SCOT Dance

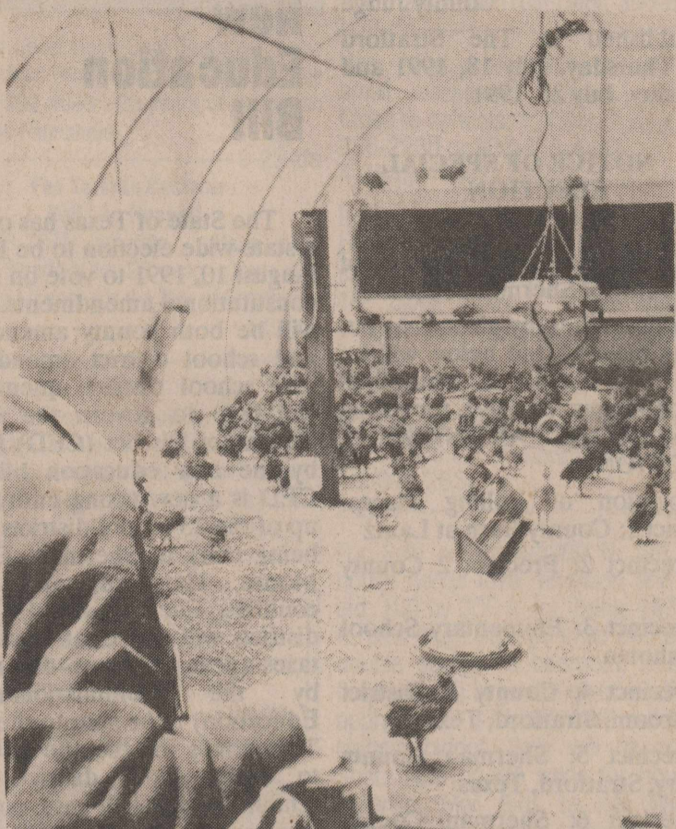

On April 9, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to request that the optional feature "Call Transfer Disconnect" be available to all PLEXAR I customers by including the feature in Southwestern Bell's PLEXAR I tariff. Currently, this optional feature is available only on a customer requested basis.

Call Transfer Disconnect (CTD) is an optional feature that allows PLEXAR I customers the ability to transfer a call to another telephone number within or outside their PLEXAR I system, hang up, and permit the two remaining parties to continue with the call. The PLEXAR I user is then free to place or accept another call. CTD is not intended to be used to avoid toll charges. Therefore, CTD will not be available to PLEXAR I customers subscribing to optional Extended Metropolitan Service or Extended Area Calling Service.

If the company's application is approved, the monthly rate for CTD will be \$4.00 for each PLEXAR I station line. Prior to the June 19, 1991, interim rate approval, Southwestern Bell was billing customers who receive the service \$1.50 for each station line equipped with this feature. In addition, under Southwestern Bell's proposed tariff, every line within the PLEXAR I system must be equipped with this feature. The nonrecurring charge for the additional lines which must be equipped with CTD will be waived for existing CTD customers. The tariffed monthly rate will apply to all existing and future CTD customers.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. 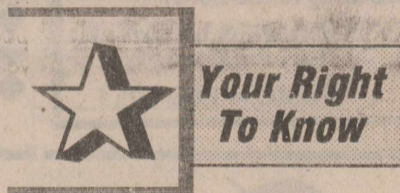

Charleston, W. Va. Enedit will again, be in the Chamber Office. If she can't give you the answer, whatever, she will find someone who will.

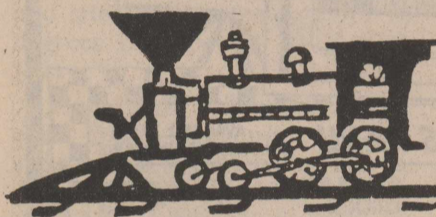

after hours or weekends. This coming Saturday, the museum will be open to welcome ex-students and others.

