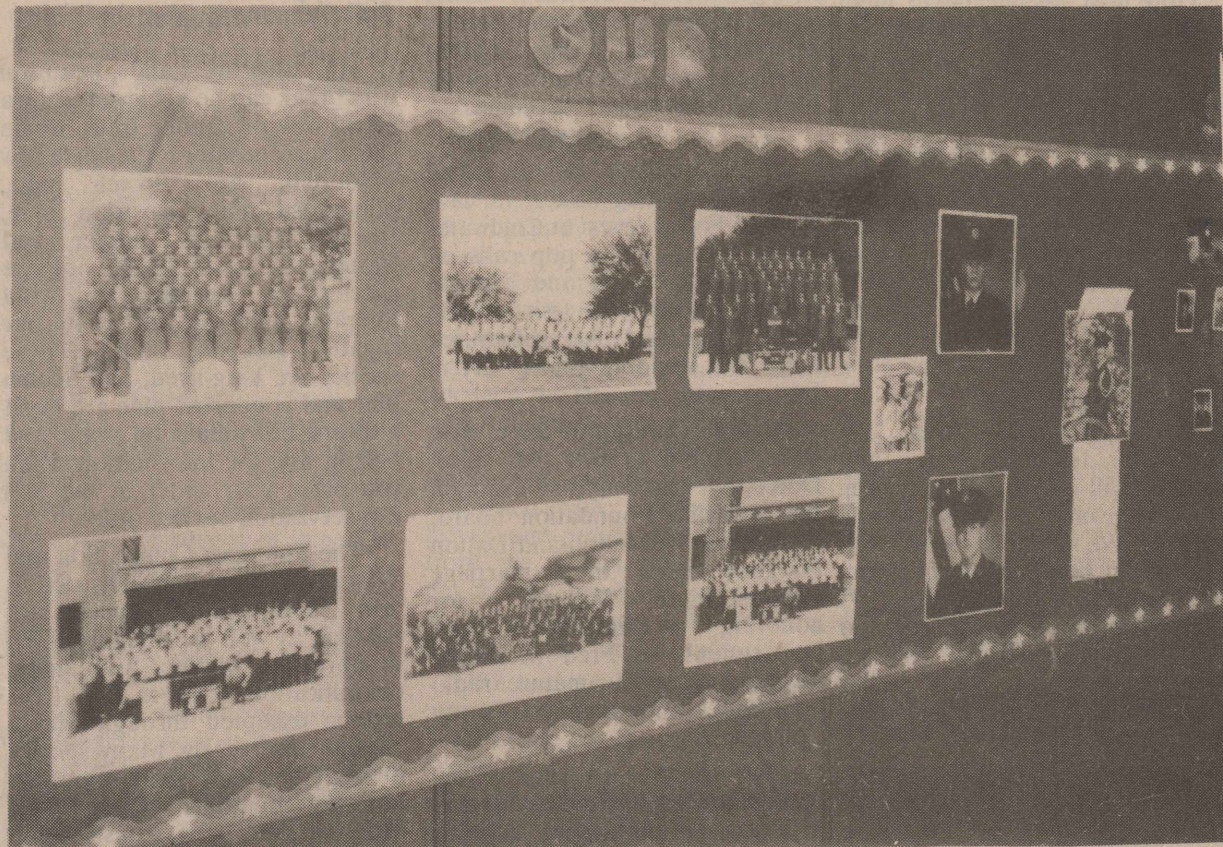

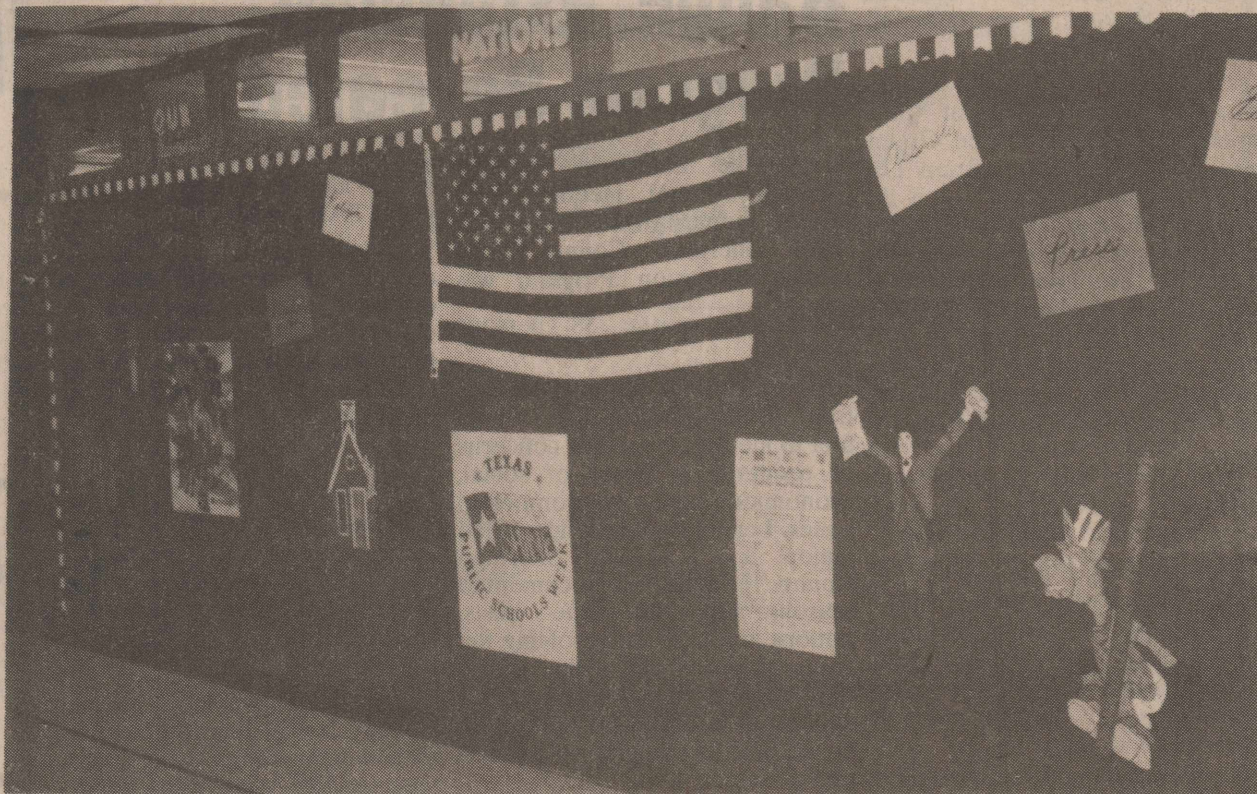


Patriotism Week At Mary Allen School

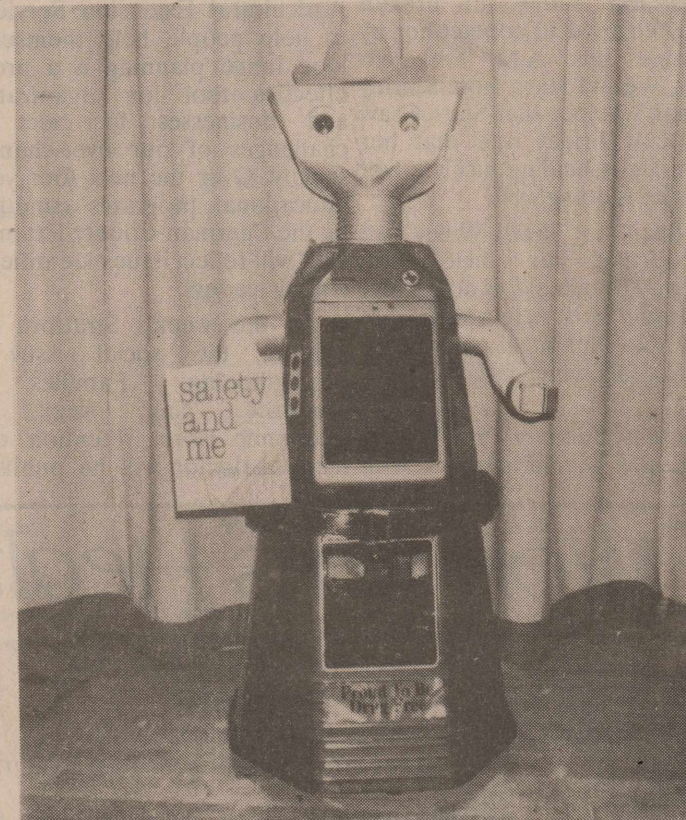
The Mary Allen Elementary School will be having a "Patriotism Emphasis" week January 21 through 25th. The teachers and students will be working together to learn more about our American

