threshold model.

"The Russian wheat aphid has spread from Texas to Canada and west to the Pacific coast in every state," he said. "The rest of the country is not like Texas, so we have put together a group of people in the distribution region including Colorado, Montana, Washington and California.''

Archer said that the new model, ready when most of the 1991 crop is planted in about five months, probably will be offered as a service by county Extension agents.

'It will be a computer program in which the county Extension agent helps the farmer answer a set of questions about the wheat crop -- like whether it is irrigated, how much rain has

been received and what variety the crop is," Archer said. "Then it will ask information about the Russian wheat aphid, such as the level of investation. From this, the program will tell the probability of yield and the gain or loss from spraying or not."

He said the computer model eventually will be updated to account for the number of aphid predators or parasites in the field to form even more precise control decisions.

The computerized control decisions, however, will aid farmers until scientists can breed plants resistant to the aphid or devise more biological control through parasites.

"The Russian wheat aphid is here to stay," he said. "Right now the only control is with pesticides. If we can come up with resistant plants or biological control, we will be better able to deal with outbreaks.

USDA Scientists Identify Barley That Resists Aphid Pest

Stillwater, Okla. Nine barleys that stand up to the

profitably grown for livestocks feeds in aphid-infested areas. And at least one major brewing company is using them to develop new varieties of malting barley that can be grown without insecticides.

Among U.S. cereal crops, barley ranks fourth behind

corn, wheat and sorghum.

All 524 barley lines screened at Stillwater came from the agency's National Small Grain Collection in Aberdeen, Idaho. They had been identified as the most tikely candidates by the late David H. Smith, Jr., the collection's former curator.

The six lines showing the most aphid resistance in Webster's tests are native to the Middle East, where both barley and the Russian MOTHER'S originated. One of the six bad been collected in Iran **DAY May**13 by a U.S. diplomat in 1919. The rest were brought from northwest Afganistan by an English scientist in 1966.

Webster concluded that five of the resistant lines were not hospitable to the aphids after tests revealed the aphids bore 30 to 45 percent fewer nypmhs--the first, immature form of the pest--than on a standard barley variety, Vintermalt.



Russian wheat aphid could soon help end the pest's extensive damage to the U.S. crop, according to a scientist with the Agricultural Research Service.

"In our research we found that resistant barley remained safe from damage in two ways," said ARS entomolo-gist James A. Webster. "At least five of the barley lines weren't hospitable places for aphids to reproduce. And some lines thrived despite heavy feeding by aphids."

To find the nine resistant barleys, Webster sifted through 524 different lines and ran rigorous tests in growth chambers and greenhouses at the Plant Science Research Laboratory here. ARS, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Chief scientific arm, operates the lab. He said Colorado State

University agronomists are running field tests to see if the resistant lines might be

The aphid was first spotted in the U.S.--in Texas--in 1986. Since then, said Webster, it has cost wheat, barley and rye farmers more than \$240 million in damage and control efforts. Figures on its damage to barley aren't yet available, he added, but only three large barley-producing areas in North America remain free of the pest--Those in Minnesota, North Dakota and Manitoba, Canada.

In 1987, he noted, the Russian wheat aphid wiped out about 10,000 acres of barley in the Nebraska panhandle. And in 1989, about 40 percent, or 64,000 acres, of the feed and malting barley havested in Colorado was sprayed with chemical insecticide for

In other tests, six of the lines, when heavily infested with aphids, produced 94 to 113 percent more foliage than infested Wintermalt.

Stillwater researchers hope to find more sources of resistance by screening all 26,000 barley lines at Aberdeen, he said. To speed up the screening, they are searching for biochemical markers of resistance. Subsequently, they will insert genes for resistance into agronomically acceptable barley varieties.

Screening studies also are under way for the 43,000 lines of wheat at Aberdeen. Scientists at Stillwater have uncovered resistance genes in wheat, rye, triticale (a manmade cross of wheat and rye) and forage grasses. The pest attacks some grasses and inhabits them between grain crop seasons.
