You are invited to bring the entire family for supper.

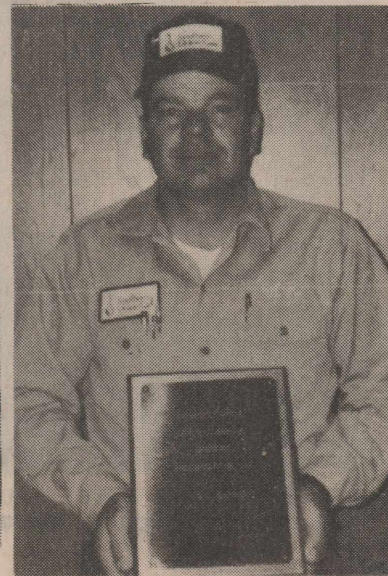

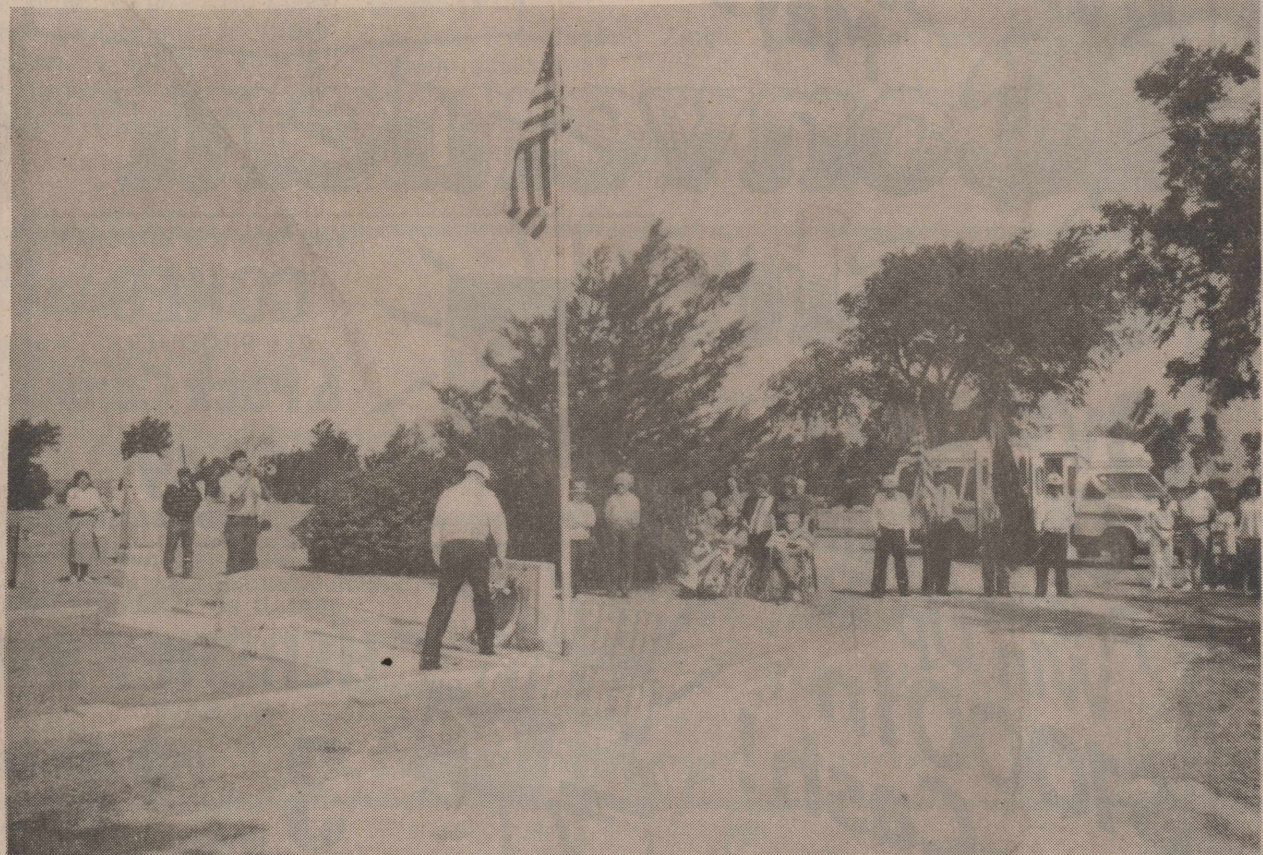

Iris Anna McIlroy

Dalhart- Mrs. Earl (Iris Crow) McIlroy, 90 died Thursday, May 24, 1990 in St. Anthony's Hospice in Amarillo.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday May 26th in the Denver Avenue Church of Christ, with Gaylord Cook, minister, and C.A. Brown of Wylie officiating. Burial was in Memorial Park Cemetery By Schooler-Gordon Funeral Directors.

