

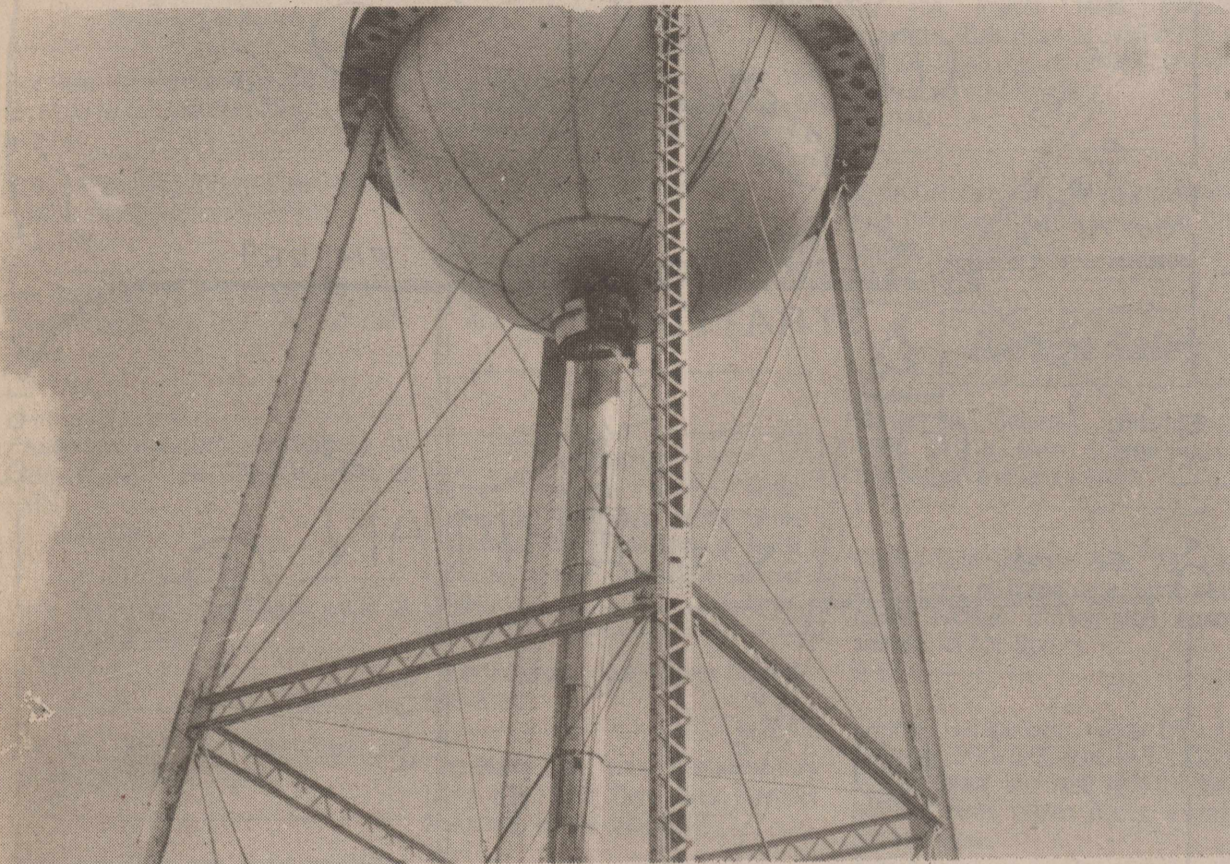

The regular board meeting of the Stratford Independent School District was held on September 13, at 7:00 p.m. Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as read and August bills were approved for payment.

E.E. Bell and Don Evens to the Appraisal Board.

In other business, Parent's Night was set for the High School and Middle School on October 1, from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. Mary Allen Elementary will host Parent's night on October 2, from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. Parent's Night is hosted by each school in order to comply with House Bill 72. expected from each class.

Transportation System was discussed and policies on Chapter 1, At Risk, and LPAC were adopted. Enrollment was discussed and Superintendent Brite gave his report to the Board on his Superintendent's Conference in Penderies. It was decided to meet at 6:45 a.m. for the October, November and December Regular Sessions.

