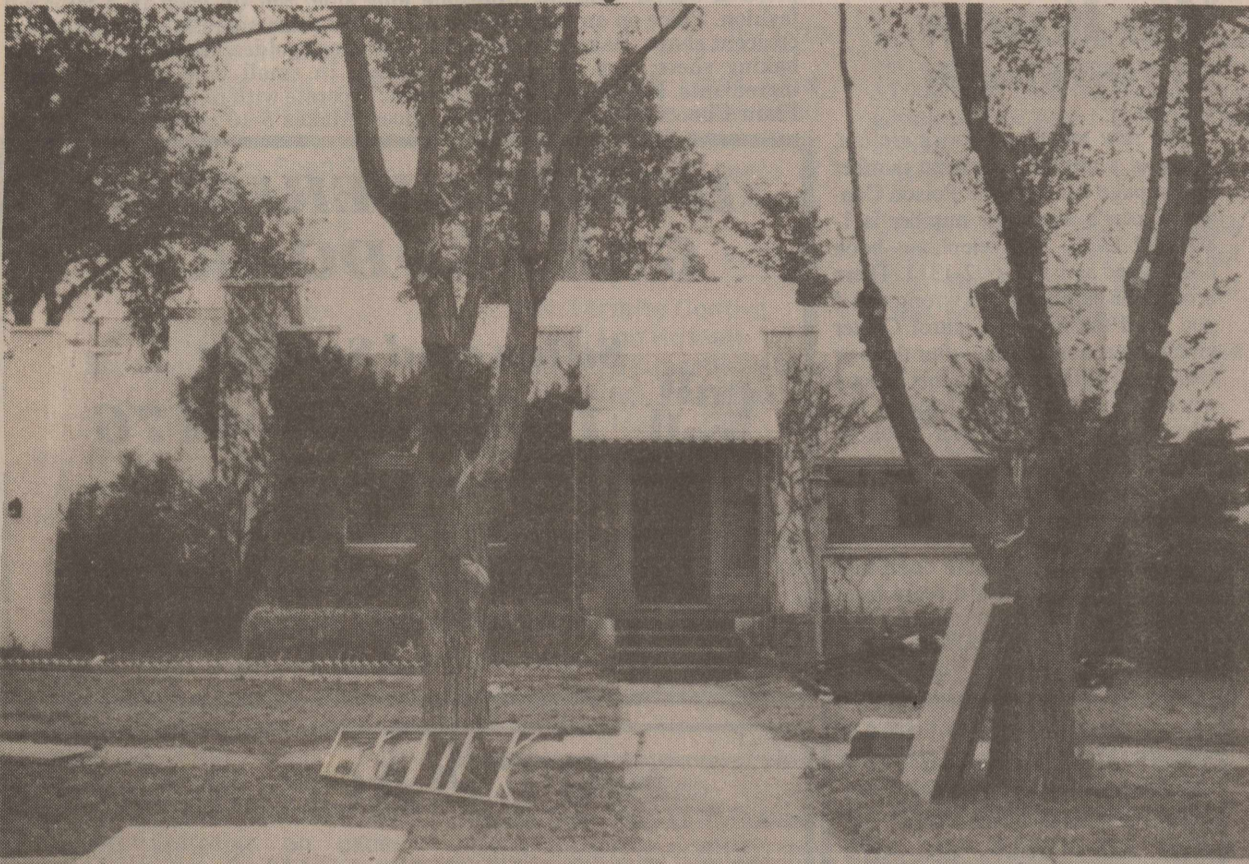

## School Starts August 27th

The first day of instruction for the students of the Stratford Independent School District will be August 27, 1990. Buses will run at the regular times on August 27 and the cafeteria will begin serving meals. School will begin at 8:30 A.M. and will dismiss at 3:45 P.M. Steve Haynes, High school Principal has announced the following schedule for registration for High School Students: Thursday--August 16, Seniors--9:00 to 11:00, Juniors--1:00 to 3:00. Friday--August 17, Sophomores--9:00 to 11:00, Freshmen--1:00 to 3:00.

James Taliadro, Middle School Principal, has announced that those students who will be in grades 5,6,7 and 8, and who did not

attend Stratford Schools last year, may begin registration on August 14. This may be done in the Middle School Principals office from 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon, and from 1:00 to 3:00 any week day. Returning students from last year will report to school on August 27 at the regular time.