Mrs. McIlroy was born May 17, 1900 in Johnson Co., Texas near Grandview. When she was two she and her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Crow, moved to Washington State. The family moved to Dalhart in 1905.

Iris had her elementary education in Dalhart and secondary education in Kansas. She attended the University of Texas in Austin for library certification & Colorado A&M in Fort Collins for further library instruction.

Iris married W. Earl McIlroy on December 26, 1928 in Amarillo.

She was the Dallam County Librarian from 1921 thru 1942.

She was considered the mother of the first County Library in Dalhart. She considered her most complimentary offer from Denton where Texas Woman's University & North Texas State Univ. are located. Iris was asked to establish the Denton County Library and become their Librarian. The offer was extended on the recommendation of the State Librarian at that time.

Mrs. McIlroy remained in Dalhart and in 1942 retired to help Earl in the family business, McIlroy Furniture, which was established in 1940.

In 1982 Mrs. McIlroy was chosen "Old Timer of the Year," by the Inter-State Fair Board.

She was a member of the Denver Avenue Church of Christ.

Survivors are her husband Earl of the home; a daughter, Earlene Warren of Amarillo and one son, Ted McIlroy of Stratford; one brother Loyd Crow of Hendersonville, Tex.; one sister, Lois Crow of Dalhart; seven grandchildren, 17 great grandchildren and two great great grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by one son, Bob McIlroy.

The family requests memorials be to the Amarillo Christian School or St. Anthony's Hospice & Life Enrichment Center.