Bids will be accepted in the Superintendent's Office for the remodeling of the four dressing rooms in the High School Gym. In final business, funding for the proms was discussed through the magazine sales.

Meeting adjourned at 9:00 p.m.

Water Rates Increased

Stratford City Council met in regular session, Thursday Sept. 20, 1990 at 7:30 p.m. with Mayor Doug Reese presiding and the following Council Members present: Wanda Riffe, Claude Harlow, R.J. Hill, Wayne Merrill, and Ronnie Pickens. City Attorney Kyle Lewis was also present.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved as read.

A Public Hearing was held to condemn the buildings on the following property: 501 S. Wall, 104 S. Maple, 307 N. Grace and 302 E. Texas. Ed Crabtree met with Council concerning the property at 501 S. Wall. The building has been closed up to the council's satisfaction. Mike Mathews met with Council concerning the property at 307 N. Grace. Mike was given a 30 day extension, he has until Oct. 20, 1990 to tear the building down. The property at 104 S. Maple and 302 E. Texas belongs to George and Mary Lovett. They have fulfilled their obligation.

Bids were opened to lease 7.7522 acres of City Property for oil, gas and minerals. One bid was received, it is as follows:

Liberty Oil & Gas-3 yr. lease, 3/16ths royalty at \$50.00 per net mineral acre.

R.J. made a motion and Wanda second to accept the bid from Liberty Oil and Gas. Motion carried.

A Public Hearing on the City Budget for 1990/91 was called to order by Mayor Reese. There were no comments. Mayor Reese closed the hearing.

Ronnie made a motion and Wayne second to adopt the 1990/91 City Budget. Motion carried.

Wayne made a motion and Wanda second to pass Ordinance #275 increasing water rates. The minimum will be left at \$7.00 for the first 2,000 gallons, then increasing from .95 cents per 1,000 gallons to \$1.15 per 1,000 gallons. Motion carried.

Wanda made a motion and R.J. second to nominate E.R. Bell and Don Evens to the Sherman County appraisal District Board. Motion carried.

Fire Chief, Eddie Williams, met with Council to request \$1,500.00 for the new

From a rooster crowing in early morning to voice-mode digital clocks; model-T's and Biplanes to high speed cars and space ships; grow your own food, can or dry to quick freeze and fresh vegetables and fruit in super markets the year round; open prairie to lovely landscaped homes; dry land farming to irrigation; open range to multiate thousand head Feedlots; strong family units to divorced and single parent families; a family doctor who would make house calls to major medical centers. The past fifty years, 1940-1990, has brought us from a simpler way of life to a fast life of high technology.

Extension Homemaker clubs or Home Demonstration clubs were organized in Sherman County in 1937. The purpose then as it is today was to help homemakers and their families to achieve a better quality of life by improving their skills and knowledge in all areas that effect

the family. It was and is a source of continuing education for its membership.

Ava Keener and Doris Dyess have been in the Extension Homemaker program for fifty years and will be honored at an Awards Program along with other fifty year members from Texas on Tuesday night, October 2, 1990. This awards program will initiate the Texas Homemakers State Conference to be held in Amarillo October 3-4, 1990 and hosted by the Homemaker Clubs in District One.

Ava Keener joined as a very shy young homemaker. She stated that participation in the total Extension program helped her overcome her shyness and to have more confidence in her abilities. Ava serves her club and community as a most self-assured and capable person and carries out her responsibilities in a conscientious and efficient way. The things she learned in her club work has helped her become a better Homemaker and community leader. All the areas of study and demonstration from home improvement to home furnishings; landscaping; food preparation and preservation; family financial planning, Health (study of Heart Attack & Strokes; Arthritis; Cancer; Diabetes); Parliamentary procedure; learning how the Government works has been of benefit to her and her family. Ava stated that she joined the Extension club to share in it's benefits and the social opportunity it offered so it is only fair that I share in the responsibilities and pass the privilege on to others.

