farmers seldom or never use PPE on farm jobs for which protection is needed", says Thomas Valco, Extension Agricultural Engineer.

Risk to Eyes

When using liquid chemicals, farmers should wear goggles designed to protect eyes from splashes and sprays. Farmers can also use welder's goggles which protect against intense light and sparks. Full face shields are another option for eye protection and can be worn comfortably.

Safe Breathing

Respirators protect the lungs from airborne health hazards on the farm, ranging from deadly silo and manure gasses to longer term health threats from frequent exposure to dust, molds and chemicals. Respirators must be selected based on the air hazards that exist on the farm. Some purify the air you breathe, while others provide fresh air from a tank strapped to the individual. Make sure you choose the proper one for the job.

Hands and Feet Protection

Hands are the most frequently injured part of the body. During a day's work, a farmer's hands might come into contact with chemicals, harsh detergents, paint, solvents, rough materials and sharp tools, or be scalded, burned or Susanah's Cafe and Gift Shop, frostbitten.