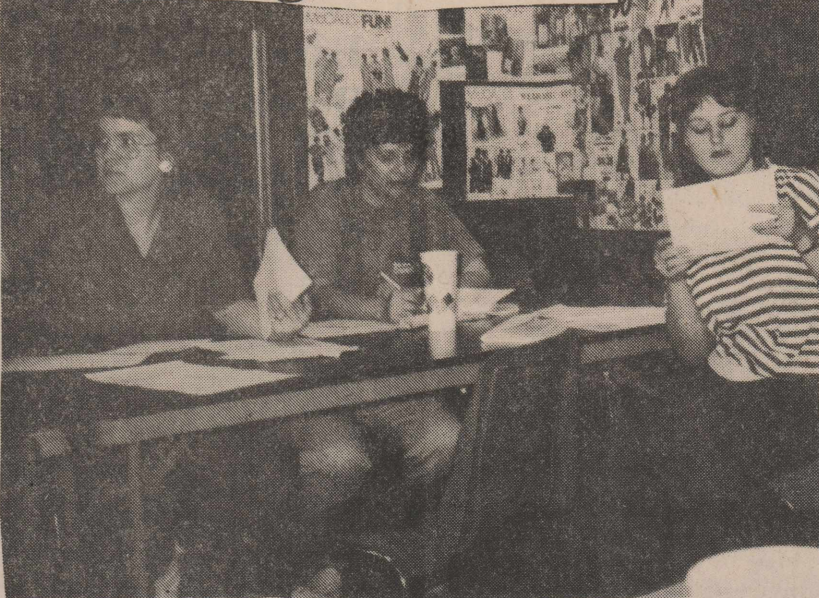

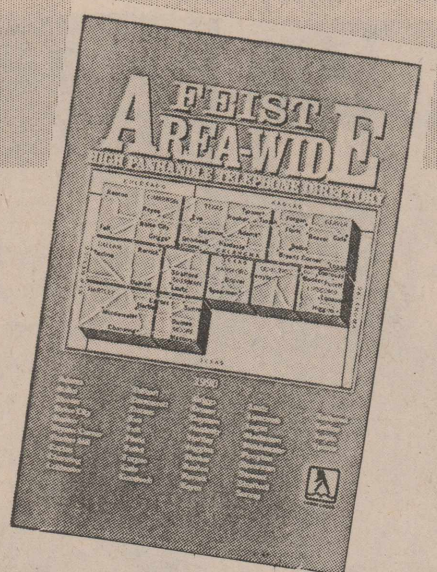

CASA 69, Inc. Sponsors Coloring Contest

CASA 69, Inc. is sponsoring a coloring contest in Dallam, Hartley, Moore and Sherman Counties. The Children's artwork will be used for a variety of projects such as craft book, notecards bookmarks etc. The contest will be open to 6 to 10 year old children in the four county area. A grand prize of \$25.00 will be awarded and each category will award \$15.00 for 1st place, \$10.00 for 2nd place and \$5.00 for 3rd place. The artwork will be judged and then displayed at a later date. All winners will be notified by mail and announced thru the local newspaper. CASA 69, Inc. is a non-profit organization that provides trained community volunteers to serve as court appointed special advocates. Our CASA volunteers advocate for abused and neglected children whose home placement is being decided by the court system, we serve the children of Dallam, Hartley, Moore and Sherman Counties. The contest rules are as follows:

1. Age 6 to 10 years old.
2. Entry should be made on an 8 x 10 sheet of white paper with the child's name, age, mailing address and

entry category printed on the back of the page.

3. ANY FOUR COLORS may be used on the drawing. Crayons, colored pencils, or fine point markers should be used.

4. A child may enter any one or all categories.

5. The categories are: A. Happy family (drawing of family or family activity). B. Fun with Toys or Music. C. What makes you think of Christmas? E. What makes you think of Easter? D. What makes you think of Halloween?

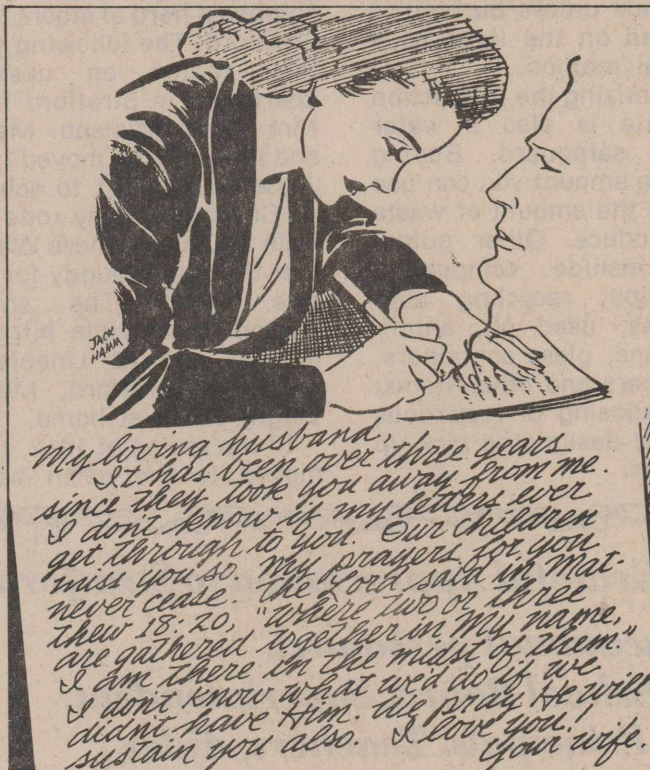

Midyear Crop & Livestock Reports

Beginning June 1, representative from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will begin contacting farmers & ranchers across the state to help set the 1990 planted acreage estimates & midyear livestock inventories.

State Statistician Dennis Findley emphasized that information from these surveys will help producers adjust their production & marketing plans for 1990. "Good marketing requires good information & advanced planning." "There are many uncertainties facing agriculture," Findley added, "and accurate, reliable figures will give producers a chance to make sound production and marketing decisions during the coming year."

Results of the confidential interviews, conducted by telephone or in person by field enumerators, will be published later this summer. The 1990 planted acreage report will be released June 28 and the U.S. Cattle inventory will be released July 27.

To reduce survey costs, Findley is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionnaires as soon as possible. Individual

the Texas Panhandle Nov. 11, 1918. They came by train, accompanied by their five children, and bringing some household goods. These five children were, Walker, Jim, Virgie, Geneva and Ray. Three children, Winnie, Joe Pete and Mary Frances were born in the Panhandle.

They settled in the Murdock Community, just west of the present town of Kerrick-engaging in farming and stock raising.

Stratford was the nearest town and this is where we

Protecting Our Water We Drink

Protecting the water we drink is a responsibility that all of us share. Although scientists, engineers, legislators, water plant operators and regulatory officials keep our drinking water supply available, affordable and safe, consumers can do much to protect themselves.