Ava and her husband reared six children, three boys and three girls, and have helped with several grandchildren. They farmed for many years and in 1958 after the older children had married, they began custom harvesting. 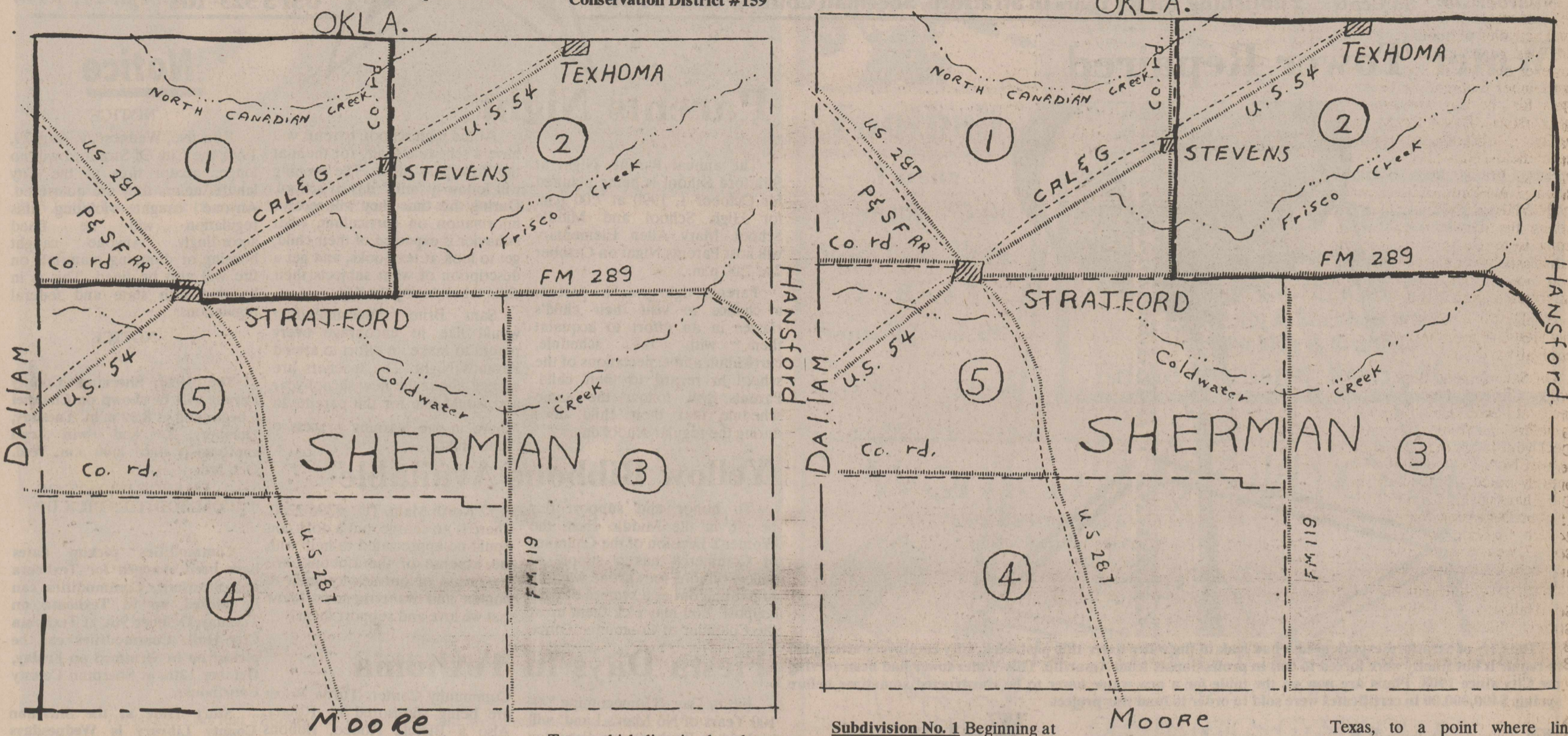

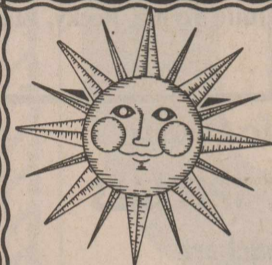

Ordinance #275

An Ordinance Amending & Raising Minimum Rates for Water Use and Declaring an Emergency.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Stratford, Texas, finds it necessary to amend prior ordinances regulating rates for the use of water; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that it is in the best interest of the City to increase water rates; and

WHEREAS, an emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of order, good government and public safety;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF STRATFORD, TEXAS.