Jim Bob Brown, Mary Allen Principal, has announced that students who will be in grades K-4, and did not attend Stratford Schools last year, may begin their registration at the Mary Allen Elementary School on August 14 from 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon, and from 1:00 to 3:00 P.M. Students may register any week day during these times. All new students should have an

immunization record with them at the time of enrollment. Students are required to have three DPT or TD immunizations with the last being after their 4th birthday. One immunization is required for Rubella, measles, Mumps and TB. Kindergarten students must be 5 years old prior to September 1, 1990.

## Special Session Of City Council

Stratford City Council met in special session Thursday, August 9, 1990 at 1:30 p.m. with Mayor Doug Reese presiding and the following council members present; Wanda Riffe, Claude Harlow, R.J. Hill and Ronnie Pickens.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved as read.

Bob Davis, representing Southwest Securities, Inc., met with Council to discuss the City entering into a financial agreement with Southwest Securities to issue certificates of obligation for a water tower, ground storage and line replacement. City Engineer, Kevin Glover, was in attendance and gave council an estimate of the cost of the projects. Wanda made a motion and Claude second authorizing the Mayor and City Secretary to execute a financing agreement with Southwest Securities, Inc. on proposed Combination Tax and Revenue Certificates of Obligation. Motion carried.

second to employ the firm of Fulbright & Jaworski of Dallas, Tex as bond attorneys for the proposed Combination Tax and Revenue Certificates of Obligation. Motion carried.

Claude made a motion and Ronnie second to pass a resolution approving and authorizing publication of notice of intention to issue certificates of obligation not to exceed \$400,000 and setting a sale date of September 5, 1990 at 1:30 p.m. for the proposed Combination Tax and Revenue Certificates of Obligation and adoption of maturity schedule. ## Bike Hazards

There are about 1,000 bicyclists killed each year. Ninety percent of the deaths are caused by accidents with motor vehicles. The rider is responsible 75 percent of the time. Each year, bicyclists experience 562,000 injuries that require some form of treatment. Children aged 5-14 have the highest percentage of accidents (just under 60 percent), while boys 10-14 have the highest death rate. Some 58 percent of all bicyclists have been involved in at

least one accident. Because 40 percent of all accidents occur at night, cyclists should make sure they use lights, bright fluorescent clothing & reflectors to be highly visible and to be able to see the road surface. Hospitalized accident victims amount to 24,728 annually. Of these, fewer than 750 riders used protective equipment. There were 17,000 head injuries, 700 of which were fatal. These numbers should prove the need for protective head gear. If not, then consider this fact: BICYCLISTS SUFFER MORE

SEVERE HEAD INJURIES THAN MOTORCYCLISTS! Rigid protective helmets, which are required by most racing clubs and associations, should be worn by children and adults, despite complaints that helmets are inconvenient or unfashionable. We want to visit with you and your loved ones while you are alive and well, not in the back of an ambulance as the result of a bicycle accident.

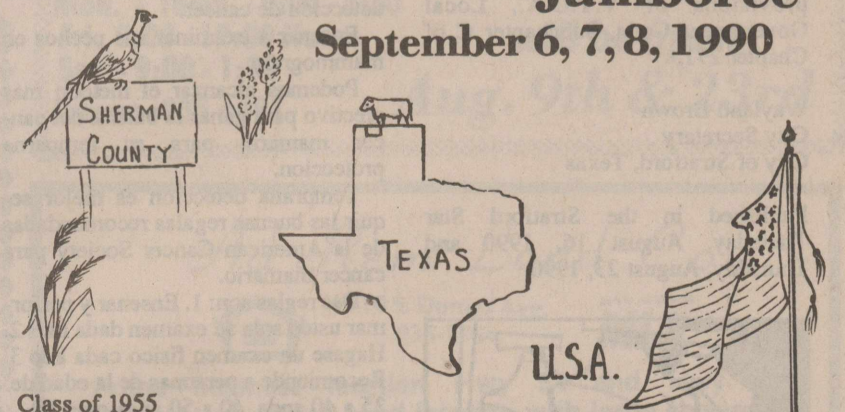

## Breast Cancer Screening Project

The Breast Cancer Screening Project of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Cancer Council for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in Breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer

Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are: 1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month. 2. Have a physical examination every year. 3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age 35 to 40- One baseline mammogram 40 to 50 A mammogram every 1 to 2 years over 50 yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held on Tuesday, August 28, 1990 from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., in Stratford at the First Methodist Church. Exams are done by appointment only. 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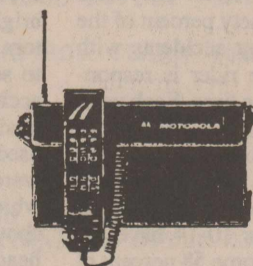

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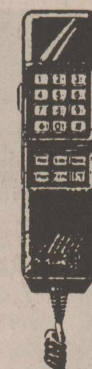

- If you now get Food Stamps or Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) for any of your children, those children can get free meals.
- If your total household income is at or below the amounts on the Income Chart, your children can get free meals or reduced-price meals for \$ .40 cents for lunch and \$ .30 cents for breakfast.
- If you have a foster child, that child may be eligible for benefits regardless of your household income.

