# Cimarron County Man Still Missing



A massive manhunt expanded into New Mexico on Sunday for an Oklahoma Panhandle man suffering from alzheimer's disease. Leroy "Bud" Kincannon a 75 year old white male, was last seen on Tuesday evening in the far west Panhandle community of Griggs. The search at one time involved over 300 people who searched over 400 square miles of Mr. Kincannon's local communi-

ty.
The civil Air Patrol completed its search of the area in northwest New Mexico, western Oklahoma & the northwest corner of Texas with no success. The groun air search was discontinued as authorities began to follow up leads suggesting that some unidentified person had transported the disoriented man to Clayton, N. M. The Union County Sheriff's office began investigating the new leads on Sat. even as the search

continued in Mr. Kincannon's home community.

Mr. Kincannon frequently walked the roads in his home community & the family fears that he has become completely disoriented & taking an unfamiliar road, allowed himself to be driven into some other neighboring community. Though sufferfrom Alzeimer's, a degenerative neural disorder

Mr. Kincannon was in generally good physical shape. He regularly took medication for diabeties but missing this medication would not be life threatening according to the family's physician Dr. Roger Bombach of Boise City, Okla. Dr. Bombach stated that Mr. Kincannon could survive in his present condition & would appear as a "quiet man" to those who were unfamiliar with his personality before the onset of the affliction. The family, with the assistance of the

community's newspaper The

#### Boise City News, began distributing flyers into the five-state area on Fri. July 27, 1990. These are the flyers that provided the leads that Mr. Kincannon may be

on the roads of New Mexico. Mr. Kincannon's son Ronald stated that, "We know theres a lot of homeless people on our nation's streets. We don't want Dad to disappear into the crowd". "He has both a home and family that desperately want him back."

Mr. Kincannon, 75 was last seen wearing an orange cap, khaki pants and a light colored shirt. Although he usually wears glasses, he was reported to be without them when last seen. He is approximately 6 ft. 2 inches tall and of slender build. Persons with any information that might lead to the discovery of Mr. Kincannon are requested to call the Cimarron County Sheriff's Office at 405-544-2561 immediately. Mr. Kincannon has been missing since approximately 6:00 p.m., Tuesday, July 24, 1990.

He was last seen walking near the Plainview School, which is near his home. The Cimarron County Sheriff's Office reports that no traces of Mr. Kincannon have been found so far, even though hundreds of searchers have combed the area for miles around, on foot, from the air, on horseback and in







We were before television, penicillin, polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, contact lenses, frisbees and the PILL.

We were before radar, credit cards, split atoms, laser beams, and ballpoint pens; before panty hose, dishwashers, clothesdryers, electric blankets, air conditioners, drip-dry clothes, and before man walked on the moon.

We got married first and THEN lived together. How quaint can you be.

In our time, bunnies were small rabbits and rabbits were not Volkswagens. Designer jeans were scheming girls named Jean Jeanne; and having a meaningful relationship meant getting along with our cousins.

We thought fast food was what you ate during Lent: and Outer space was back of the Roxy theater.

We were before house-husbands, gay-rights, computer dating, dual careers, and commuter marriages. We were before day-care centers, group therapy and nursing homes.

We never heard of FM radio, tape decks, electric typewriters, artificial hearts, word processors, and yogurt.

For us, time-sharing meant togetherness-not computers or condominiums; a

a "chip" meant a piece of wood; hardware meant hardware and software wasn't even a word.

In 1940, "Made in Japan" meant junk...and the term "making out" referred to how you did on a particular exam.

Pizzas, "McDonalds" and instant coffee were unheard of.

We hit the scene when there were 5 and 10-cent stores where you bought things for five and ten cents. Ice cream cones sold for a nickel or a dime. For one nickel you could ride a street bus, make a phone call, buy a Pepsi, or enough stamps to mail one letter and two postcards. You could buy a new Chevy Coupe for about \$800, but who could afford one: pity too, because gasoline was only 11 cents a gallon.

In our day, cigaratte smoking was fashionable, GRASS was mowed, COKE was a cola drink and POT was something you cooked in. Rock music was a Grandma's lullaby, and AIDS were helpers in the Principal's office.

We were certainly not before the difference between the sexes was but we were surely before the sex change; we made do with what we had.

And we were about the last generation that was so dumb as to think you needed a husband to have a baby! No wonder we are so confused and there still appears to be a generation gap

But WE SURVIVED! What better reason to celebrate!

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