The monthly rate and charge for both residential and commercial customers for each 1,000 gallons of water used over and above the first 2,000 gallons shall be adopted and established at \$1.15.

Insofar as this ordinance overlaps or amends any prior ordinances of the City Of

Stratford, then this ordinance shall supersede and amend such prior ordinances. Should any section or sections of this ordinance be held to be void and without force and effect for any reason whatsoever by any court or competent jurisdiction, the remaining portions of the ordinance shall not be thereby affected, but they shall remain in full force and effect as though the void and unenforceable portion thereof, if any, had not been incorporated.

An emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of order, good government and public safety that requires this ordinance to become effective October 1, 1990.

Passed and approved this 20th day of September, 1990.

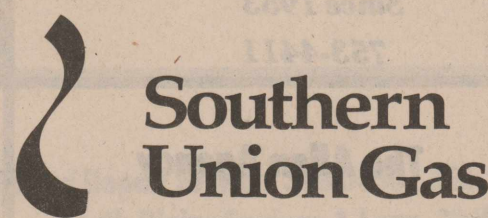

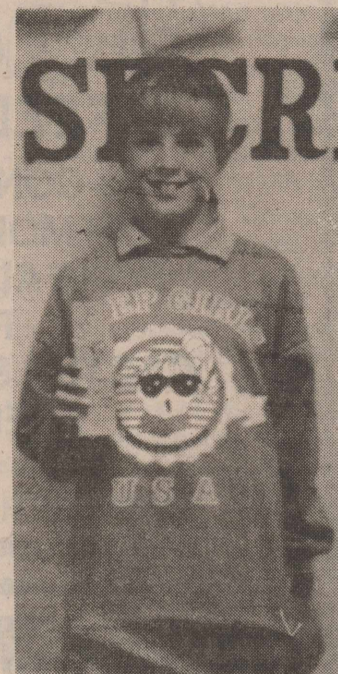

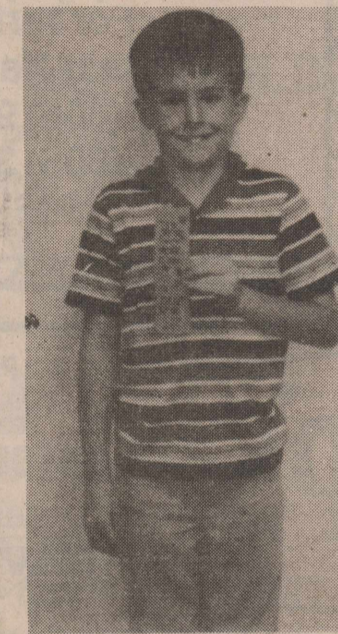

Recertification Of Private Applicator Licenses

Recertification is now required for persons holding private applicator licenses and for those wishing to maintain private applicator certificates issued prior to January 10, 1989. Private applicators must obtain 15 continuing education credits over a 5-Year period. Of the 15, 2 credits must be in laws and regulations and one credit in integrated pest management. The recertification requirement is among new and amended regulations adopted by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

December 31, 1989 through December 31, 1994. Upon becoming a licensed private applicator, recertification through continuing education will apply as previously described.

Educational activities of the Texas Agricultural Extension service that include the opportunity to obtain continuing education credits will be identified in program announcements and related publicity. Opportunities to obtain continuing education credits may also be provided by universities, governmental agencies, associations and private, independent (nonapplicator) businesses.

Licensed private applicators must satisfy the recertification requirement by December 31 of the year preceding renewal of their license. Persons wishing to maintain private applicator certificates issued prior to January 10, 1989 must satisfy the recertification requirement by December 31, 1995 and each 5-Year period thereafter.