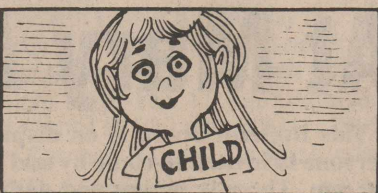

Spotlight on Windbreak Trees

By Mary Wilder Soil Conservationist

An affective and beautiful windbreak can be achieved using a single row of conifer trees. Some species to consider for a single row windbreak are Scotch pine, ponderosa pine, Austrian pine, Rocky Mountain juniper and Eastern red cedar. All five of these species are drought and cold tolerant, and can thrive in our slightly alkaline soils. These species are long-lived, and Scotch pine and ponderosa pine are rapid growers. For details on shape and height, ask for information when you place your order at the Soil Conservation Service office.

The Sherman County Soil and Water Conservation District is now selling these species of conifers as well as other trees for windbreaks, wildlife and home beautification. Orders for trees will be accepted through March 10, but order early. Many species of trees sell out well before the ordering deadline. Place your order at the Soil Conservation Service office at 418 N. 4th, or call 396-5517. Trees will arrive for pickup and planting on March 20 and March 27.

*In all family types, there is an increasing interest in understanding the role & responsibilities of being a parent. Pressures, stress, and outside

influences have serious import on parental skills.

*The influence on children by parents, neighbors, and teachers has been over shadowed by forces in society over which parents have negligible influence.

*The population over the age of 65 is expected to increase over 40% by the year 2,000. Older citizens require more health and human support systems.

*Employed families with older disabled members find it difficult to locate adequate and affordable daycare during working hours.

Long Range Objectives:

*Sherman County parents recognize and adopt fundamental skills for effective parenting through training provided by the Partners For Parenting coalition.

*Child care providers become well trained to provide quality care for Sherman County children.

*The public to become aware of the physical and mental changes experienced by the aging population.

*Those caring for the aging develop skills to provide quality care for Sherman County aging population.

Good Hay Is Important For Horses

Quality roughage serves as the foundation for a safe and effective horse feeding program. Roughage helps to maintain the integrity of as wood chewing or cribbing. Good quality hay can also meet a majority of the nutrients required for mature, idle horses and dry pregnant mares in the early stages of pregnancy.

Hay selection is critical to insure maximum nutrient supply per dollar spent, says Pete Gibbs, Extension Horse Specialist. Careful selection will allow the horseowner to avoid purchasing inferior quality hay that could potentially contribute to digestive disorders such as colic. Horseowners who intend to purchase large amounts of hay at a time will benefit from retrieving a core sample of hay that can be analyzed for nutrient content.

Hay should always be selected on important visual criteria. Characteristics of good quality hay include 1. a high leaf to stem ration, 2. a fresh smell and appearance 3. cleanliness (free of weeds, trash, dirt) and 4. to some extent the color of the hay. Hay that is stemmy has been cut at a more mature stage of growth and will be significantly lower in nutrient supply and digestibility. The presence of weeds in the hay affects total quality and some weeds may be highly toxic to horses.

Hay that smells the least bit musty or moldy should be avoided. In some hays, a white, floury, powder-like appearance and dust are also indicators of mold. Horses that are not overly hungry will often refuse to eat moldy hay if given a choice. However, hungry individuals will readily consume moldy hay when no other alternative is available. Round bales are sometimes used in horse feeding programs and can be very effective in providing a source of nutrients for horses. Even with round bales, emphasis should be placed on quality. The outer layer of weathered and or spoiled hay

may need to be removed to let horses access the high quality roughage in the bale. Horseowners are wise to consider the economics, while keeping in mind that some hay wastage is essentially inevitable when round bales are used.

