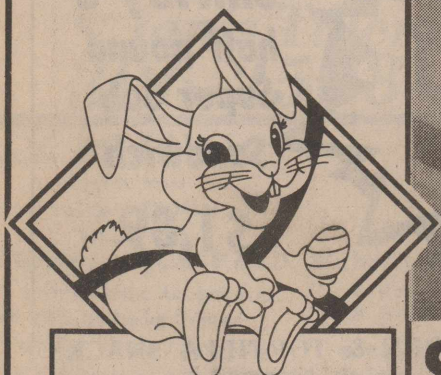

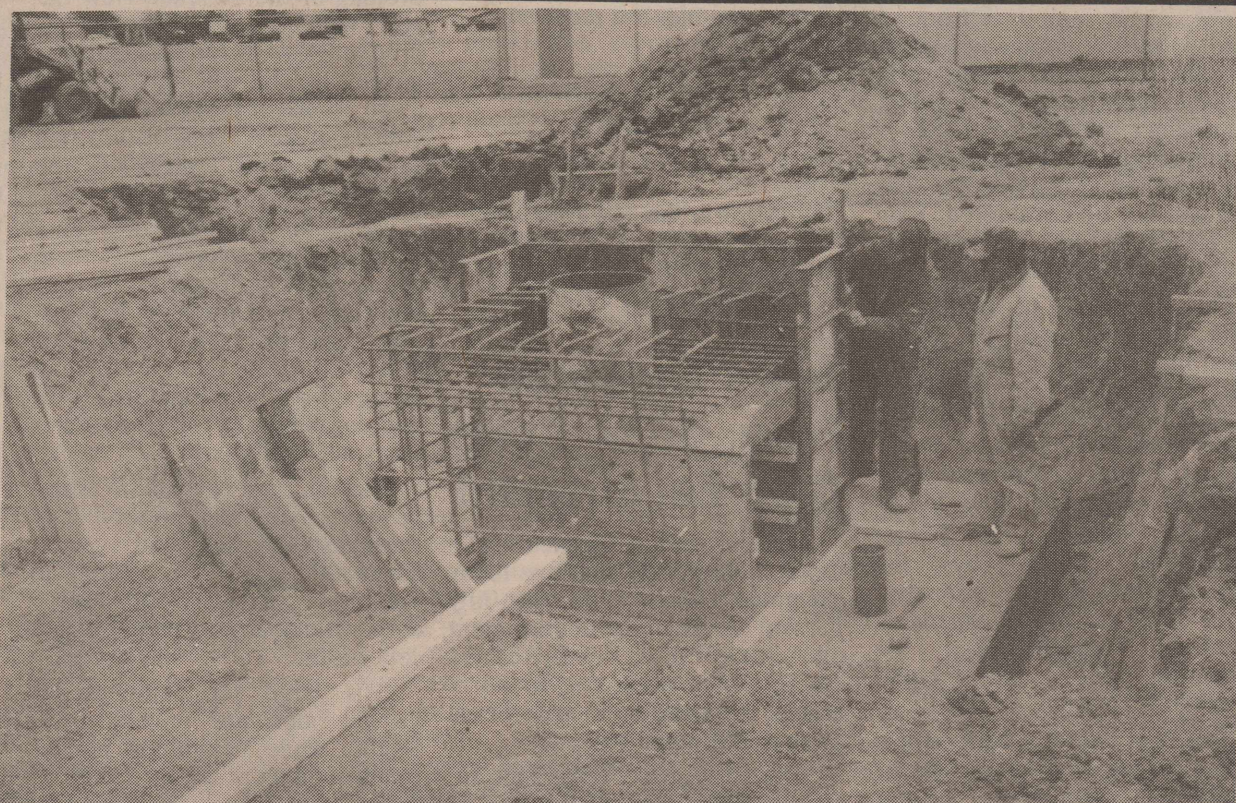

Library To Receive Grant

Sherman County Public Library has been notified that it is the recipient of a monetary grant provided by the J. Frank Dobie Library Trust. The presentation will be made at the Friends of the Library luncheon held during the State Library Meeting in Ft. Worth on April 10th.

