1st Lt. Kyle Ingham, Former Resident of Stratford To Be At Air-Show

Grand Forks Air Force Base, N.D.--Amarillo residents can expect rolling thunder May 17 as a B-1B Lancer streaks across the afternoon sky.

The B-1B based here will be in Amarillo for the air show scheduled to begin May 19, but 1st Lt. Kyle Ingham, the acting aircraft commander and a native of Stratford, Texas, said the four-man crew also plans to perform an arrival show at 4 p.m. Friday in Amarillo.

The Lancer is the world's foremost high-speed, low-altitude strategic manned bomber and the newest in the Strategic Air Command's inventory.

It uses variable-wing-geometry technology which allows the crew to move the aircraft's wings into a swept position for low altitude penetration and supersonic flight, or forward for slower flight during takeoff and landing.

Even at low levels, the crew typically completes its mission with the aircraft flying about 700 miles per hour at an altitude of 200 feet.

The B-1B is able to perform its mission carrying conventional or nuclear weapons and can deliver them day or night in all weather conditions. To aid in low-visibility conditions, the pilots use a high-tech terrain-following radar which helps guide the aircraft over the ground, even in mountainous terrain.

Although the B-1B can be refueled while flying, it's capable of intercontinental flight without aerial refueling. Its combination of quick takeoff capability and hardness to the effects of nuclear weapons improves the United States' bomber force's ability to survive a missile attack. The B-1B, with its penetration aids and low radar cross section, is difficult for enemy defenses to detect.

The Air Force has 97 B-1Bs based at three other SAC bases including Dyess Air Force Base, Texas; McConnell Air Force Base, Kan.; and Ellsworth Air Force Base, S.D. There are 17 B-1Bs based here under the control of the 319th Bombardment Wing.

Ingham is joined in the cockpit by Capt. Scott Land, an instructor pilot, Capt. Bryan Ferguson, the instructor defensive systems officer, and Capt. Kelvin Kearney, the instructor offensive systems officer.

Ingham is a 1980 graduate of Stratford High School. In 1985 he graduated from Oklahoma State University with a bachelor of science degree in petroleum engineering and went on to earn a master's degree in human resource management in 1987. He is the first person to be selected to fly the B-1B directly upon graduation from pilot training. He also became the first 2nd Lt. to qualify as mission ready.

He was chosen in Sept. 1990, to work in the select standardization and evaluation division of the 319th BMW.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Ingham former residents of

Stratford now live in Amarillo. He is the grandson of Luella Johnson and Mildred James both of Stratford.

Land is a native of Colorado Springs, Colo., and a 1981 graduate of the Air Force Academy. He is one of three Air Force pilots selected for the B-2 Stealth bomber program.

Ferguson, a native of Livingston, N.J., is a 1979 graduate of Muhlenberg College in Allentown, Pa. He is one of only 30 instructor defensive systems officers in the Air Force also qualified as an offensive systems officer.

Kearney is a native of Cofield, N.C., and a 1982 graduate of North Carolina A & T State University. He was selected as the 319th offensive systems officer of the year for 1989.

Kyle would like to extend a special invitation to the Airshow to all of the residents of Stratford, especially the Stratford Middle School and Stratford High School students that he had the opportunity to visit with in March.
