



College Station March 13- The Texas State ASC committee today exempted Texas from the fifty percent cover crop requirement on Acreage Conservation Reserve collections. (ACR) acres according to Jerry Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee.

Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade Act of 1990 required that half of the acreage set-aside under the commodity programs be planted to a cover crop. The legislation also allowed for the exemption of those areas determined to be arid





disaster. Several hundred acres of grassland and farmland were destroyed by fire on Tuesday, March 5th. The County Judge is working on getting damage estimates. Fire Departments from Sunray, Gruver, Texhoma, and Goodwell came with their equipment. The fire got into Hutchinson County before it was brought under control. Over one hundred and fifty people were involved in trying to contain the blaze. One family residence had to be evacuated. The damage is still being tallied. An aerial photographer has taken some pictures, and they will be placed over a county map to determine what type/amount of land was affected. Responders also included: Texas Dept. of Public Safety, XIT Rural Telephone, County Commissioners Court (Road and Bridge), Sheriff's Office Personnel (including dispatcher and volunteer helper), Walter Lasley and Sons Feedlot, and Highway Department. There were communication and traffic problems. If you have had damage from this fire, please contact the Emergency of Management, so we can get some firm figures of the actual dollar amount of damage. Federal funds are depleted at this time due to the severe weather in the state last spring, but records need to be kept on the damage. Write to: Sherman County Emergency Management; P.O. Eskie Rowena King Ritchie was born on a farm near Odessa, living at East Camp. Welcome Missouri, July 30, 1897. Her parents were Henry Charles King and Martha Barnett King.

data that shows the line between non-arid and arid regions running from North Dakota through Texas. All states east of the line are not considered arid and must comply with the fifty percent cover requrement. Most states west of the line are considered arid and do not have to comply with the fifty percent cover requirement.

"Since this line runs through Texas, the Texas State ASC Committee determined to exclude all of the state from the fifty percent cover requirement," Harris said.


