Meeting To Be Held In Amarillo

On September 20, 1990, the Executive Directors of the Domestic Violence Shelters in forty-four (44) counties will meet in Amarillo to consider the implementation of a Twelve Step program called H.E.A.R.T. The Domestic Violence Shelters are located in Perryton, Dumas, Pampa, Amarillo, Lubbock, and Plainview with Satellite centers in Borger and Hereford, Levelland and Brownfield. This united effort will help battered women through the inner-growth process for beginning and maintaining abuse free relationships. H.E.A.R.T. is an acronym for "Help End Abusive Relationship Tendencies." The name reflects the belief that battered women have a responsibility to begin the changes themselves. The steps are designed to be followed by a battered woman with the support of a sponsor and other H.E.A.R.T. group members. All members of the group are currently or formerly battered women helping battered women. The original H.E.A.R.T. group began in Tyler, Texas, in 1986. The only requirement to become a member of H.E.A.R.T. is that a woman is

or has been the victim of emotional, sexual or physical abuse by a spouse or partner. Members may remain anonymous if they wish, do not have to take part in group discussions and may attend and simply observe. The weekly meetings are free and the time and place for the meetings will be announced after the September 20th meeting.

Karla Hayes, a member of the Family Violence Advisory Committee to the Texas Department of Human Services and a formerly battered woman has been a major force in coordinating this meeting. "We will be the first region in the Department of Human Services in the State of Texas to study this program as a group. These shelters are committed to the continuation of abuse free lives for the women and children they have serve. Linda Carr, volunteer facilitator of the East Texas Crisis Center, will present the concept at the meeting. The dedication of the shelters to provide a support group to help end abusive relationships is a giant step toward a better future for battered women and their children."

The meeting will be held on September 20th from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Amarillo YWCO, 1006 S. Jackson. For more information please call: Karla Hayes at 352-1118 or Mimi Loftin at 353-2764.

Fesler To Go To Japan For Two Years

RICHMOND, Va.—The Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board has named 18 people to attend a Sept. 12-27 orientation and then work overseas through its International Service Corps (ISC) program.

In addition, the board has chosen 10 other participants in its ISC program who will go to the field exempt from orientation because of previous overseas experience.

ISC personnel will fill jobs in such fields as library work, church development, recreation and teaching. They will work alongside missionaries for periods ranging from four months to two years.

Four of the ISC personnel were selected for assignments with Cooperative Services International, the Southern Baptist agency that assists nations where missionaries do not work.

Eight married couples are included in the ISC group. Those who attend orientation will travel to the Board's, Missionary Learning Center in Rockville, Va.

With 14.7 million members, Southern Baptist are the largest evangelical denomination in the United States. Working with other Christians, they have a goal to help every person in the world hear the story of Jesus Christ by the year 2000.

From Stratford going is Kristi Fesler daughter of Bill and Betty Fesler of Stratford. Kristi is most recently employed as an accounting assistant at Texas Agriculture Experiment Station, College Station. She has graduated from Texas A&M University, College Station and has been attending the Parkway Baptist Church, in College Station. She has been assigned as a literacy education worker in Japan for two years.

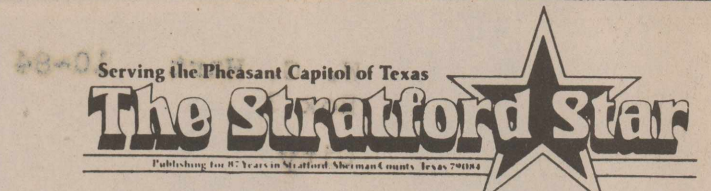
I hope our Readers enjoy the Cook of the Week column again. If you know someone you would like to see as one, please give me a call, and we'll see what we can do.