Persons who obtained private applicator certification during the

period January 10, 1989 through December 31, 1989 must recertify becoming licensed on or before December 31, 1994.

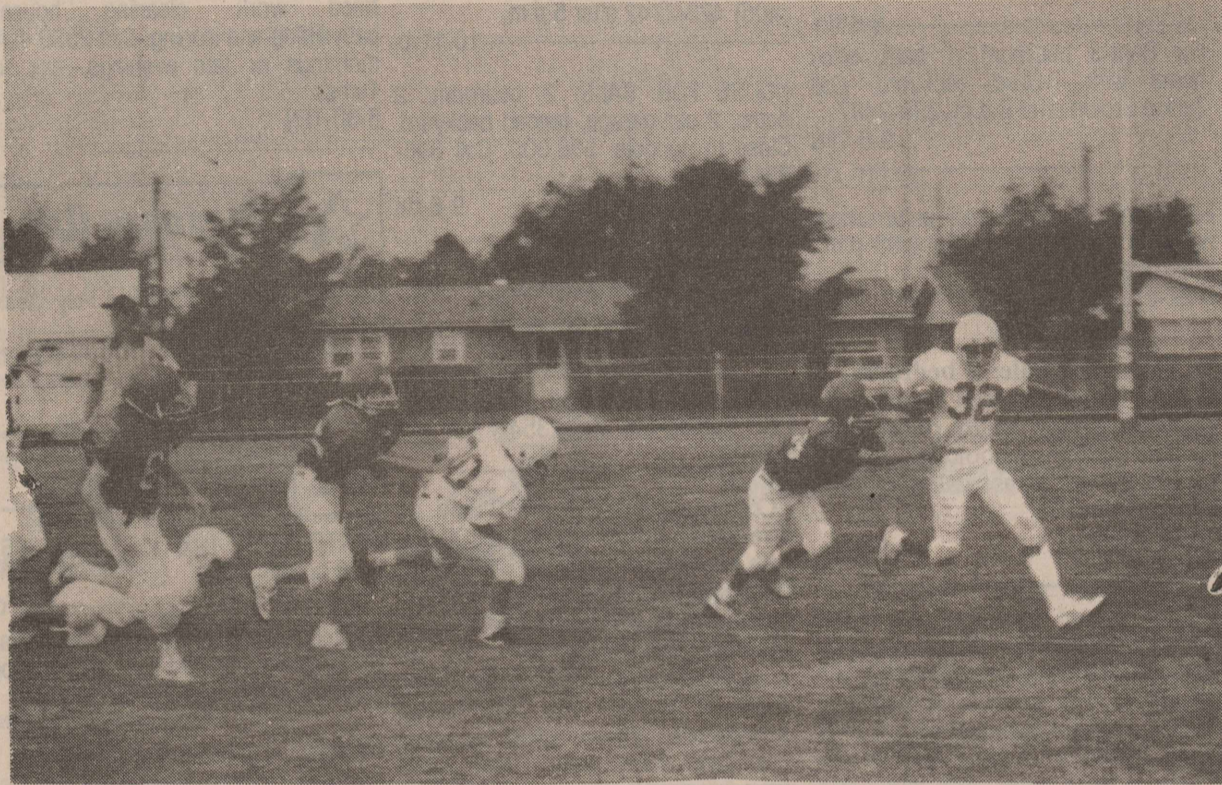

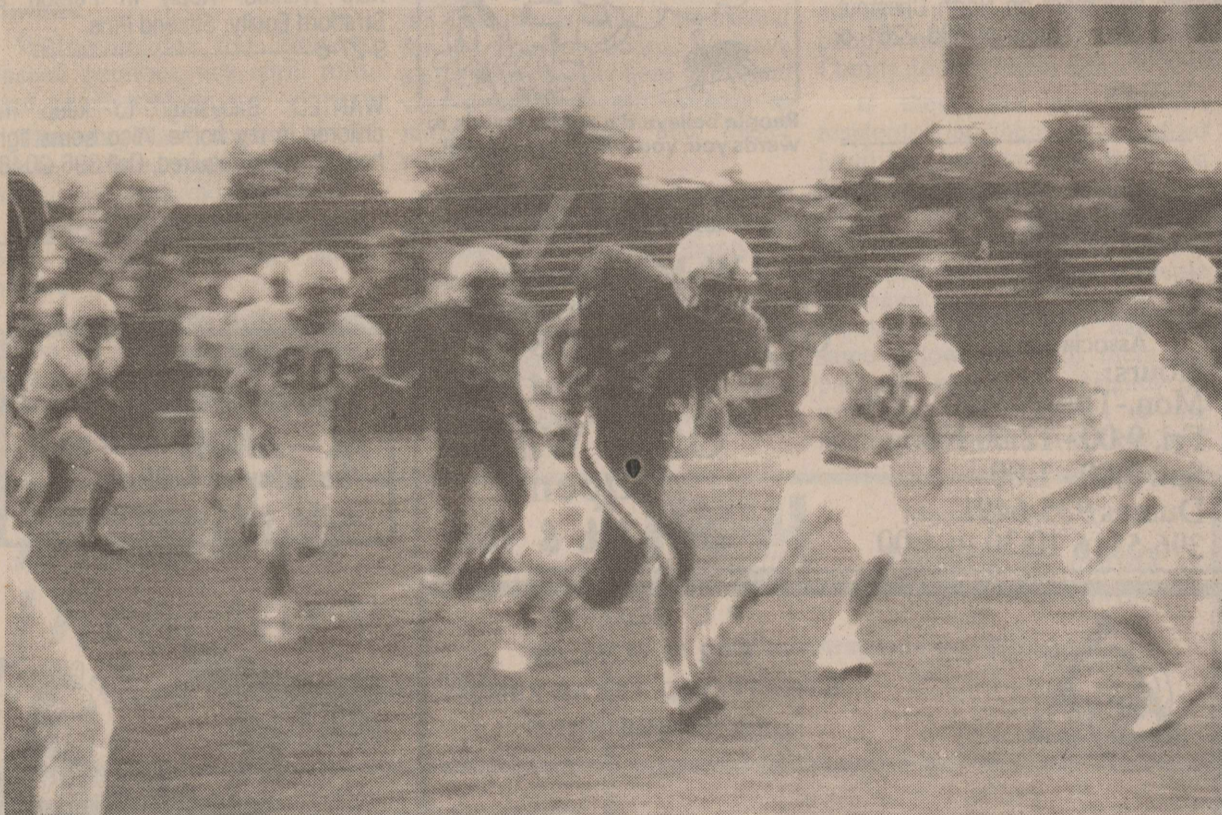

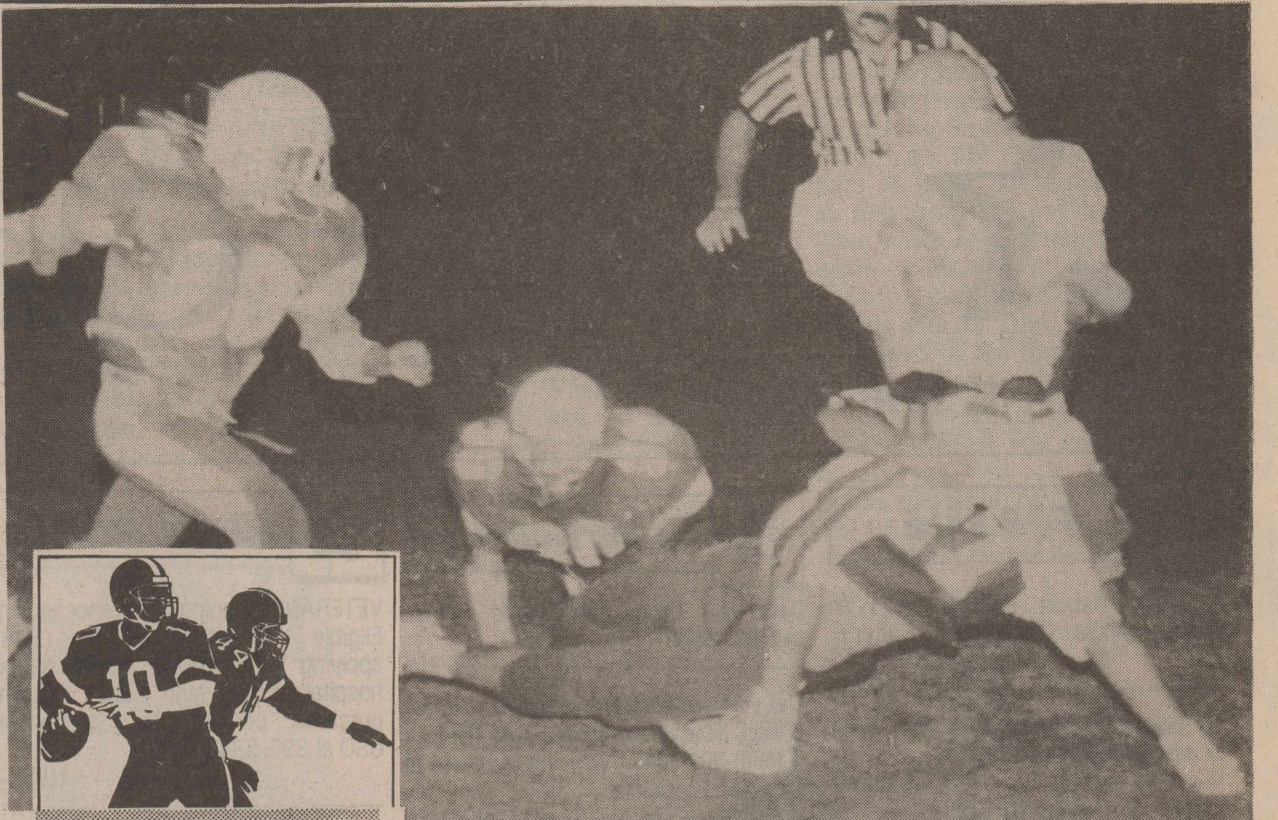
Best Yet club in 1940 her oldest child was one month old. She received an invitation to a meeting of young homemakers so she packed up bottles and diapers and took her young son for his first trip. Her pet peeve is for young homemakers today to say they can't do things because they can't afford a baby sitter. In 1940 you didn't think about a sitter, everyone took their children and it was a learning experience for the children, too.

In Doris' own words, "I've done it all; landscaping, gardening, food preparation and preservation. We refinished furniture, upholstered chairs and sofas, made drapes, etched aluminum trays, studied flower arranging, you name it and we have probably done it. We were