## Special Rate Still In Effect

Some bought The Hart Beat at the special introductory rate of 49 cents plus one cent tax. Others purchased The Hart Dispatch at \$3 plus 6 cents tax.

To avoid confusion, the newspaper is returning subscription checks written to The Hart Dispatch. This is being done to allow these people to subscribe at the special opening rate of 50 cents, if they so

Subscriptions already taken at the 50-cent rate will stand.

Those persons in the Hart area who have been regular subscribers to The Hart Beat in the past, through the Olton Enterprise, will continue to receive both The Hart Beat and The Enterprise, through the remainder of their current subscriptions. It is not necessary for them to subscribe separately for The Hart Beat.

The special introductory rate of 50 cents is limited to a one year subscription and will be in effect until Aug. 1. After that, the rates will go up.

Regular subscription rates for the newspaper will be \$2.50 plus five cents state tax in Castro and adjoining counties. Subscriptions mailed to other parts of Texas will be \$4 plus eight cents tax. Elsewhere, the rate will be \$4.

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

Boil 2 minutes. Remove from fire and add 1 can coconut. Mix well and pour on cake while both are still hot.





### Rural Residents Urged To Observe Farm Safety Week

A special week to alert rural residents to the hazards of farm life has been set by the President and the Governor, and an intensive campaign is being conducted in Texas to call public attention to this serious problem, according to Sherman Clark of Houston, president of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council.

The week of July 22-28 has been designated "National Farm Safety Week" by President Kennedy and "Texas Farm Safety Week" by Governor Daniel. Many county judges over the state will issue proclamations calling for countrywide observance of the week. Theme of this year's observance is "Family Safety—At Work and

Clark said the observance is coordinated on the national level by National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Agriculture and on the state level by the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Farm Bureau, and the Extension Service.

Kennedy, in his proclamation, calls for all persons and organizations allied with agriculture to "join together in a strong effort to reduce the number of farm, home and highway accidents."

In proclaiming the state observance, Daniel said, "Texas cannot afford the loss in human life, the misery of human in-

jury, nor the economic costs resulting from farm accidents and others involving farm families."

Daniel noted that traffic crashed involving Texas farm families in 1961 resulted in more than 170 deaths, more than 600 injuries and more than 1,600 non-injury mishaps. He urged all Texas farm families to "acquaint themselves with the hazards of their specialized occupation and encourage all interested Texans and Texas organizations to take an active part in this campaign for greater farm safety."

Each day of the special week will have a different theme emphasized, Clark said. Beginning Sunday, July 22, they are: Reverence for Life; Safety Begins at Home; Agricultural Chemicals; Prevent Falls; Highway Safety; Farm Machinery, and Recreation Safety.

Clark pointed out that in one year, accidents of all types kill about 11,300 rural residents and injure about a million. Nearly half of the deaths are caused by traffic mishaps.



This examination has been announced under revised qualifications standards recently agreed upon between the Commission and the Post Office Department.

Competitors must have at least one and one-half years of experience (education above high school level may be sub-stituted for 9 months of experience) showing that they have the ability to conduct and manage the community's postal bus-iness efficiently and to supervise employees so that customers are satisfied with the

Competitors must also show that they are of good reputation and that they can deal with the public agreeably and effec-

Applicants must take a written test which will be given at Plainview. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, and fitness for the position. They must have resided within the delivery of the office for one year immedi-ately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. Persons over 70 years of age

cannot be appointed.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office. Application forms must be filed with the U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D.C., and must be received or post-marked not later than the closing date.

load of fresh "roostnears" asserted Mrs. Keenom. "Got any fresh corn today?" a friend called to Mrs. Keenom as she looked over her garden.

"Shore, just help ya'self." she replied.

"Last year we didn't sell a thing out of it, just gave it all away," the grey-hared gardener remarked, with a gleam

in her eye.

But she doesn't take all the credit for the care of the large garden plot with its thriving vegetables, that are encircled with a winding row of assorted flowers. "I help plant it and pick the vegetables, but my husband does most of the rest," she said.

No scarecrow ever was needed to keep away unwelcomed pests; "I don't put up anything to keep out the birds, I just

stand out there and that's enough," she laughed, "We've raised some awful big mushmellons before, and last year we had a turnip that weighed over a pound and a quarter," she said.

The neighborhood kiddoes know they don't have to sneak into the Keenom watermelon patch. "Gordon always just gives the kids some melons ... the children aroundhere always have been awful nice,"; she said,

If the neighbors didn't come for a visit and stock up on some of her fresh vegetables, Mrs, Keenom said she would "just go throw a rock through their window and invite them over."

The spry great-grandmother has a "never-give-up" spirit. Last year her garden was hailed out three times and she "just kept redoing it, and got a lot out of it,"

A list of numberous vegetables are grown in the Keenom garden. Among these are okra, peas, beans, beets, carrots, lettuce, squash, cante-

lopes and pumpkins.
"I had a row of dewberries that I picked 17 gallons of of this year and some of the biggest strawberries I've ever seen grow," she said.

A couple of rows of peanuts can always be found each year in the Keenom garden, according to Mrs. Keenom. "We just

pull'em and put them in a sack and let hem dry," she said. "Then they give them to us neighbors for seed," Mrs. Lester Richburg added.

"We'll probably just keep planting a garden as long as we live here, because we got plenty of space for it and we might as well use it. Besides working out there keeps a person happy and from worrying so much," Mrs. Keenom said. The Keenom's two great-

The Keenoms have four children and 13 grandchildren. Two of the grandchildren, Mrs. Bauman and Wayne Brown, live in

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
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