- REPORTING CHANGES:** If your children get meals based on income information, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals based on AFDC/food stamp information, you must advise the school if you no longer get AFDC or food stamps for your children.
- CONFIDENTIALITY:** The information you give on the application will be used only to allow your children to get free or reduced-price meals and to verify eligibility.
- REAPPLICATION:** You may apply for free and reduced-price meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, such as a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, fill out an application then.
- In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

To apply for free and reduced price meals, complete this application using the instructions below, sign your name and return the application to the school. If you need help, call the school at this number:

**Part 1 - STUDENT INFORMATION:** Write the names, grades and schools of all your children who go to school in this district.

**Part 2 - FOSTER CHILD:** A FOSTER CHILD who is the legal responsibility of the welfare agency or court may get meals regardless of your household income. Complete a separate application for each foster child. COMPLETE THIS PART AND PART 4. DO NOT COMPLETE PART 3A OR PART 3B

- FOSTER CHILD: Put a checkmark ( ) in the box if you are applying for a foster child.
- INCOME: Write the child's personal use income and how often it is received (such as weekly, every two weeks, twice a month or monthly). Write "0" if the child has no income. Personal use income is (a) money given by the welfare office identified by category for the child's personal use, such as for clothing, school fees and allowances; and (b) all other money the child gets, such as money from his/her family and money from full-time or regular part-time jobs.

# Hints on Horses

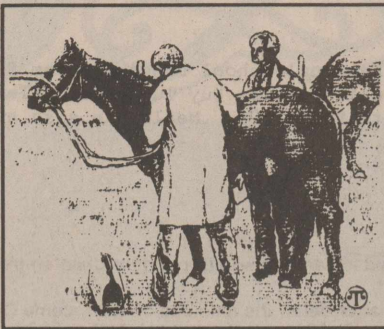
## Buying A Horse: What You Should Know

If you're going to look at a horse, and you're a first time buyer, it's a good idea to bring along a knowledgeable horseperson. There's a lot to observe and much to ask before you make a decision.

Temperament should be most important to you—leave health to the experts. Look at the horse's eyes and ears and general manner when it is brought out. Does it look alert? Be sure you look at the animal in a well lit place, preferably outdoors in the sunlight. Watch the owner saddle up the horse. Does it stand quietly? Does it kick or bite? Do not buy a horse with bad stable manners.

Don't get on the animal right away. Ask the owner to ride the horse first. If you're buying a hunter or jumper or other specially trained horse, ask the owner to demonstrate.

If you and your adviser are satisfied that the horse is safe for you to ride, it is your turn to mount. Once again, observe how it reacts when you mount, how it reacts to your commands. Try out any special skills that the horse has. Remember, this is a major invest-



It's important the horse you buy suit your style and temperament as a rider.

ment and you should be allowed to test the animal thoroughly.

Many times a brief trial period (seven to ten days) can be arranged for the prospective buyer. Even if you fall in love with the horse, do not buy it on the spot, and certainly not before the animal has been thoroughly examined by a veterinarian with experience in performing purchase examinations. One final point that all horse owners, beginning and experienced should remember: a horse is a living being whose life and welfare is in your hands.

# Pointers For Parents

### Parental Stress And What To Do About It

Parenting, under the most ideal conditions, is a difficult job. Unlike other jobs, you don't have to be specially "qualified," trained, or skilled to become a parent. Even some experience babysitting or working with children does not guarantee that raising children will be easy.

Here are several reasons raising children is stressful:

#### 1. EMOTIONAL INVOLVEMENT

We often view our children as extensions of ourselves and have unrealistic expectations of them.

#### 2. NEGATIVE REMINDERS

A child may strongly remind us of our own worst behaviors, a disliked relative, a painful separation from a former spouse, or some other uncomfortable period in life.

#### 3. FINANCIAL STRESS

Unemployment, single or teenage parenting, indebtedness or serious illness can make it especially difficult to provide the basic economic necessities for children.

