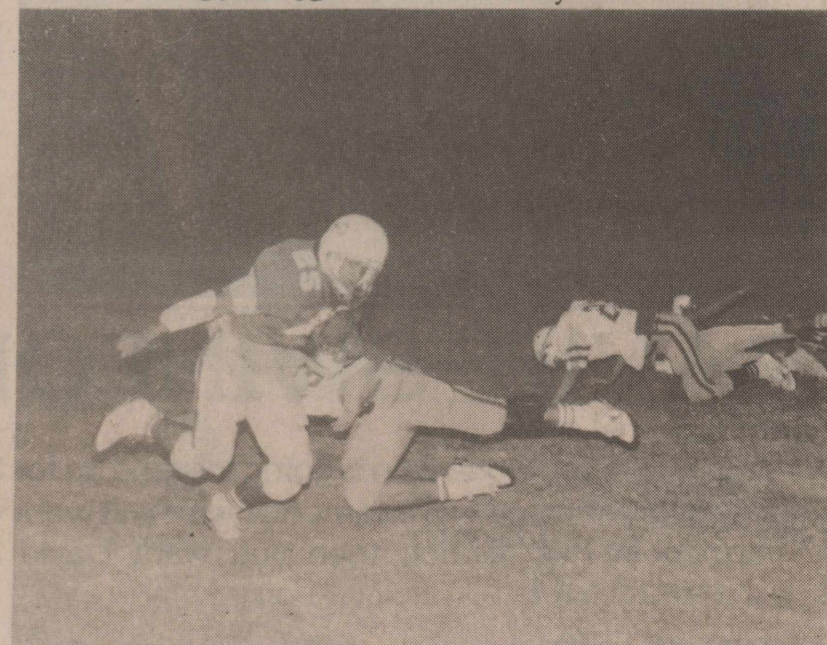
Homecoming Events This Coming Friday

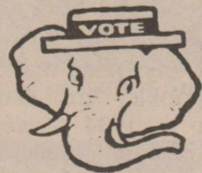

"Let's Not Waste the 90's"

On average, every American "throws away" 3 1/2 pounds of Municipal solid waste (MSW) a day. Our present 160 million tons of MSW is expected to expand to 193 million tons by the year 2000.

Historically, MSW was disposed of in our city dumps or landfills. Today landfills are closing at a rapid pace because they are filled up or were not constructed to meet environmental regulations. It's time we start to figure out some solutions before we are buried under our garbage and trash!

SUGGESTIONS TO HELP, SOURCE REDUCTION; 1. Use both sides of a sheet of paper. 2. Purchase packaged products in larger containers. 3. Repair broken appliances instead of throwing them away. 4. Junk Mail-Request to be eliminated from mailing lists. Make request to: Direct Marketing Association, 6 East 43rd Street, New York, NY 10017.

RECYCLING: Make collection, separation, preparing to buyer's specifications. Sales to markets (glass, aluminum, paper, steel, plastic, scrap tires and used oil.) ask merchants to use recycled paper bags.

COMPOSTING: Composting of yard waste (grass, leaves and brush) are useful soil additive or mulch-enriches soil and saves water. Make a compost pile in your backyard. Remember if you add food scraps that you will need a high temperature to aid decomposing, so as not to breed bacteria or attract rodents.

WASTE TO ENERGY: Interest your city in this project-refuse derived fuel. It is estimated this could reduce volume of MSW by 60-90% while generating steam or electricity. Emission controls eliminate air pollution; and the ash disposed of properly does not pose a threat to ground-water.

SANITARY LANDFILL: Will always be needed. They are equipped with liners, leachate collection and monitoring systems and methane gas controls. Presently 77 sanitary landfills capture the methane to produce energy.

Delegates were elected to attend the state conference that precedes the July 1991 White House Conference on Libraries. The White House Conference will set the direction of libraries for the next ten years.

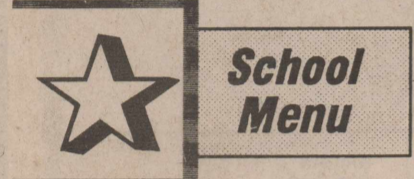
Resolutions were adopted in the areas of literacy, productivity and democracy. These resolutions will be presented at the state conference held in July 1990.

Check Extension Workbook For EPA Chemigation Requirements

Producers interested in chemigation--applying chemicals to protect and nourish crops through irrigation systems--would be wise to make sure they are operating within guidelines set forth by the Environmental Protection agency.

Dr. Rose Mary Seymour, irrigation specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension service, said the equipment required for chemigation by the EPA is explained in detail in the 1990 Chemigation Workbook published by the Extension service and available through county offices.

Not all chemicals are labeled by EPA for use in chemigation, Seymour said. "If a chemical can be used for chemigation it will list on its label the devices that are needed," she said.

She advised producers to test their irrigation system for application uniformity over the field before chemigating. They also should check the compatability of their water with the chemical they plan to use, she said.

"Some chemicals in the water supply might react with the pesticide and cause it to precipitate out or congeal," she cautioned.

She suggested mixing some chemical and water in a jar before injecting it into the system. "Let the jar set for the same length of time it would take your irrigation system to complete a round, then see what the jar looks like."

An agitator will keep pesticide in solution if there is no chemical reaction of the pesticide with the water supply. But an agitator can't undo a chemical reaction, Seymour said.
