Report To Taxpayers

On May 31 the Appraisal District had collected 98.29 percent of 1989 taxes owed the taxing units. Broken down the collection rates are: County, 98.78; City Stratford 94.65; City Texhoma 94.40; Stratford School 98.40; Stratford Hospital 98.59; Moore Co. Hospital, 99.01; North Plains Water 99.08.

Marillyn Albert, Chief Appraiser and Tax Collector stated that there would be additional collections prior to July 1 which would cause the percentage rate to increase. On July 1 an additional cost is added on unpaid taxes. This makes the penalty, interest and costs to jump to 33% of the unpaid taxes. Then each month thereafter there is a smaller increase.

In addition to collection of current delinquent (1989) taxes there is an ongoing effort to collect all other delinquent taxes. As a result of recent "Notice of Seizure and Sale" action a total of \$3972.33 was collected on certain accounts.

Several foreclosure sale tax suits are pending. A dozen taxpayers have signed payment agreements and are making regular payments on delinquent taxes.

Albert said that the Appraisal District Board Members, who represent all taxing units in the district, encourage and expect collection efforts. "The position of the board is that it is unfair to those who do pay, and most do pay promptly, for others to ignore their tax liability", Albert said.

Tips & Topics

June is Dairy Month! Our thoughts turn to cold treats such as ice cream, sherbet, yogurt, and even cold foods, like cheese. It is my pleasure to share with you information from the Associated Milk Producers on the Recommended Daily Allowances of Nutrition update and in particular, the requirements for calcium.

The National Research Council's (NRC) tenth edition of the Recommended Dietary Allowances (RDA) offers new advice on calcium, based on research demonstrating that adequate dietary calcium intake-particularly during young adulthood-can defer and perhaps prevent osteoporosis.

This new edition of the RDA's, a result of two years of effort by an NRC subcommittee of nutrition experts, recommends an average daily intake of 1200 mg. of calcium for adolescents and young adults through age 24-as compared to 18 years in previous editions.

This change reflects the current scientific consensus

that bone formation continues through the early 20's, even though bones stop growing in length at about 18. The calcium allowance for adults 25 years of age and older remain the same as before-800 mg. per day.

"The subcommittee believes the most promising nutritional approach to reducing the risk of osteoporosis in later life is to ensure a calcium intake that allows the development of each individual's...peak bone mass," according to this first update of the RDA's in nearly a decade. "It urges that special attention be paid to calcium intakes throughout childhood to age 25 years."

The 1200 mg RDA for calcium for younger people, as well as the 800 mg RDA for those 25 and older, "can be easily obtained if dairy products are included in the diet," the NRC states in its 285 page publication.

"Because of the potential impact and reach of the RDA's, we are especially

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has instituted a Class Action Lawsuit seeking judicial approval of a settlement reached in Docket No. 7297, an inquiry of General Counsel of the Public Utility Commission of Texas into possible overcharges which occurred between September, 1976, and February, 1987, due to rounding practices, on bills of intrastate WATS/800 customers sent by Southwestern Bell and other telephone companies which concur in Southwestern Bell's tariff. The suit is styled "Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Plaintiff, vs. MCI Telecommunications Corporation, A Member of the Class of Texas Intrastate WATS and 800 Service Customers Who Paid Overtime Charges From September 1976 Through February 1987, Defendant," and identified as Cause No. 471,460 in the 126th Judicial District Court of Travis County, Texas.

Pursuant to the settlement, while not admitting liability, Southwestern Bell, the other local exchange telephone companies in Texas, and AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. have agreed to pay refunds to those WATS/800 customers who paid overtime charges attributable to the rounding practices for intrastate WATS/800 services at any time between September, 1976, and February, 1987. The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

Claim Forms And Additional Information

Those customers who think they may be entitled to a refund or who desire more information must call 1-800-782-3026, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, or write to WATS Refund Pool Administrator, One Bell Plaza, Room 670, P. O. Box 650376, Dallas, Texas 75265-0376, to request a WATS Refund Information Package. The WATS Refund Information Package will contain further information regarding the lawsuit and eligibility for a refund, a description of documentation required to support a customer's claim for refund, and a refund claim form to be filled out and submitted requesting a refund. REQUESTING A WATS REFUND INFORMATION PACKAGE DOES NOT OBLIGATE YOU IN ANY WAY.

All claims for a refund must be received by the Refund Pool Administrator by Friday, October 5, 1990, and all rejections of the settlement (that is, requests for exclusion from the class action lawsuit) must be received by the Court by Wednesday, September 5, 1990. Only those who respond by filing a claim or by filing a rejection of the settlement, as explained in the WATS Refund Information Package, will receive notice of future developments in this proceeding.

pleased that this new edition includes such a strong message regarding the health benefits of calcium," said Anita Owen, R.D., senior vice president of Nutrition Education and Research at National Dairy Council. "This recommendation echoes the landmark Surgeon General's Report on Nutrition and Health that advised consuming the RDA for calcium as a major public health strategy for preventing osteoporosis."

The RDA's are used extensively throughout the country in a variety of ways: by doctors and dietitians in patient counseling, by food manufacturers to develop new food products and to provide product information on food labels, in USDA and FDA federal food programs and in school programs that teach children proper nutrition.

Even with the increase in the calcium RDA for young adults, the RDA's can still be easily met by eating a variety of foods from the basic food groups in moderation. Supplements, for the most part, are unnecessary. The subcommittee emphasizes that "diets should be composed of a variety of foods that are derived from diverse food groups rather than by supplementation or fortification..."

What does the calcium RDA mean in terms of routine eating habits? Until the age of 25, adolescents and young adults can meet the 1200 mg RDA for calcium by consuming an average of four servings of milk and dairy products daily. Selections from a variety of dairy products might include:

Milk- Whole, lowfat, skim (1 cup 300 mg.

Cheeses- Cottage (1 cup) 160 mg. American (1 oz.) 175 mg. Cheddar (1 oz.) 205 mg. Mozzarella (1 oz.) 210 mg. Swiss (1 oz.) 270 mg.

Yogurt- Lowfat fruit (1 cup) 345 mg. Plain Lowfat (1 cup) 415 mg.

Ice Cream- Ice Cream or ice milk (1/2 cup) 90 mg. Ice Milk, soft serve (1/2 cup) 140 mg. Milkshake, chocolate (10 1/2 oz.) 400 mg. Mg values are rounded for easy

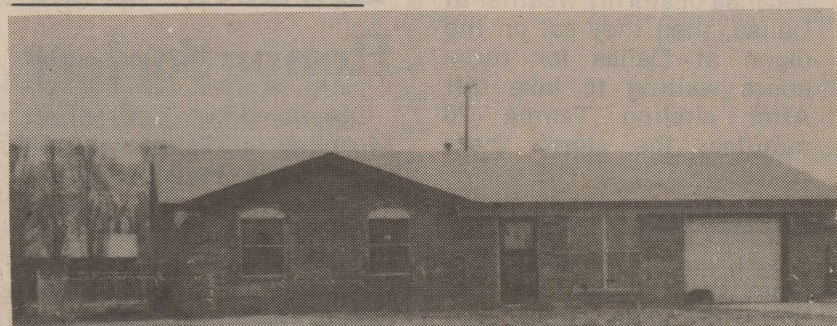