Unfortunately, many of the decisions that horse owners make in choosing a particular type of hay are based on tradition. In reality, horsemen can have an equally effective feeding and conditioning program with either legume or grass hay serving as the roughage source. The type of hay dictates the concentration of nutrients that will be needed in the grain mix or concentrate for a particular class of horse. Research

conducted at Texas A&M has shown that legume hay can be lower in digestibility than good quality grass hay. Consequently, hay should be selected on quality and availability. Once this is done, the concentrate feed can be selected that will best meet the remainder of nutrient not provided by the roughage.

Purchasing and providing top quality for horses is a challenging and continuing effort. But, it is well worth the time in being able to effectively manage and enjoy horses, regardless of what they are used for.

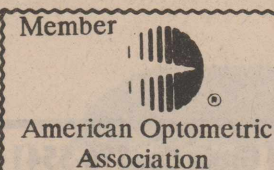

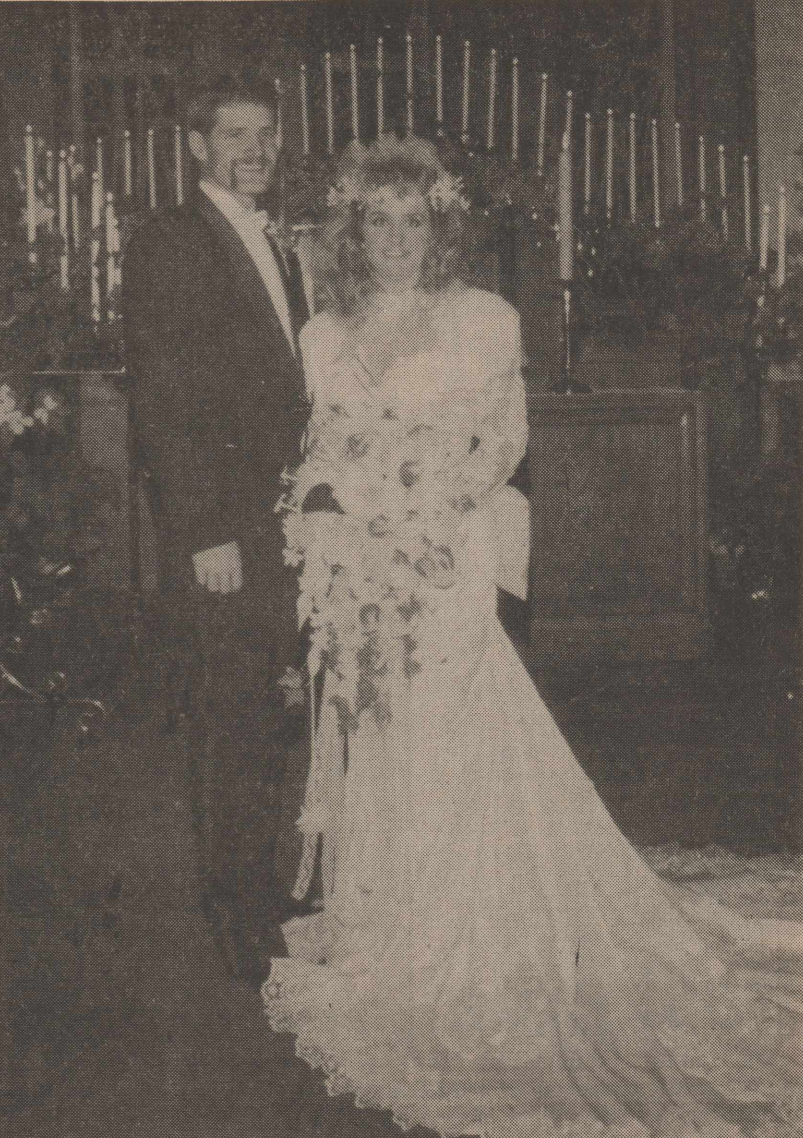

Windows of the Church were lit with various sized brass candlesticks and candles. Each candlestick was surrounded with evergreen, holly berries, and