Monitoring water sources and supplies can help prevent contamination. Municipal water supplies are regulated by water quality professionals, but wells in rural areas are the property owner's responsibility. To make sure the water your family uses is safe, have the water tested regularly. For more information on water testing, call your county Extension office or your local Health Department.

Another safety measure is the wise use of household, lawn, garden and agricultural chemicals. After you decide that the use of a chemical is indeed necessary purchase only the amount you need and follow directions carefully.

Store chemicals appropriately and safely as well. Close chemical containers securely and store them in a dry location out of the reach of children and pets, wildlife and irresponsible adults. Chemicals should not be allowed to spill or mix together and should never be mixed or disposed of near a well.

The safe disposal of chemicals is a most important concern. Experts advise the following guidelines use up chemical or give what's left to a neighbor; follow instructions on the label for disposing of leftover products; contact an appropriate waste management or pollution control agency for advice on unusual disposal problems; do not put leftovers down the drain or in the toilet; do not pour concentrated chemicals, paint thinners or similar substances on the ground; do not burn leftover chemicals unless burning is specified on the label as a disposal method.

Minimizing the production of waste is also a water quality safeguard. Buying only the amount you can use lessens the amount of waste you produce. Other guidelines include composting vegetation; recycling auto batteries, used oil, aluminum cans, glass containers, newspapers and other items; and disposing of hazardous waste at designated pick up locations.

did most of our trading. For the first few years the grain was hauled to Stratford in wagons. Stratford was also our Post Office until one was established in Kerrick in 1931.

There was a school in the Murdock Community for the first eight grades. Then we went to Stratford for high school. Except for the oldest child, the other seven Taylor children graduated from Stratford High School. The family moved to town in the winter and back to the farm in summer in order for them to attend high school.

Joe Taylor came to the Panhandle expecting to go into the cattle business, but the devastating winter of 1918-19 put so many cattlemen out of business that his plans were changed. He turned to breaking out sod and farming-raising mostly milo and corn. As corn became more plentiful, the raising of hogs became more important. Mr. Taylor bought and shipped hogs from the stockpens in Stratford for a number of years. He had certain days to ship and people brought hogs from this whole region-many came for miles in wagons.

After the town of Kerrick was built, the Taylors build a new home and Mr. and Mrs. Taylor lived there the rest of their lives. He died in 1971 and she died in 1977. They are buried in the Stratford Cemetery. Surviving their parents are Jim, Virgie, Geneva, Winnie and Mary. Jim and Mary are Stratford residents, Virgie lives at Kerrick, Geneva at Griggs, Oklahoma and Winnie lives at Truth or Consequences, N.M.

Walter Peleg James, born in the Choctaw Nation in 1878, married Mettie Ivie Taylor in 1902. She was born in 1884 at Newbern, Tennessee. The Jameses had come to near Spanish Fort, Texas from Virginia in 1870, the Taylors in 1893 to what was the Greer County, Texas and later a part of Oklahoma.

In 1898 Walter's father looked at grass near Dalhart. He died soon, but in 1901 his widow and sons Walter and Andy established a ranch west of Stratford between Dalhart and Boise City.

Walter spent his time wintering cattle at Altus, Oklahoma and summering them in the Panhandle. Mettie's first trip to the ranch was in 1903. The family made the permanent move in 1910. Mettie drove a buggy behind a herd of cattle with her young sons Jesse, Peachy and Andy, fording a dangerously swollen Canadian River in the process.

That year no rain fell from April until August, so the cowboys were busy fighting grass fires set by lightning. In the fall the Jameses shipped a herd of steers from Stratford. The following year they rented an upstairs apartment in Stratford from Mrs. Frank Watson. Mettie and the children moved in so Jesse could start to school. At Christmas, they rode the train to Conlen where Walter met them in a buggy for the ride home. The snows started the terrible blizzard of 1911 and 12. Unable to return to Stratford, Mettie taught Jesse at home.

In the spring of 1912, they moved to the north head-

quarters in Oklahoma & lived there the next ten years. This was an especially happy time in their life. Tom, Frank, Joe Bob, Newt, and Fannie Sue were born. Walter loved the range and working with cattle. Mettie liked to talk, and Cimarron County was rapidly being settled. Four children of her deceased sister came to live with them for a couple of years. Also Joe Taylor and Fannie Elms and families had moved into the area. Sundays were happy times of visiting with relatives & friends.