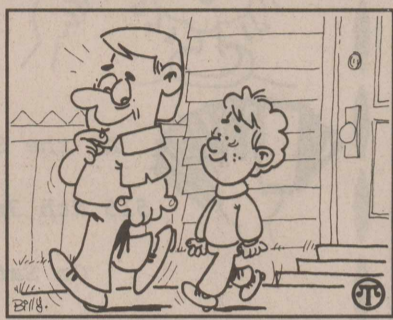
#### 4. BALANCING AND JUGGLING RESPONSIBILITIES

The various everyday demands of a career, relationships and parenthood can be a frustrating drain on energy for the most organized person.

#### 5. ISOLATION

With the disintegration of extended families, parents are often isolated and alone without someone to turn to for practical advice and emotional comfort. When one parent works long hours or must leave for periods of time the other may feel abandoned.

#### 6. LACK OF POSITIVE PARENTING



When a parent has been deprived of a nurturing childhood, or was abused, this often leads to low self esteem, lack of confidence and poor skills in taking care of children.

Here are some ways to cope with parental stress:

#### 1. STUDY METHODS OF PEACEFUL DISCIPLINE

By reading books, watching other parents and taking parent training classes, positive alternatives to hitting, spanking and yelling at children can be learned. Humane discipline is firm, encouraging and shows love and understanding.

#### 2. HAVE A PLAN FOR ANGER MANAGEMENT

Be aware of your pressure points, the particular times and situations which set you off. Decide ahead of time what you can do when you are under stress. Choose which friends you might call. Write down the local hotline number next to your telephone. Arrange for someone you trust to step in and watch your children if you let them know you need to walk away for a few minutes. Buy a special notebook to write in when you're upset. Tell your spouse and older children about any new ways you plan to handle your anger.

#### 3. TAKE TIME TO TAKE CARE OF THE CAREGIVERS

Plan regular times to relax and have some time away from your children. Do something special for yourself. Also arrange to spend time alone with your partner. When parents communicate about their relationship, when they nourish and please each other, children feel more secure and the entire family benefits.

#### 4. JOIN A PARENTING CLASS OR A SUPPORT GROUP

Most communities offer various parenting classes for all stages of child development.

Talking with other parents can relieve guilt, reduce anxiety, and introduce some fresh ideas. If disciplining your child becomes a serious problem, seek help from Parents Anonymous (1-800-421-0350) or professional counseling from a family therapist, mental health or social service agency.

If you want to learn more about strengthening family life after remarriage, the Stepfamily Association of America has chapters throughout the U.S., a quarterly newsletter, an annual conference and a clearinghouse for educational resources.

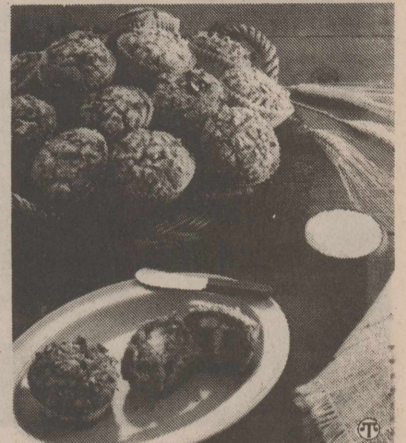

### OUR HINSING HEROES

#### Our Allergists

Thanks to our nation's allergists, many of the estimated 41 million Americans who suffer from upper respiratory allergies are breathing a lot easier.

Researchers developed a prescription allergy medication which relieves itches, sneezes and other allergy symptoms, but does not cause drowsiness.

This safer antihistamine is a "significantly valuable" medical resource, Eli O. Meltzer, M.D., Clinical Professor of Pediatrics at the University of California, writes in the December issue of *Immunology & Allergy Practice*. He reports the medication is effective and notably safer than the older antihistamines it replaces.

All antihistamines block the action of *histamine*, the irritating body chemical that causes noses to run, eyes to weep, and skin to itch. Older antihistamines, however, also cross the blood-brain barrier and affect the central nervous system.

In other words, they cause drowsiness in many people. They

also diminish psychomotor performance, including the ability to drive carefully. Antihistamines which became available within the last five years, are much safer, Dr. Meltzer writes. Seldane does not make the patient drowsy but relieves the symptoms of allergies. This is just one more good reason allergy sufferers should see their doctors.

Increasingly, wearing safety belts while driving is considered "cool" by young American males. A recent survey found several reasons for this.



According to many respondents, wearing the belts helped them make sure they were in control of their cars and their lives. This type of control can be a lifesaver when the guy coming the other way has had too much to drink. Others added that when passengers wore safety belts, it also made the driver feel more in control of the car, giving him "room to drive," particularly in an emergency.