quilting, knitting, crocheting, candle-wicking, all those things before they were considered "lost folk art". I'm still doing these things and hope to learn to tat before it's too late. I've attended many District and State meetings, one I remember so well, I left the three children with their father. When I returned the oldest boy said he didn't want to stay home with Dad's cooking anymore. "We had brown beans, green beans and pork'n beans all at the same meal! My husband hadn't learned meal planning as well as those of us that attended club meetings regularly. One good thing came of this trip though, I came home to find a New stove installed to replace my worn-out one. During my years in extension club work, we have

raised our two sons and one daughter, who were all active in the 4-H program. We now have eight grandchildren and two great grandchildren. The grandchildren have all been in 4-H and we are looking forward to seeing the great grandchildren participate in the program. It is such an opportunity for young people to learn and receive scholarships for work well done. Extension Homemakers has offered me and my family a full and rewarding fifty years and I'm looking forward to learning more in the years to come."

During their fifty year tenure in Sherman Co. Extension Homemaker club work, both Ava and Doris have served in every office in their club and County Council. They stated that it was sometimes hard but they have enjoyed it all. They learned leadership by "accepting responsibility for a job and fulfilling the task to the best of their ability. Doris and Ava feel like the biggest changes affecting family lives is the number of women working outside the home today, we are trying to meet the needs of these changes for young homemakers today just as ours were met fifty years ago.

It is the contribution of time and skill in leadership of women like Doris and Ava that has strengthened the Extension homemaker clubs in Sherman Co. They have been an inspiration to all persons who's paths they have crossed.