The ranch was located north of the Beaver on a line from Boise City to Stratford. Many old timers recall when they freighted, they managed to stop there at noon. They knew there was always plenty of meat, biscuits and gravy, potatoes, brown beans and dried fruit for one more. The enormous cattle loss from the blizzards of 1918-19 and the sharp drop in cattle prices brought about the breakup of the James Bros. Ranch. They continued to ship & freight from Stratford, so when the need for better schools arrived the choice was again in Stratford.

They bought the old Blackburn house in 1922. Here the twins, Louis and Lois, were born. They attended the Baptist Church. Walter served on the School Board and Mettie enjoyed Misisonary Society.

Summers were often spent at the place west of Kerrick. In the early thirties they rented the home in Stratford and moved to Kerrick. Two rooms were reserved in the house in town for the high school boys to "batch". In 1935 Walter died, and Mettie moved back and forth, until her school days were over in 1942, when she sold the house to the Folsoms and moved to Kerrick.

Mettie died in 1975 and is buried beside Walter in the Stratford Cemetery.

All the boys followed in their father's footsteps and became ranchers. Jesse and Flora (Robinson) are retired and live in La Junta, Colorado. They had four

children, Mettie Lee, Jesse Jr., Virginia, and Susie, Twelve grandchildren and nineteen great grandchildren.

Walter Jr., or Peachy as he was known, died in 1955. His widow Dolores (Patterson) still lives in Boise City. They had seven children, Bonnie Ivie, Walter III, Joann, Joe, Frankie, Tom, and Jesse, Twelve grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

Andy A. married Mary Ingham and they had two children, Bob and Barbara. Mary passed away in 1985. Andy married Mildred Garst Ingham and they are the only Jameses who now live in Stratford. Andy has four grandchildren, and four great grandchildren.

Tom married Dorris Showalter and lived near Eads, Colorado. He died in 1989 leaving three children, Ken, Deborah, and Andrew, and eight grandchildren.

Frank and Blanche (Crabtree) live near Boise City and

have three children, Kay, Gwynn, and Ben Tom, and five grandchildren.

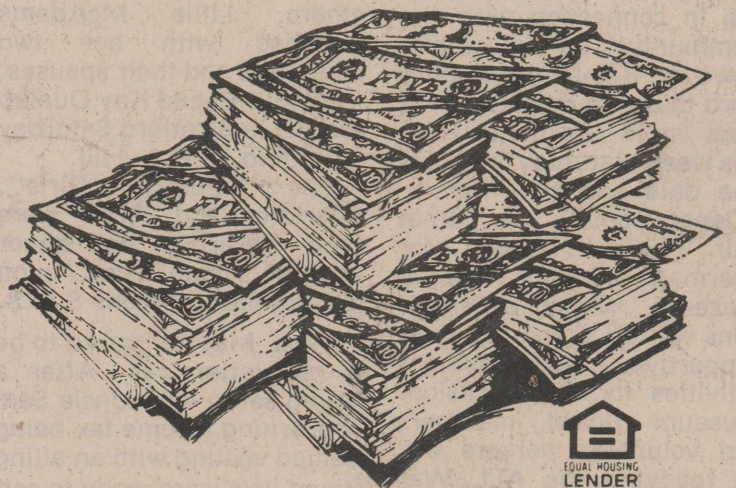
Joe Bob lives on the state line south of Boise City. He has two children, Richard and Janet, and two grandchildren.

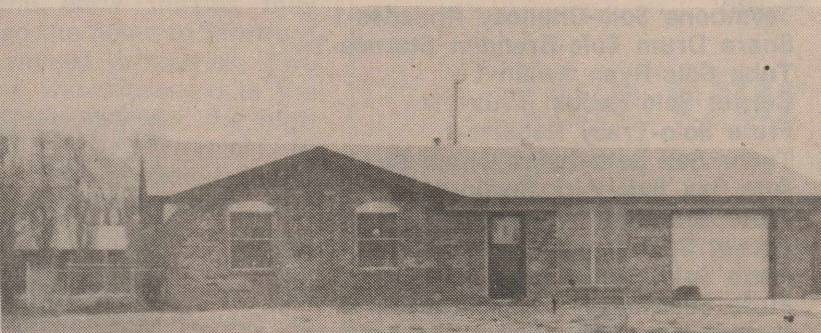