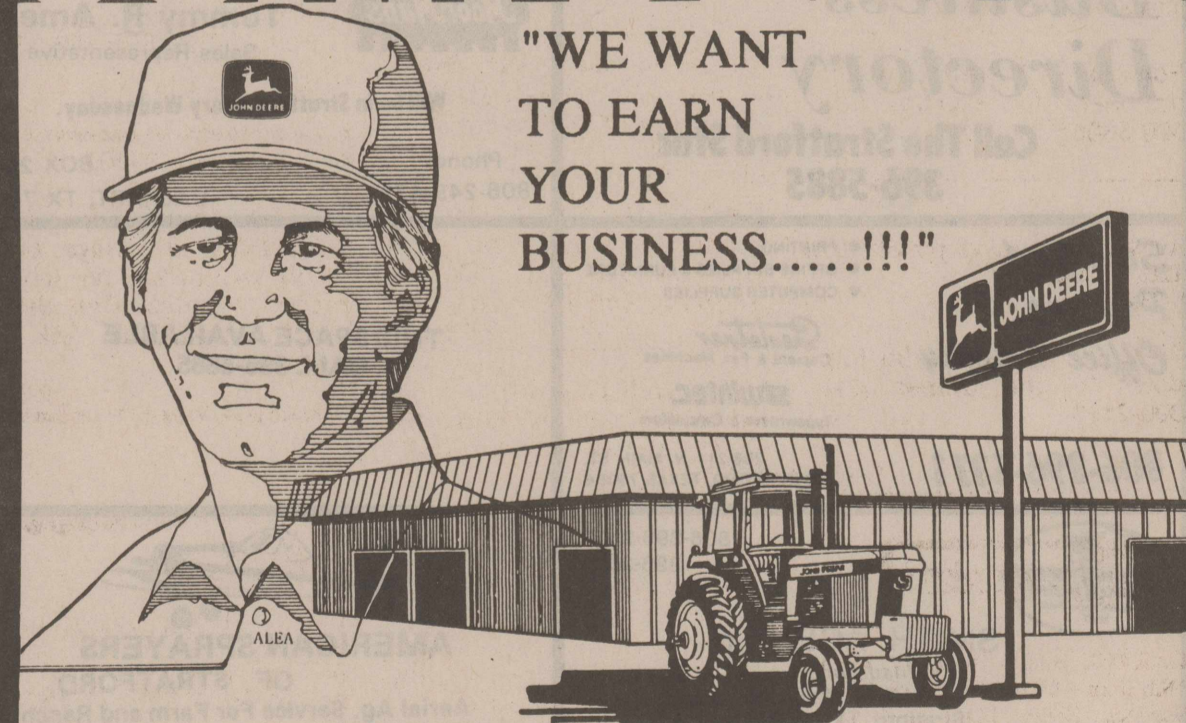

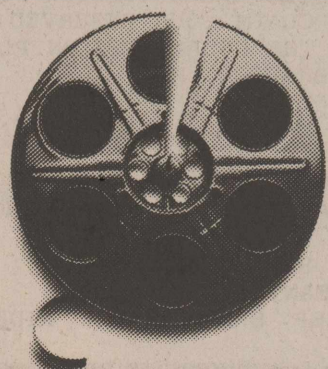

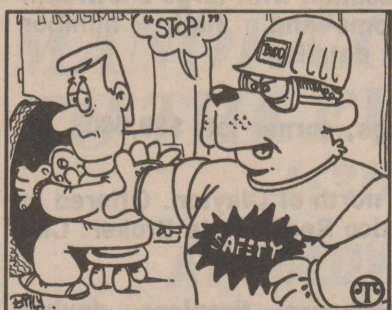

Staying on the road to safety. The journey can be easier if trucks and other large vehicle tires are properly serviced by professional mechanics.

Never work on a truck tire or wheel unless you're properly trained and have read and follow Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) regulation Section 1910.177 and wheel manufacturer's literature, remind safety experts, who offer the following pointers:

DO go to a garage if a truck tire has run any distance while completely or partially deflated flat. The tire or wheel could have been dislodged or damaged to the point that, inflated, it can cause an explosion or serious injury.

DO go to a garage where the tire is disassembled, repaired, and both tire and wheel are inspected by a trained repairman for damage, undue wear, proper matching of all components, then properly inflated and assembled in a safety cage.



Wrong: Trying to change a truck tire yourself if you're not a trained mechanic.

DO have a new tire put on if yours has a manufacturing date older than 15 years.

DON'T put a 16-inch tire on a 16.5-inch rim. If you do this and over-inflate the tire, the tire will explode before it will fully fit on the rim.

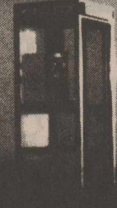