To be eligible for a grant, the library must serve a population of 15,000 or less, is legally established as a free public library and is open for service at least twenty hours a week.

The number and amounts of

awards depend on net income produced by the trust. This year eight libraries will be recipients. According to the trust's terms, funds must be used for the purchase of books.

Awards are made not only on the basis of need but also on the extent to which community and county government, library board/friends, organizations, and individuals have promoted and supported the library.

The Stratford Hospital District Board began a search for a doctor

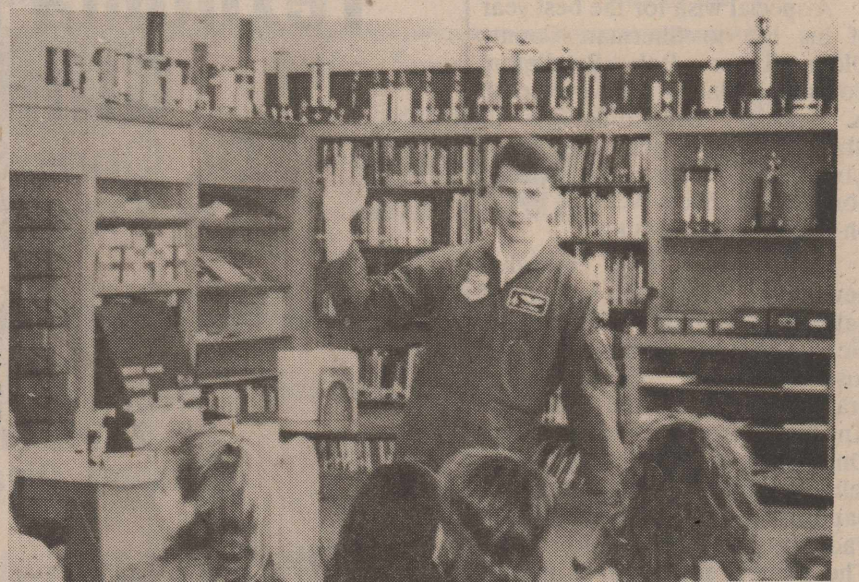

Texas Exempted From 50% Cover Crop Requirement

College Station March 13-The Texas State ASC committee today exempted Texas from the fifty percent cover crop requirement on Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR) acres according to Jerry Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee.

The Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade Act of 1990 required that half of the acreage set-aside under the commodity programs be planted to a cover crop. The legislation also allowed for the exemption of those areas determined to be arid by USDA.

The determination to exclude Texas was based on meteorological

Three weeks from last night will be our annual Chamber Banquet. Have you been in the bank this past week and seen the print and sculpture that by buying a ticket to the banquet you have a chance to win? Also we will be having some drawings during the evening of the banquet. New this year will be two tickets to the production of Texas. Really if you haven't bought a ticket you need to do so. Keep those nominations coming in for Citizen of the Year as well, as these awards will also be given the night of the banquet.

Most of you are aware, have even met our speaker, Kenneth Wyatt of Tullia, Texas is a mighty big state, but it probably has very few retired ministers like Kenneth Wyatt? He has built an international reputation for painting Biblical figures; as well as lonesome cowboys.

His oil paintings of Western Scenes have been presented to President Reagan and Queen Elizabeth 11. They hang in executive offices of large corporations and in many private collections.

He has never taken a formal course in art, but he holds religious study degrees from Baylor University and Iliff Seminary in Colo., would you believe he began preaching when he was 14. He was taken before

the ruling conference board which was to determine whether he was capable of preaching. The board members thought he was too young until the conference Bishop said. "You Know I started preaching when I was 14." There was no opposition to the vote after they realized this gentle man was on Wyatt's side. Three weeks later he had a "five point" church circuit, made up of churches in five, small Texas towns. He drove his dad roofing truck to the churches because he didn't have a car.