ICE BOX ROLLS

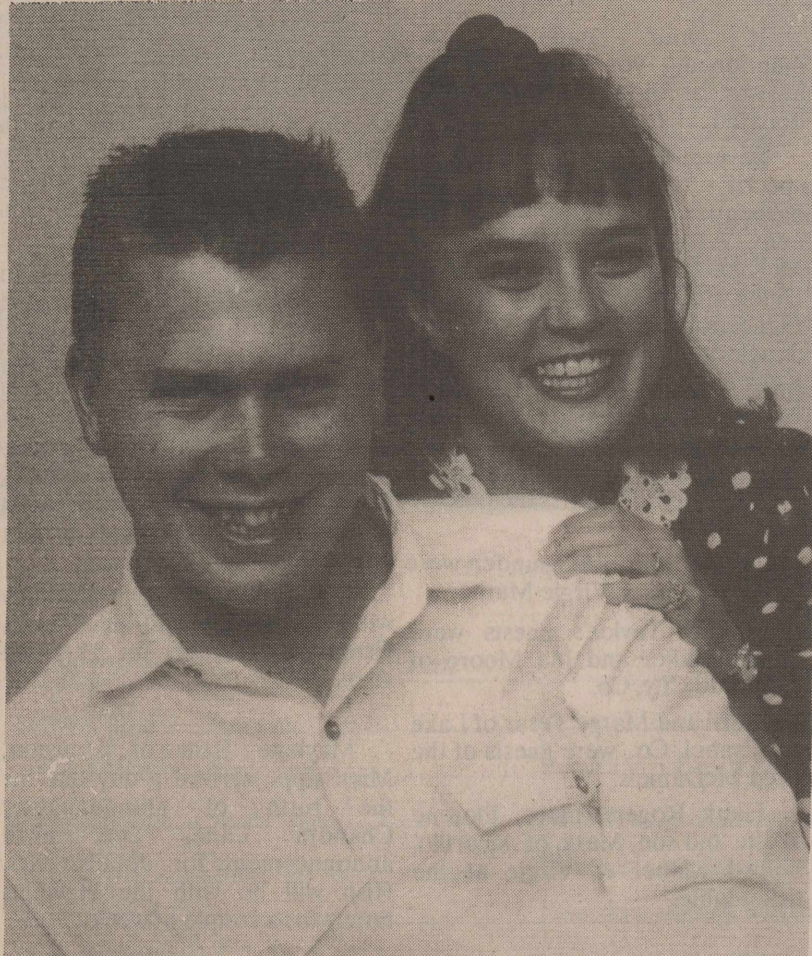
- 2 cakes or 2 Pkg. Dry Yeast
- 1 egg, well beaten
- 6 Tbs. sugar
- 5 1/2 to 6 c. flour
- 1 t. salt
- 2 c. lukewarm water
- 3 T. melted shortening.

Soften yeast in lukewarm water, add shortening (cool) mix well, add salt, egg and sugar. Mix well, add flour a little at a time, beating after each addition until dough is stiff enough to knead. Knead on lightly floured board until dough is smooth. Cover in bread container with tight lid. Dough will keep covered in the refrigerator for a week. Make out into desired rolls. Let rise for 2 hrs. Bake 15 to 20 min. at 350 degrees.

ANGEL LEMON PIE

Beat 4 egg yolks until creamy. In double boiler add 1/2 c. sugar, Juice of 1 large lemon, butter size of large egg. Cook until thick.

Beat egg whites until stiff, add 1/2 c. sugar. Add 1/2 egg whites to lemon mixture. Pour into baked pie shell and add remainder of eggs to top and bake.

