



With donations and memorials we finally had half of the money we needed, and then we applied for the Riffe Foundation Grant of matching funds and we received it and ordered the fence, the Resident Lumber Co., found the rails in Arkansas and they were delivered in February.

We asked the Churches to announce in their service that we needed men and boys to volunteer to build the fence. Many showed up to work on May 5th, we got the front side and part of the West done, then came Mothers Day and Graduation so we didn't get back to it

until May 26th and it was finished, exactly eleven months to the day from the First Deposit we have our fence. The men and High School boys worked many long hard hours to get it up. Several of the women furnished sandwiches, cokes cookies, coffee to the men so they all worked through their lunch hour and ate at the Cemetery. It save them a lot

Now our cemetery is one of the prettiest, best cared for anywhere. Everyone has taken such an interest you would not believe it is the same cemetery it was just one year ago.

Everyone in Texhoma would like to Thank the Riffe Foundation for helping make our cemetery fence possible.