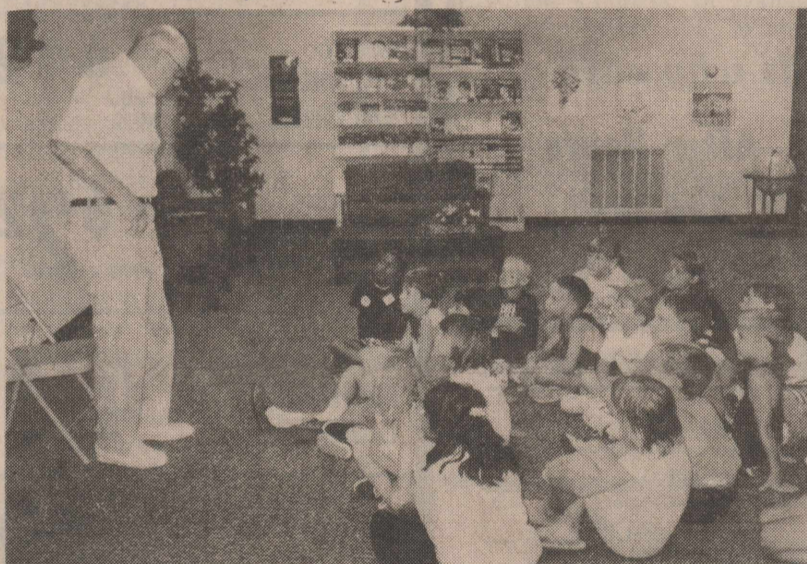
Museum projects in the works include a brochure. Also all new t-shirts, with new color and new design. While honoring and recalling the past, the museum board continues to look to the future.

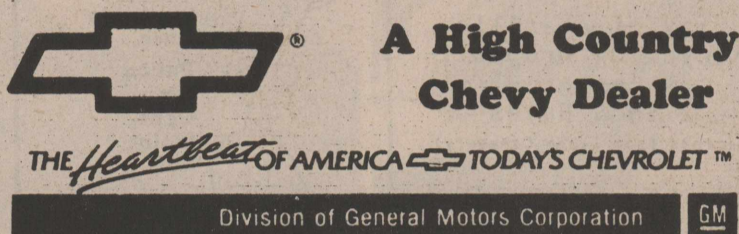

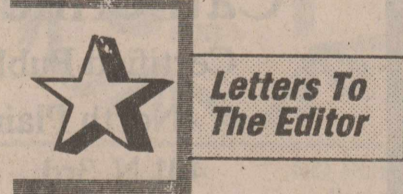

Dear Editor:

Now is not the time for our Texas citizens to be apathetic. A few powerful people have spent a lot of money (to which every single person who shops in Amarillo has contributed through a 1/2 cent sales tax which goes to the Amarillo Economic Development corp.) to promote the expansion of Pantex. Will YOUR gain outweigh your loss?

The NWRS Proposal admits that "The reconfigured facility will handle significant quantities of chlorinated solvents, radioactive uranium and plutonium" and will "emit small quantities of air pollutants." The Proposal repeatedly makes reference to "the prevailing winds" which happen to be away from Amarillo. However, Amarillo citizens DO need to worry about their water being polluted and the economic repercussions should the \$3-\$4 billion area agribusiness fail due to contamination. In Colorado, the Jefferson County Health Director has projected "12,000 cancer deaths" among Denver residents

due to plutonium releases by Rocky Flats. How many cancer deaths will we suffer?

The promoters of the expansion appeal to one's sense of patriotism. The addition "would answer the need of the DOE to carry out its mission, on behalf of the American people" wrote the Rev. Bill Brashears in the Amarillo News Globe, July 7, 1991, and yet only on April 4, 1991, the Denver Post quoted Rev. Gilbert Horn, executive director of the Colorado Council of Churches, with "Rocky Flats has not been a good neighbor. Good neighbors don't lie about what they're doing. Good neighbors don't traffic in the instruments of death and destruction." Let us take a lesson in others' mistakes.

Let the DOE prove its advanced technology by CLEANING UP even ONE of its production plants. Our Panhandle land, water, and air is TOO precious to gamble away to such a poor risk as the DOE. I, too, appeal to you in the name of patriotism--in the name of "America, the Beautiful" with its "spacious skies" and "amber waves

of grain." Say NO to DOE--before it's too late.