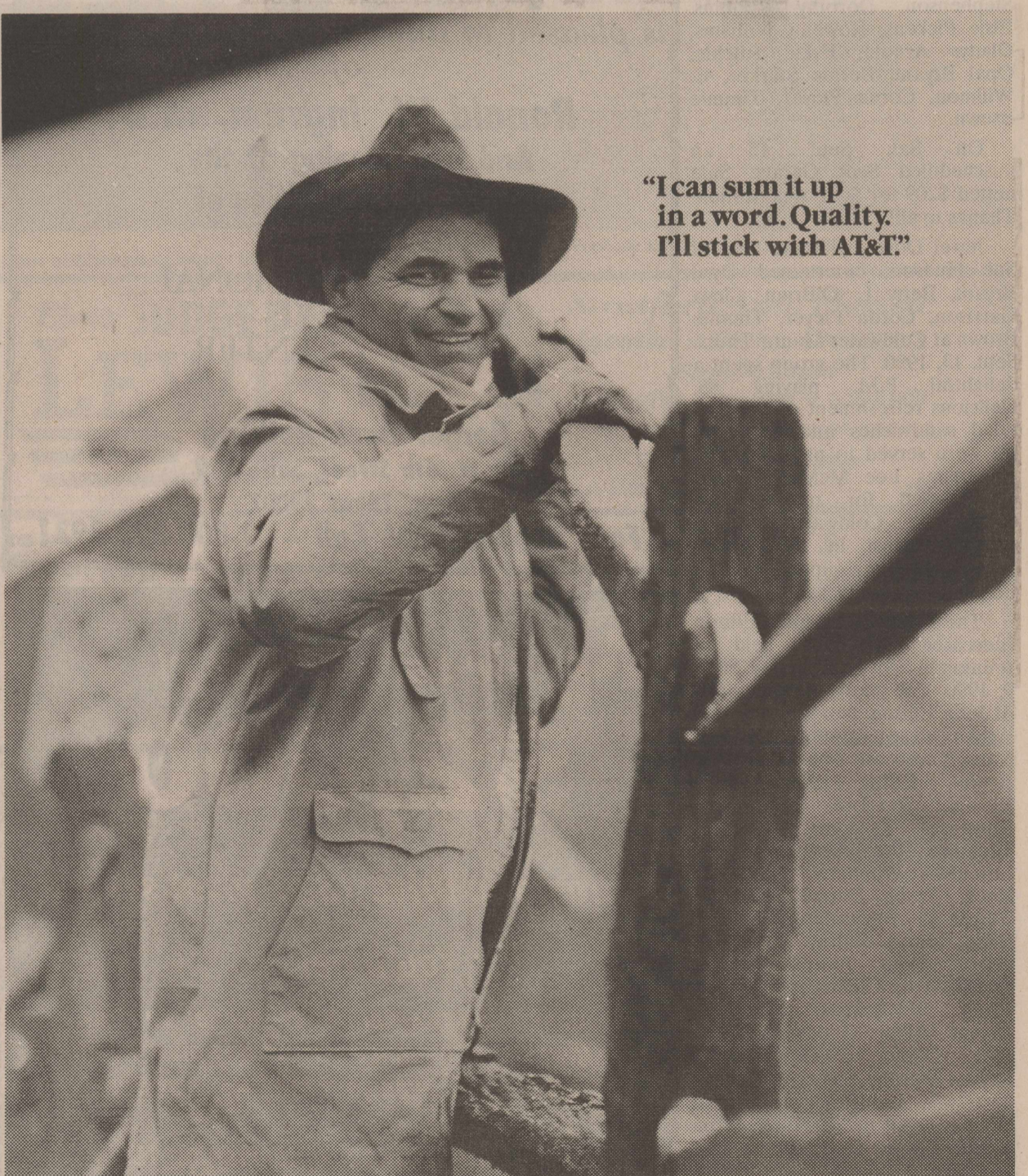

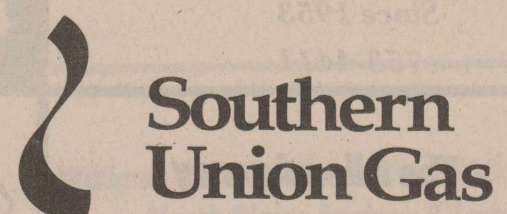

farmers seldom or never use PPE on farm jobs for which protection is needed", says Thomas Valco, Extension Agricultural Engineer. **Risk to Eyes**

When using liquid chemicals, farmers should wear goggles designed to protect eyes from splashes and sprays. Farmers can also use welder's goggles which protect against intense light and sparks. Full face shields are another option for eye protection and can be worn comfortably. **Safe Breathing**

Respirators protect the lungs from airborne health hazards on the farm, ranging from deadly silo and manure gasses to longer term health threats from frequent exposure to dust, molds and chemicals. Respirators must be selected based on the air hazards that exist on the farm. Some purify the air you breathe, while others provide fresh air from a tank strapped to the individual. Make sure you choose the proper one for the job. **Hands and Feet Protection**

Hands are the most frequently injured part of the body. During a day's work, a farmer's hands might come into contact with chemicals, harsh detergents, paint, solvents, rough materials and sharp tools, or be scalded, burned or frostbitten. Cuts and abrasions on the hands may allow toxic chemicals to enter the body and, if not cleaned properly, many lead to infections. Use appropriate gloves, barrier creams, hand cleaners and lotions to protect hands. **Toes and feet** can also be injured during farm work. Poorly fitting or improper footwear often causes chips, trips and falls. Farm workers should wear safety shoes or boots with metal toe-caps and slip-resistant soles. Special rubber or plastic boots can be used when spraying chemicals. Farmers should also wear spray suits or coats impervious to chemicals when spraying.

Ear Protection
Studies indicate that farmers have a higher-than-average occurrences of noise induced hearing loss. Earplugs or muffs should be worn whenever exposed to a continuous noise level of 90

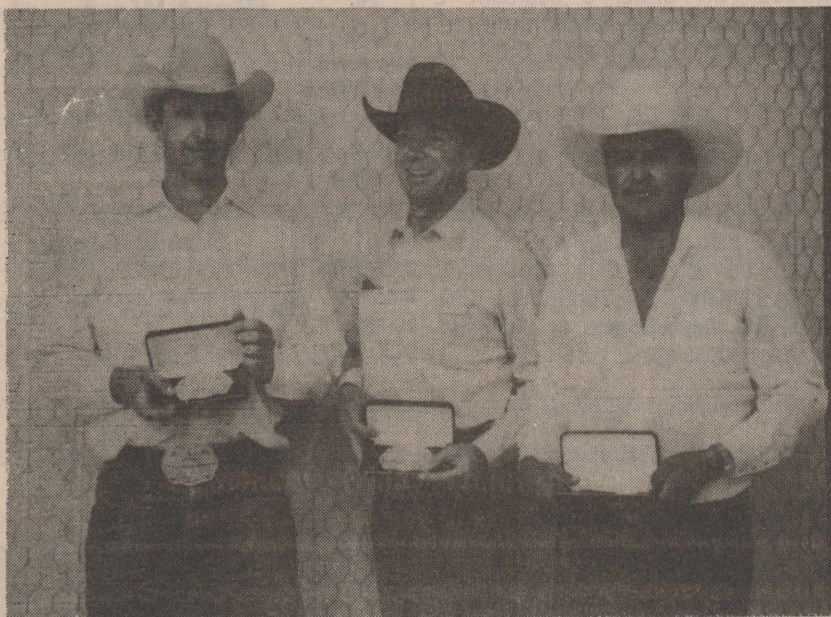

 NOVEMBER 6, 1990

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."