Since retiring from preaching, Wyatt has combined his love for Western Art with his religious work in helping the United Methodist Church.

Many of you have seen his work in the fellowship of our First United Methodist Church fellowship Hall, the "Apostles". Kenneth Wyatt now has two major projects on his planning board. One is to paint cowboys around the world, and the other is to illustrate selected women of the Bible. Mr. Wyatt has observed that probably the first cowboy in the Bible was Abraham. "Old Abraham was a very wealthy and raised sheep and cattle." "He was a cowpoke in that sense."

So you see Folks we are in for a fun night with Kenneth Wyatt. In visiting with him and his wife, Veda, by phone, he expresses excitement at coming to Stratford, and wearing his denim "no diamonds" for you the listeners will be the diamonds.

There seems to be more and more interest in the Pheasant raising in these parts. The hospital board gave the go-ahead to use the green house at the Manor, for the Brooder for day old pheasant. Won't it be nice to let 1500 plus bird loose and let the hunters who have been coming to hunt year after year, know that we are the pheasant capital?

In closing just a reminder that "none are so old as those who have outlived enthusiasm."

Eskie Rowena King Ritchie

Eskie Rowena King Ritchie was born on a farm near Odessa, Missouri, July 30, 1897. Her parents were Henry Charles King and Martha Barnett King.

When Eskie was 8 her family moved to Washburn, Texas. Covered wagons used to stop overnight at the family farm. She

attended Canyon Normal School, now West Texas University.

Her family moved to Stratford in 1917 where Eskie taught in the Stratford School and in a country school east of Stratford.

She and Edward Douglas Ritchie were married Oct. 3, 1922 at Pueblo, Colo. They had two children, Margaret and Donald.

Donald had a serious accident about 1940! Stratford students went to Denver to give him blood transfusions.

The family moved to San Antonio in 1943. They all worked in defense plants during World War II. Eskie attended San Antonio College and Trinity University. She completed her Master's degree when she was 61.

She taught underprivileged children for many years.

She volunteered at Metropolitan Hospital in San Antonio after Ed and Donald died in 1974 and 1975.

Then she returned to Stratford in 1980. She and Eunice Buster, ages 84 and 85, volunteered at Coldwater Manor. Pouring juice for the "Old Folks".

Eskie was very happy to join in Stratford's activities, especially playing "42".

She lived a long, admirable, courageous life.

Sherman County had a disaster. Several hundred acres of grassland and farmland were destroyed by fire on Tuesday, March 5th. The County Judge is working on getting damage estimates. Fire Departments from Sunray, Gruver, Texhoma, and Goodwell came with their equipment. The fire got into Hutchinson County before it was brought under control. There were communication and traffic problems. disenfranchised, Hispanics relied on their own resources to meet their community needs and to preserve cultural self-identity; * Efforts of self-help became the basis for creating political power after World War II which subsequently became the leverage which regained a voice for Hispanics in the society of the majority; * West Texas today serves as a source of inspiration and home for Hispanic artists and their creative endeavors.

The exhibit includes a tapestry from nationally famous textile artist Romeo Reyna of Lubbock. Also included is artwork from Nephtali DeLeon of San Antonio; Eduardo Esparza of Austin; and Olga Real of Lubbock. The exhibit also addresses early Hispanic archaeological remains in West Texas and features traditional music. Hispanic West Texas will tour West Texas through 1991.

data that shows the line between non-arid and arid regions running from North Dakota through Texas. All states east of the line are not considered arid and must comply with the fifty percent cover requirement. Most states west of the line are considered arid and do not have to comply with the fifty percent cover requirement.

"Since this line runs through Texas, the Texas State ASC Committee determined to exclude all of the state from the fifty percent cover requirement," Harris said.