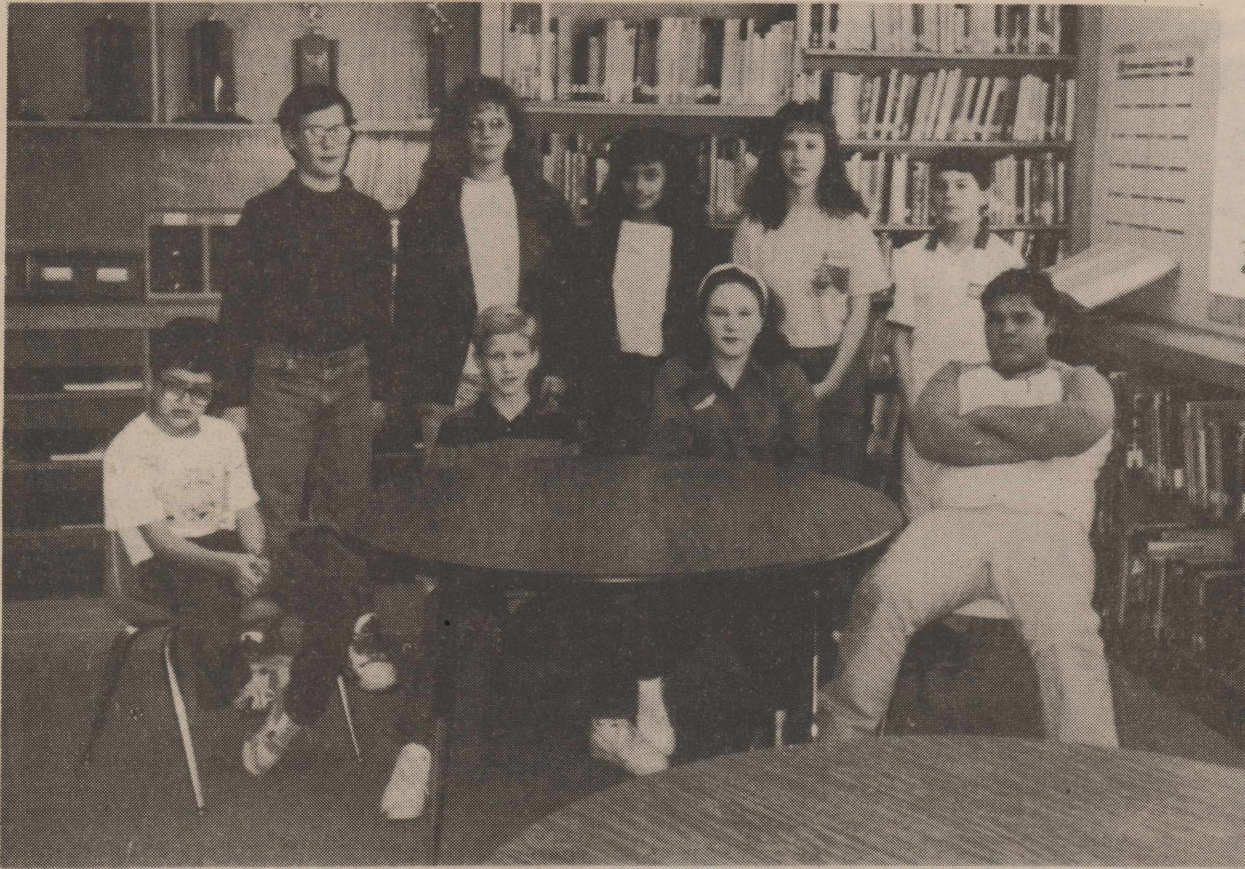

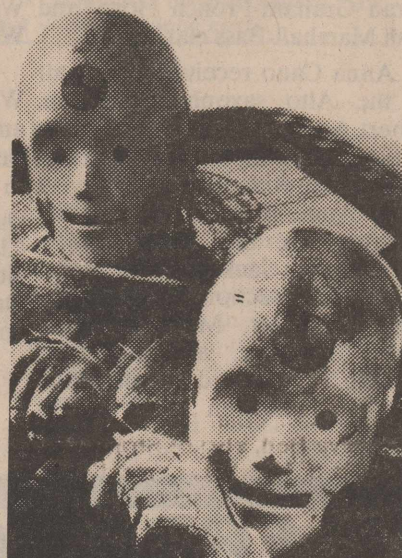

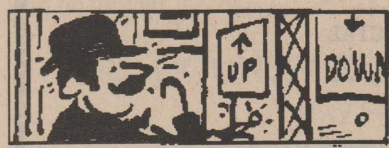
